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## STATE OF THE VILLAGE

January 2008

The well-attended January caucus yielded three candidates for the three Trustee positions and a single candidate for Municipal Judge (*see Caucus article on Page 7*), which will give the Village continuity and experience over the coming year. I would like to think that this is a sign that the Board is carrying out its business well, for there is no evidence of apathy in this Village.

At the top of the list of topics for this report is the great financial state of the Village. Thanks to careful planning and budgeting by the Village Administrator, the Finance Committee and the Board, and skilful and responsible operations by Village staff, we now have a very healthy undesignated fund balance – the fund which buffers economic disasters, allows flexibility in budgeting, and reduces our interest rate on borrowings. We also have a low debt and a balanced budget, giving us financial ability to carry out necessary repairs and improvements to the Village infrastructure. Last year we were awarded an AA- bond rating from Standard and Poors, which is typically the highest possible for a village our size.

Our staff continues to improve in skill, efficiency and morale, with our new Fire Chief, Keith Anderson, bringing our fire protection up to true metropolitan standards, our Police Department running smoothly under Chief Denny Pine, and our Public Works Crew eager for the imminent return of Crew Chief

**HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE JANUARY 22, 2008 BOARD OF TRUSTEES MEETING**

*(Complete detailed minutes will be available on our website, at the Village Hall or by mail upon request)*

**Appearances & Communications** – The Board received a letter from former Village President Peter Hans regarding video camera “capture and cite” programs for red traffic light runners. He advised the Board that the Wisconsin Legislature is about to enact legislation to allow municipalities to install these types of cameras and encourages the Village to utilize them on University Avenue.

**Consent Agenda** – In an effort to expedite meetings, items on the consent agenda are considered as a group and are adopted with one motion. Any Board member may unilaterally remove an item from the consent agenda if he/she believes the item needs discussion. Items approved in the consent agenda included the [December 17, 2007](#) Board minutes, an Operator’s license, a Street Use Permit for the Valentine 5K run on February 9, 2008, and approval of hires for the Basketball and Indoor Soccer programs. Writing off an ambulance bill and approval of revised Community Center rules/fees were taken off of the consent agenda.

**Ambulance Bill Write-Off** – The Village’s billing service, LifeQuest, has recommended writing off an ambulance bill in the amount of \$348.88 from a conveyance on April 27, 2006. Presumably the bill was deemed uncollectible by LifeQuest. This is the first such recommendation from LifeQuest and the Board deferred action on this item until staff provides more detailed information on the bill.

**Community Center Rules / Fee Structure** – The Board discussed the revised rules and fees recommended by the Services Committee and unanimously approved the policy with an adjustment to some of the fees and required deposit amounts.

**Ordinance L-2007-4** – The Board unanimously approved the third and final reading of [ordinance L-2007-4](#) requiring safety equipment for certain recreational activities and methods of transportation for children under 17.

**Pubic Hearing / Action on 918 UBD** – President Mark Sundquist gave a brief explanation of the proposed expansion of the garage at 918 University Bay Drive that would exceed the Floor Area Ratio regulation by 50 square feet. The Plan Commission recommended granting the special exception require by the ordinance. The Board unanimously approved the special exception for the project.

**Public Hearing on the Pyare Square General Development Plan** – Jun Lee, owner of the Pyare Square building, presented detailed plans and concept drawings for the proposed remodeling of the tower into residential condos and the construction of townhomes on the lower parking lot. He answered questions from the Board and members of the audience. Sarah Shoemaker of Vierbicher Associates, the Village’s planning consultant, gave a synopsis of her Pyare Square GDP review. Vierbicher’s recommendation is to work with the developer to address some of the specific issues in the review. The Plan Commission is recommending approval of the GDP. The Board decided to defer action on the GDP because Vierbicher has had less than a month to review the project. Deferral would give Vierbicher and the developer a chance to work out some of the issues before the PUD GDP is established.

**Resolution R-2008-1** – The Board unanimously approved [resolution R-2008-1](#) directing the Plan Commission to initiate the process for establishing Tax Incremental Districts (TIDs) in the Pyare Square and Doctors Park areas.

**Communications Committee Report** – The Board accepted the Communications Committee report on cellular phone coverage in the Village. The report is available on line at [www.shorewood-hills.org/cell\\_report.pdf](http://www.shorewood-hills.org/cell_report.pdf). Look for an article in next month’s *Village Bulletin*.

**Fees for Roofing and Siding** – The Village’s Fire Chief and Building Inspector are recommending the Village review the policy of not requiring a permit for siding or roofing of residential and commercial buildings. The Board directed staff to propose requirements for the permits and the fee schedule for siding and roofing projects.

**Board Retreat** – Due to conflicts in February, the Board has tentatively scheduled its strategic planning retreat for Saturday, March 8, 2008.

**Village Hall Finishes** – Architect Terry Kolberg presented the proposed exterior stone and siding options for

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the Village Hall. The Board established an Ad Hoc Design Committee to review the proposal and make a recommendation to the Board. The Committee was established from residents at the meeting and suggestions of residents in the field from the Trustees.

**Traffic Study** – The Board approved (4-1, Ms. Townsend voting NO) the Plan Commission’s recommendation that the Village proceed with the proposed comprehensive traffic study for Marshall Court and University Bay Drive. Strand Associates was chosen for the study because they have done previous studies related to the Hilldale Mall construction projects. The cost of the study would be \$24,600 which may seem expensive but is comparable for this type of work. Portions of the cost could be paid by developers as well as by the TID, if it is created.

**Rec Program Staff Background Checks** – The Recreation Committee asked that staff or the Personnel Committee revisit the issue of background checks on our summer recreation employees. The Board referred the matter to the Personnel Committee for consideration in a timely fashion to hopefully have a policy in place before this season’s hirings.

**2008 Golf Program** – The Board unanimously ratified the joint Blackhawk CC and Golf Committee recommendation for the 2008 Adult & Junior Golf programs. The adult program will be held on Monday mornings, May 12, May 19, June 2, and June 9. The junior program will be held on Monday mornings, June 16 through August 25. The general format will be the same as last year.

**President’s Report** – President Mark Sundquist brought up the discussion of lights on the holiday tree near the Fire Station (*see article on page 5*). Part of the Shorewood Boulevard road program will be installation of a water line to the east side of the street to facilitate the Crew flooding the ice rink. Mr. Sundquist would like to solicit ideas to incorporate the water line into an old style drinking fountain or similar feature (*see article in next month’s Bulletin*). Mr. Sundquist also reported that he and Trustee Bromley have been attending meetings with the adjacent Madison Neighborhood Associations to discuss development of the commercial corridor along University Avenue from Campus Drive to Middleton. Several areas are potential sites for redevelopment. The group would like to make suggestions to the City of Madison regarding planning for the commercial corridor.

**Administrator’s Report** – Karl Frantz reported on the status of the Safe Routes to School Grant. State grant funds will only be released when contracts are signed and in place. The required contracts with DOT are still pending. Mr. Frantz has been in contact with Senator Fred Risser for any assistance his office may be able to provide. Mr. Sundquist pointed out that the project is part of the road program plan. The Village will be continuing with the project even if, in the end, the grant money isn’t awarded.

**Plan Commission** – Mr. Sundquist reported on the proposed building on the corner of Marshall Court and University Bay Drive. Preliminary plans are available for review at the Village Hall and he expects a proposal at the Plan Commission meeting in February. The proposal will go to the Board in March. Final approval may be requested in April. The developer is hoping it will be a model project and receive Green Globe or LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) certification. Mr. Sundquist also discussed the Plan Commission meeting schedule. It generally meets on the second Tuesday of each month. The Commission has decided to change its meeting date to the Tuesday preceding the Monday Board meeting each month. This adjustment would change the date of the meetings in April and July only. In all other months the Tuesday before the Monday Board meeting is the second Tuesday of the month. Similarly, the Finance and the Public Works Committees (which Mr. Sundquist chairs) would meet during the week preceding the Monday Board meeting.

**Adjournment** – The meeting adjourned at 12:00 am.

With only a few glitches, the Village has made the transition to automated garbage pickup, saving workers' rotator cuffs and about \$45,000 over three years, widening our recycling options, and getting in early on what will soon be the only type of service available. Thank you all for working through the new procedures and finding places to put the bins – with the handles pointing away from the street. The next step will be to consider providing biodegradable trash bags – as the sturdy plastic grocery bags many of us use now can last ten decades in a landfill. We can then recycle the sturdy plastic bags.

We are about to bid the reconstruction plans for Shorewood Boulevard and Circle Close, plans worked out last year with input from residents and three committees – Parks, Traffic and Public Works. On Circle Close we hope to mitigate some long-standing stormwater problems (no pun intended) and build a street which will hold up well for another 60 years. On Shorewood Blvd we are replacing the water and sewer mains, which of course date from the beginning of the Village. The project will improve pipe sizes, provide a second water pipe to the school, and is engineered with features to improve safety, clearly delineate the entrance to the Shorewood School, and insure that this road will also last far longer than it takes to pay for it. We are also adding stormwater mitigation, including “bio-retention” devices, which look like gardens but capture, filter and eventually return stormwater to the water table. Special storm sewer inlet catch basins that also significantly improve water quality are also under consideration.

The stormwater efforts reflect the State mandate that our Village, along with Madison and the rest of the metropolitan area, must reduce its particulate runoff into the storm sewer system by 20% in 2009 and 40% in 2013. This requirement is especially difficult for a village with little room for retention ponds or new sprawl development in which to capture stormwater. It is also a calculated reduction, based on computer models at the DNR. As we beef up our street sweeping and add stormwater retention we will be assigned specific percentages based on the models. It will take a concerted effort to reach the 20% requirement, let alone the 40 % goal, but the Stormwater Committee has a plan. If we do it well, the effects will not only work in the computer model but will actually benefit Lake Mendota over the long term. The Village is committed to meeting the goals with improved procedures and engineering, but each of us can also consider ways to turn stormwater into a resource – from rain barrels on our downspouts for watering the plants to our own rain gardens.

There are new developments brewing in the commercial district, at the far east and west ends. They have been the catalyst for the Village to hire planning consultants to facilitate area plans for Marshall Court and for the area west of Garden Homes.

The Board has before it a zoning change request to convert the Pyare Square Building from commercial office to residential condominiums and to build 24 townhouses in place of the large parking lot between the bike path and the Walnut Grove and McDonalds buildings. There has been considerable public input, especially from the immediate neighbors in Garden Homes, and plans are available for viewing at the Village Hall. The Board wants your input on whether or not to facilitate this ambitious and potentially beneficial project to give the only Village skyscraper a new life.

At the other end of the Village, the Plan Commission is beginning to consider a large and very Green office building that would replace three small offices on a parking lot. The proposed building offers obvious improvements in stormwater handling, virtually eliminating runoff to the lake, and will solve parking problems in an invisible way – underground – for the Unitarian Meeting House. It will set a high environmental and architectural standard for other redevelopment along Marshall Court and give the University and hospitals much-needed office space on the Village tax roll, but the size of the project raises questions about traffic, parking and

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density along Marshall Court.

This month the Plan Commission will begin a series of extra meetings to work with our consultants, and all of you, to develop master plans for these two ends of the commercial district. In the process the Commission will try to define what the Village wants for these areas in terms of uses, density, height, distribution, traffic load and flow patterns, as well as amenities such as a bike path or pedestrian overpass to Hilldale. We look for your advice and opinions.

This month we will also begin the process to consider forming new Tax Incremental Financing (TIF) districts at the two ends of the commercial district. If approved, the funds from these districts will pay for the planning and analysis, and generally give us the resources to make sure that the Village gets the best possible results from whatever redevelopment takes place. We have had two very successful TIF districts in the Village. If we make good use of our experiences with these, the new TIF districts will continue the tradition.

Finally, with the help of the Traffic and Parks Committees, the Public Works Committee will plan the reconstruction of Oxford and Columbia Roads for the 2009 building season. As on Shorewood Boulevard and Circle Close, these will include full reconstruction of road and infrastructure, and will need the ideas and input from all who live on, walk on or otherwise care about these streets. When the weather warms up, look for the Public Works Committee to have a meeting on each of these streets to start the process.

There is more happening in the Village, including the repair and upgrade of the Village Hall, but there will be more reports on these from others now and then. Rest assured that the Village government is taking its responsibilities seriously, and please don't hesitate to e-mail, call or collar your elected representatives or Village Administrator, and do come to meetings to give us your advice.

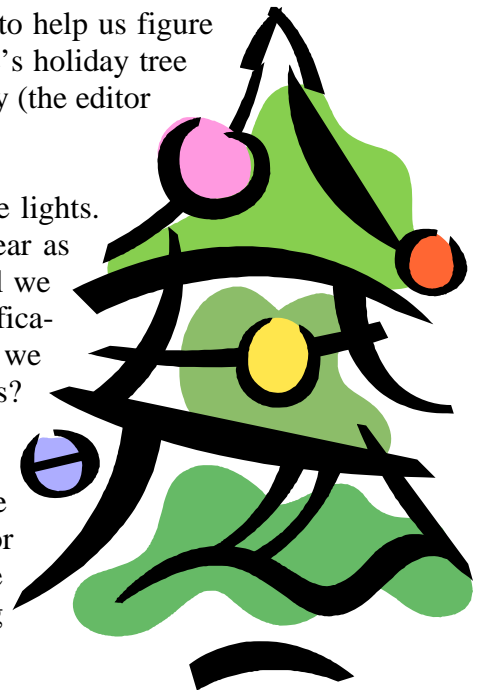
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## HELP THE HOLIDAY TREE

## *SHINING A SHIELDED LIGHT ON THE VILLAGE OUTDOOR LIGHTING ORDINANCE*

Mark Your Calendars!!! – **April 1!** – *Vote AND Be Illuminated !!*

Stop by the **Lighting Information Table** in the Village Hall lobby on the first floor. Pick up information about the Village Outdoor Lighting Ordinance, ask questions, and possibly see examples of compliant lighting fixtures!!!



By January 2009 all residential and commercial property owners in the Village will need to be in compliance. The provisions for lighting improvement included the use of fully or partially shielded lights to prevent glare and skyglow, proper positioning of shielded fixtures to prevent light trespass on neighboring properties and maximum lighting limits and light curfews.

As you look at your residence in the evening, do you see any of the following:

- Glare from your exterior lights
- Lights that cast a dark shadow onto your neighbor's property along your property line?
- Lights shining upward into the night sky?

If so, changes to consider are:

- Re-aim fixtures so that the light is directed only to the area you want illuminated
- Replace an existing lamp with one that has less wattage
- Add shields to existing fixtures to prevent glare
- Add motion sensors to all-night security lights

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## **PET LICENSES**

All dogs and cats in the Village must be licensed annually. To obtain a license, please bring your pet's rabies vaccination record to the Village Hall. If your dog or cat does not need a rabies booster, you may bring in the 2007 Village issued license tag number or your copy of the 2007 license. We can obtain the necessary information from past records.

The deadline for obtaining licenses is April 1, 2008. There is a \$5.00 late penalty after this date.

REMEMBER, even if your dog or cat is due for the rabies vaccination after the deadline, licenses must be obtained by April 1.

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## VILLAGE CAUCUS RESULTS

The annual Village Caucus was held on **Tuesday, January 22, 2008** before the regular monthly Board meeting. Incumbent Trustees Dave Benforado, Joyce Bromley and Marilyn Townsend were all nominated for another 2 year term. Frank D. Remington was also nominated to return as our Municipal Court Judge.

No other nominations were made. Each candidate was given a opportunity to address the audience after the nominations were closed.

Ms. Bromley, Ms. Townsend, Mr. Benforado and Mr. Remington will be on the ballot for the Spring Election along with other local, county and state candidates. The election will be held on Tuesday, April 1, 2008. Absentee ballots are usually available about three weeks before the election.

## ABSENTEE BALLOT INFORMATION

The Presidential Primary (February 19, 2008) and the Spring Election (April 1, 2008) are not far off. Voting by absentee ballot has never been easier. Requests to vote by absentee ballot must be done in writing. There are three ways registered voters may request an absentee ballot:

1. Complete the official form which is available at the Village Hall, on the Village's website ([www.shorewood-hills.org/forms.htm](http://www.shorewood-hills.org/forms.htm)), or by requesting that a copy of the form be mailed to you (call the Village Hall at 267-2680).
2. Send an e-mail request for an absentee ballot to the Village Clerk ([cokie@shorewood-hills.org](mailto:cokie@shorewood-hills.org)). E-mail requests require that a hard copy of the e-mail, with your signature, be forwarded to the Village Hall in person or by regular mail.
3. Send a letter requesting an absentee ballot.

Both letters and e-mails must include the following: 1) your name and voting address (clearly printed), 2) the address you wish to have the ballot sent to (it can be sent to your home or elsewhere), 3) what election date you are requesting the ballot for, and 4) your signature. If there is more than one person making a request in the same letter, both individuals must sign the letter.

A request for an absentee ballot to be mailed to you must be received by the Village staff by 5:00 pm on the Friday before the elections (February 15 / March 28 in these cases). You may vote absentee in person at the Village Hall until 5:00 pm on the Mondays (February 18 / March 31) before the elections. 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## SECOND CHANCE APARTMENT PROJECT UPDATE: DECEMBER FUND DRIVE A SUCCESS!

I am pleased and excited to inform you that the Village of Shorewood Hills' Second Chance Apartment Project December fund drive was a resounding success! During the month of December, \$2,643 was contributed to the project by Village residents and non-residents. To date, \$23,301 has been donated to the Second Chance Apartment Project. The project goal was \$20,000.

Over three weekends in December, approximately \$400 was raised as part of the Shorewood Hills' businesses "Home for the Holidays" fundraising campaign. Although the weather during this time was snowy and cold, people nevertheless turned out and contributed to the project. In addition, I was able to talk with many people—residents and non-residents—about Second Chance. I want to extend my thanks to the businesses that participated in the fundraising campaign: Janet's Antiques, Shorewood Shopping Center, Pizza Hut, and Video Station. Store managers allowed me the opportunity to set-up a table, distribute information about the Second Chance Apartment Project, and accept donations. Additionally, I want to thank Elizabeth Jane Hoopes-Barber of Janet's Antiques and Village Trustee Joyce Bromley for organizing the "Home for the Holidays" fund drive. Without their initiative, the campaign would not have happened.

Family Update: Mom and her two-year old daughter have been living in the Village-sponsored Second Chance Apartment since September 2006. The mom completed a Phlebotomy training program through MATC in December while working as a retail cashier part-time. She is now applying and interviewing for Phlebotomist jobs. During the fall, her mentor helped her learn to drive and she passed her test in December. Mom now hopes to obtain a reliable car so that she no longer has to rely on the bus for transportation. Her daughter has grown and changed so much over the past year. She is learning to talk and becoming potty-trained. She has also been able to start attending a quality day care program and has benefited from interactions with other children her own age. Mom has demonstrated good money management skills and has been able to pay off old bills to telephone and cable companies as well as an old balance from a bank. Because of these efforts, mom was able to open a checking account.

All of this would not have been possible without your support for the Second Chance Apartment Project. I want to thank you, the Shorewood Hills community, for your generous support for this initiative. 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## BLACKHAWK COUNTRY CLUB WINTER PRIVILEGES

The winter season is a slow time for the Blackhawk Country Club. The lease agreement with the Village allows residents certain entitlements with respect to the use of the Blackhawk Country Club Clubhouse and the surrounding grounds. Some of the uses permitted under the lease include the following:

- **Social Membership Privilege** – Residents may apply for a social membership in the Club with the customary initiation fee waived.
- **Restaurant and Bar** – Village residents dine at the Club's restaurant and bar during the months of January, February and March. Dining is on a cash basis without any dues or additional fees other than a 17% service charge which is added to each bill\*\*. Reservations are required.
- **Winter Sports** – Residents may use the grounds for winter sports from December 1 to April 1. In addition, the bar and lounge area facilities are available for use by residents who may be engaged in winter sports activities on the club grounds on Saturday and Sunday afternoons during the winter months between the hours of 12:00 noon and 5:00 pm.

\*\* There was also a mistake in the last *Bulletin* regarding the 17% service charge on all Country Club bar and dining room bills. The 17% service charge **DOES** include the customary tip.

## RES-Q-ME TOOL

In December, a tragic fire occurred in Luxemburg, WI, in a minivan occupied by six young children. Two died as a result of the fire and the other four children suffered injuries, including burns.

This tragedy hit close to home for many in the Village since one of the young children to die in the fire, Amelia DeMeuse, the granddaughter of Tom DeMeuse, our recently retired Fire Chief / EMS Director. Amelia was only nine months old.

The fire and smoke caused the injuries and deaths. A contributing factor however was the difficulty of removing the children from their car seats. The would-be rescuers were not able to get all the children out of the minivan before the fire forced them back. The child seats were *properly* installed but, as any parent can tell you, it takes time to strap the seats in or take them out of the vehicle.

The Shorewood Hills Fire Department and EMS would like to honor Amelia by facilitating the purchase and delivery of a simple tool that can be used in emergencies to break window glass and cut seatbelts. Perhaps a similar situation can be averted in the future if the tool described below or something similar is immediately available.

The device, called **Res-Q-Me** (*shown to the right*) is a small tool that can be placed on a key chain. It can be easily removed to cut a seat belt or break a tempered safety glass window (normally the side and rear windows in passenger cars or trucks) using the self contained knife blade or spring loaded punch.

### Res-Q-Me Features and Specifications:

- Intended to be placed with your car keys

### PARKING PERMIT REMINDER

Residents are reminded to stop by the Police Department and get a **2008 Village Parking Permit** sticker. Every street in the Village is in a one- or two-hour restricted parking district.

The only way to avoid a ticket is to have a parking permit. The first sticker per household is free. There is a \$5.00 administrative fee for each additional stickers.

### PLASTIC NEWSPAPER STICK-ON ADS

You may have noticed plastic stick-on ads on the front page of you newspaper. These ads hurt the recycling effort and can reduce the revenue paid for old newspapers.

The ads used today have adhesive on the entire back surface and are made of a plastic that cannot be ripped. They will jam the screens of the paper mill if left on the newspaper for recycling.

## TEST YOUR GFCIS

Underwriters Laboratories (UL) is advising consumers to test your ground fault circuit interrupters (GFCIs). In a statement from November 30, 2007 - UL reported that testing of samples obtained from both the marketplace and several manufacturers indicates that some GFCI units do not meet all current UL requirements and, under rare conditions, may not trip when a fault is present, resulting in a loss of protection from electric shock. GFCIs look like duplex electrical receptacles, but are distinguished by their "Reset" and "Test" buttons.

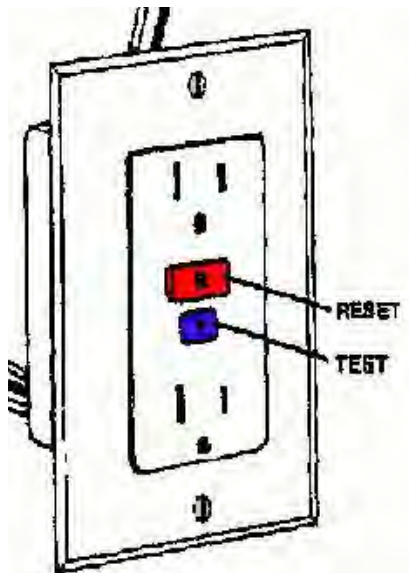
While GFCIs provide an effective means for protecting against electric shock, UL recommends that they be tested regularly to verify they are operating properly by using the self-test feature that is built into the device. UL encourages users to test and monitor their GFCIs monthly by following the steps described below:

- Push the "Reset" button located on the GFCI receptacle first to assure normal GFCI operation.
- Plug a product (such as a hair dryer or clock radio) into the GFCI receptacle and turn the product "ON."
- Push the "Test" button located on the GFCI receptacle. The appliance should go "OFF."
- Push the "Reset" button, again. The appliance should go "ON" again.
- Repeat this test with the appliance plugged into a receptacle marked "GFCI Protected" in close proximity to the GFCI receptacle. Push the "Test" button again and the appliance should go off.

In addition to the monthly test, UL recommends that GFCIs installed in environments with both sustained high temperatures (greater than 90° F) AND high humidity (greater than 93% relative humidity) be tested with greater frequency. These environments may include some bathrooms and indoor pool areas.

UL recommends that the GFCI be replaced by a qualified electrician if:

- The appliance plugged into the GFCI remains "ON" when the "Test" button is pushed.
- The GFCI does not reset when the "Reset" button is pushed.
- The GFCI performs its intended function, but trips repeatedly during normal use (this may indicate either a faulty appliance or a compromised GFCI. In either case, replacement of the GFCI is recommended and the appliance should be checked for proper operation prior to reuse).
- Finally, with all GFCIs, it is important that consumers not use the unit's "Test" and "Reset" buttons as an ON-OFF switch for appliances plugged in to the GFCI.

## CARBON MONOXIDE

Often called the silent killer, carbon monoxide is an invisible, odorless, colorless gas created when fuels (such as gasoline, wood, coal, natural gas, propane, oil, and methane) burn incompletely. In the home, heating and cooking equipment that burn these fuels are potential sources of carbon monoxide. Vehicles or generators running in an attached garage can also produce dangerous levels of carbon monoxide.

The Fire Department carries specialized equipment for measuring carbon monoxide (CO) in the air. We would like to remind you of the following safety tips from the National Fire Protection Agency regarding CO:

### **Inside the Home:**

- Install CO alarms inside your home to provide early warning of accumulating carbon monoxide. CO alarms should be installed in a central location outside each separate sleeping area. If bedrooms are spaced apart, each area will need a CO alarm. The alarms should be labeled with a recognized testing laboratory symbol (like UL or FM).
- Test CO alarms at least once a month and replace CO alarms according to the manufacturer's instructions.
- Review the instructions that came with your CO alarm and understand the difference between the CO alarm tone and the low battery warning tone.
- CO alarms are not substitutes for smoke alarms. Know the difference between the sound of smoke alarms and CO alarms.
- Have fuel-burning heating equipment (fireplaces, furnaces, water heaters, wood / coal stoves, space heaters or portable heaters) and chimneys inspected by a professional every year before cold weather sets in.
- When purchasing new heating and cooking equipment, select products tested and labeled by a recognized testing laboratory (like UL or FM).
- When using a fireplace, open the flue for adequate ventilation.
- ***Never use your oven to heat your home.***
- When buying an existing home, have a qualified technician evaluate the integrity of the heating and cooking systems, as well as the sealed spaces between the garage and house.

### **Outside the Home:**

- If you need to warm a vehicle, remove it from the garage immediately after starting it. Do not run a vehicle, generator, or other fueled engine or motor indoors, even if your garage doors are open. Make sure the exhaust pipe of a running vehicle is not covered with snow.
- Generators should be operated in well-ventilated locations outside away from all doors, windows and vent openings.
- During and after a snowstorm, make sure vents for the dryer, furnace, stove, and fireplace are clear of snow build-up.
- Only use barbecue grills – which can produce CO – outside. Never use them in the home, garage or near building openings.
- When camping, remember to use battery-powered lights in tents trailers, and motor homes.

### **If your CO Alarm Activates:**

- Immediately move to a fresh air location outdoors or by an open window or door, and call 9-1-1 for help. Stay at the fresh air location until emergency personnel determine the problem and allow you back inside.
- If the audible trouble signal sounds, check for low batteries or other trouble indicators. Refer to your owner's manual for information on the difference between the CO alarm and low battery alarm.
- Once the Fire Department determines the source of the CO, it is your responsibility to contact a qualified service contractor to repair the problem equipment.

Home Concepts will also recycle corrugated cardboard and compact fluorescents bulbs. Dane County's Recycling Manager is encouraging additional firms (such as retailers) to purchase this type of equipment to expand the marketing options for recyclables in Dane County.

The Dane County recycling directory ([www.countyofdane.com/pwht/recycling.aspx](http://www.countyofdane.com/pwht/recycling.aspx)) has listings for companies that recycle appliances, cell phones, computers, and for the first time, old carpet. Click on the [Recycling Locations](#) link for a complete listing.

Finally, the opportunities for recycling compact fluorescents (CFLs) has greatly increased in Dane County, as Copps and Pick'N Save stores have just begun a "Take Back" program. There is no charge to their customers for taking back CFLs. The Dane County Council on Recycling is working hard to get other grocery stores and drug stores that sell CFLs to take them back.

- **New Horizon Elm (\$44.00 per 1.25" caliper tree):** Resistant to Dutch elm disease. A fast growing tree that tolerates a wide range of growing conditions. 55' tall by 45' wide.

### SMALL TREES

- **"Mary Potter" Crab (\$86.40 per 1.5" caliper tree):** A beautiful crabapple tree with white flowers and red buds. Birds love the red fruit. A more horizontal, low spreading tree. 10' tall by 15' wide.
- **Autumn Brilliance Serviceberry (\$82.00 per 1.25" caliper tree):** A great multi-season interest tree. Showing white flowers in early spring followed by edible purplish fruit. Birds love. 20' tall by 15' wide.
- **Redbud "Columbus strain" (\$93.00 per 5' tree):** Very attractive tree whose branches are covered with masses of lavender flowers in the spring. Heart shaped leaves turn yellow in the fall. 20' tall by 15' wide.
- **Washington Hawthorn (\$87.00 per 6' tall tree):** Has lustrous, dark green foliage, white flowers in June, followed by orange-red fruit in the fall. Birds love the fruit that hangs on into the winter. Thorns make safe haven for bird nests. 30' tall by 20' wide.

### EVERGREENS

- **White Pine (\$96.00 per 5' tree):** Fast growing, shade tolerant, 50-80' tall.
- **Black Hills Spruce (\$83.00 per 4' tree):** Dense blue-green, disease resistant, 35-40'.
- **Iowa Juniper (\$69.00 per 5' tree):** Nice berries, blue-green needles, 15' tall x 8'.
- **Arborvitae (\$57.00 per 5' tree):** Good screen, full sun to part shade, 15-18' tall.
- **Douglas Fir (\$96.00 per 5' tree):** Beautiful tall, rapid growing tree. 40-60'.
