WHAT'S UP WITH POST FARM PARK (AND THE COMMUNITY CENTER)?

The Village has received some inquiries from residents on Swarthmore Court with concerns about what is going on in the Post Farm Park area, Community Center and the Pool. This article should provide some information that will be of interest to all residents.

The Village had the entire area surveyed to determine property boundaries, especially as they relate to the railroad right of way. There were two main reasons for this survey:

First, the Village is exploring the possibility of constructing a separate pedestrian and bike path starting at Columbia Road on the south side of Purdue Street into the pool area to improve safety. The survey stakes generally are at property lines and reflect the edge of the Village street right of way. People are sometimes surprised at how wide the Village right of way is. A typical Village paved portion of street may be about 30 feet wide, but in most cases the right of way is 60 feet. That means that if the street is centered in the right of way (often not the case) the Village owns fifteen feet more on each side beyond the paved portion of street. There are no plans at this time to widen Swarthmore Court or install sidewalks. Any such change would include input

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE JULY 19, 2010 MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

(Complete detailed minutes will be available on our website or at the Village Hall)

Attendance – All trustees were in attendance when Mr. Hurley arrived at 7:53 pm.

Consent Agenda – In an effort to expedite meetings, items on the consent agenda are considered as a group and are adopted with one motion. Any Board member may unilaterally remove an item from the consent agenda if he or she believes the item needs discussion. Consent agenda items included approval of three operator's licenses.

Board Minutes – The [June 21, 2010](#) Board meeting minutes were taken off the Consent Agenda to correct some typographical mistakes. Staff was directed to check the audio tape to make sure the correct percentages were included in the discussion of the Build America Bonds.

Deny Sewer Backup Claim – The Board unanimously approved to deny a sewer backup claim for a property on Wellesley Road based on a recommendation by the Village's insurance adjuster. The Village often denies similar claims as a catalyst to move the process forward. The prompt denial allows the homeowner to claim the damage on their insurance. The Village's insurance will pay costs incurred by the property owner that are not covered by his or her homeowner's insurance.

Purchase of Speed Boards – Based on the data obtained from the loaner speed board and a recommendation by the Traffic / Public Works Committee, the Board unanimously approved the purchase of four speed boards from All Traffic Solutions in the amount of \$16,348. The speed boards will be placed on sign posts in both directions on University Bay Drive and Lake Mendota Drive. The speed boards are solar powered and continually collect traffic data. They are also relatively easy to relocate should the need arise for a speed board in another area of the Village.



Ethics Code – The Board continued to discuss possible changes to the process to resolve potential conflicts of interest under the Village's Ethic Code.

Dane County Radio System Project – EMS / Fire Chief Anderson gave the Board an update on the status of the county's radio system upgrade project and how it could affect the Village's emergency services.

Plan Commission – Mr. Sundquist reported that the Plan Commission was presented with a new plan for Pyare Square property for its consideration. The tower would be remodeled for residential use and 2 four-story apartment buildings would be constructed on the property. Also at its last meeting, the Plan Commission was presented with the Multifamily Residential Data Compilation & Analysis prepared by Vierbicher. The study, commissioned by the Village, should assist the Plan Commission and Board when evaluating proposed projects.

Traffic / Public Works Committees – Ms. Center reported on a new policy for handling traffic complaints. The initial focus would be on problem solving by the Administrator and Police Chief before the issue was brought to the Committees.

Closed Session – The Board went into closed session to discuss leave, benefit and employment matters concerning a Village Employee.

Adjourn – The meeting adjourned at 9:30 pm.

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from the neighborhood.

The Village is also exploring the possibility of rerouting the bike path so that it continues behind the pool and tennis courts to connect to Marshall Court. It is understood that there are issues that will need to be adequately addressed before any ideas move forward, such as removal of some of the natural flora in the area. The arborvitae and other trees create a nice backdrop for the pool, provide noise and visual barriers and is generally pretty to look at. However there may be acceptable mitigating measures that can be taken.

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A second reason for the survey is related to possible rerouting of traffic into and out of the Pool and Community Center. The Village Engineer, staff and committees have been working on alternatives to alleviate traffic congestion on Columbia Road, Swarthmore Court and Harvard Drive. One possible option is to make Marshall Court the main access point to the Pool and Community Center and create parking on the east side of Post Farm Park. Two-thirds of our pool members are non-residents. They may find an entrance off of Marshall Court more convenient. It would likely reduce traffic through the neighborhood dramatically.

The Board has made it clear that any major expansion of the Community Center or Pool is predicated on solutions to traffic congestion and parking on neighborhood streets. This policy choice came out of a meeting about a year ago that all Village residents in the area were invited (via a direct mailing) to attend. Traffic and parking were major concerns brought forward by residents.

The Village is also embarking on a study of the Community Center and possible renovations to it. The building is not handicap accessible, the bathrooms and kitchen are inadequate for the intended uses and the interior is dated. As said above, any major expansion will have to also provide solution to traffic problems. Most Village committees (including Parks, Services, Traffic, Public Works, Pool, and Plan Commission) are being consulted in this process. Be assured that as soon as base data is developed, a series of public meetings will be scheduled to gain community-wide input.

Prior to any potential major remodeling, it is possible that minor work could occur, such as installation of an elevator. Fairly often there are more public meetings or attendees than can be accommodated comfortably in the Village Hall's meeting rooms. The Community Center would be a useful place for overflow or highly attended meetings but the second floor does not meet ADA accessibility requirements. It is not legal to conduct governmental meetings in an inaccessible location.

Swarthmore Court is scheduled to be reconstructed in 2012. But that project is not set in stone. The road reconstruction projects have moved forward or backward on the schedule as needed if a street deteriorates rapidly or, like this year, when Columbia Road was delayed to allow for final approval of a Safe Routes to School grant and University Bay Drive was substituted. As we get closer to the initial design phase, the Public Works and Traffic Committee will schedule public input meetings with residents in the Swarthmore Court neighborhood. The committees want to hear your input on design, stormwater runoff, traffic, noise, etc. The committees typically walk the street with the neighborhood residents and then sit down at the Village Hall to discuss their initial thoughts. Then an initial design is generated followed by another meeting with residents to go over that design and gain more input. After that, the design is revised in order to address as many concerns as possible. It then finally goes to the Board for approval.

Residents are encouraged to contact the Village Hall or their Trustees if they have concerns or hear rumors about changes to their neighborhood. Often the rumors are just that.

DANE CO RTA MEETING AT THE VILLAGE HALL

On Wednesday, August 25, 2010, Shorewood Hills will be hosting the Dane County Regional Transit Authority board meeting at 5:00 pm at the Village Hall. The RTA was created by the Dane County Board in 2009 to oversee the proposed construction of a 16-mile commuter rail network through the Madison area. The RTA has said its long-term strategic vision will be guided by the Transport 2020 report (<http://www.transport2020.net/>).

One of the issues discussed at a recent Dane County Board meeting was regarding a November 2 referendum to gauge support for increasing the County's sales tax to fund the RTA. At the August 25 meeting, Village residents and other interested parties would be allowed to provide input on this and other issues related to the RTA (*comments will be limited to 3 minutes*).

FOURTH OF JULY IN REVIEW

After a week of perfect weather the forecast for the 4th of July was a little iffy (“iffy”—it was down right awful), but the day’s festivities came off with some worries, but no real problems. I would like to believe that we planned the sprinkles to begin just as we lit the fireworks finale; but, although we are good, we aren’t that good! ☺

As always, it takes a lot of folks to make sure that the Village’s annual 4th of July celebration is successful. The people on the front line are the folks at the Village Hall and the Fire Station. David Sykes coordinates all of the activities from preparation and set-up through clean-up so that nothing falls through the cracks. Others involved include Fire Chief Keith Anderson and the Fire Department Interns, Police Chief Denny Pine and his officers, Karl Frantz and the Village office staff, and Denny Lybeck and the Public Works crew. Their work on 4th of July activities goes on for weeks before and after the actual celebration. The Shorewood Hills Community League once again organized a very successful bake sale and arranged to provide frozen treats for everyone following the Parade. A number of Village artisans once again displayed their talents at the Art Fair coordinated by Bill Muehl and Peter Hans. We certainly have some talented residents, and

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U-AVE RECONSTRUCTION UPDATE

By the time this issue goes to print, the Shorewood Boulevard intersection will be open again and the intersection at Midvale Boulevard and Rose Place is, or will soon be, closed. Midvale / Rose is scheduled to be closed for 15 days starting July 27. If they indeed start on the 27th then the intersection will be closed through August 10. Shorewood Boulevard will be the only signalized intersection where vehicles will be able to take a left turn in either direction. A left turn lane for eastbound traffic has been installed at the Joyce Erdman Place intersection. This turn lane will not be signalized and may only have room for a few cars to queue up to make the turn.

Shortly after Midvale / Rose is reopened, crews will be putting down temporary asphalt and working towards shifting traffic to the north side of University Avenue. The next stage of construction will be to install new water, sewer, stormwater and road bed along the south side of University Avenue. Then traffic will be shifted to the outer lanes so that the medians and center lanes can be rebuilt. The final stages should take less time than the initial stage when the stormwater box culvert was being installed, but the project is still expected to continue into October.

UBD RECONSTRUCTION UPDATE

Reconstruction of University Bay Drive is creeping towards completion. Construction crews have finished the underground work and a new subcontractor has started preparations for installation of curb, gutter and asphalt.

The road remains closed to through traffic. Only residents who live in the 1100 or 1200 blocks of University Bay Drive are being allowed into the construction area. The Colgate Road and Oxford Road intersections are not part of the project and remain open to traffic.

The scheduled completion date is August 31.

One final reminder on the fireworks. Each year there are larger and fancier fireworks for sale to the general public, and each year there are tragic accidents involving fireworks. Remember that, while bigger fireworks items are much more 'awesome', they are also more dangerous. Many of us on the Fire Department have 20 or more years of training and experience, and we are very careful in what we do (much more so than the average person is likely to be), but those years of experience just minimize the risk of an accident. There is always a potential for problems; and the bigger the fireworks, the bigger the potential danger. Please exercise great care with fireworks if you choose to use them.

JUNE JUMP IN LYME CASES RAISES CONCERN

Lyme Disease Prevention is a Simple Mix of Attention & Protection

Recent data analysis by Public Health Madison and Dane County (PHMDC) shows a marked increase in cases of Lyme disease in Dane County between April and June. Between April and May, the reported cases went from 4 to 8. By June, there were 35 reported cases. While increases between May and June are normal, last June there were only 17 cases reported, making the current jump somewhat more significant.

The good news is that there are a few basic steps you can take to minimize your risk of exposure. Exposure comes in the form of the bite of a deer tick (a very small, hard to see bug) that is all too common everywhere in Wisconsin. These poppy seed sized ticks carry the bacteria that cause Lyme disease, which can be serious if undetected and untreated.

Following these steps will help reduce the risk of a tick bite:

- Wear long pants and long sleeves when picnicking or walking in tall grasses or forests.
- Always use an effective insect repellent.
- Always check yourself, or have a family member check you for ticks after being outdoors, paying special attention to the head, scalp, armpit, groin and area behind the knee (don't forget to check your pets as well). It is important to know that the tick has to be attached for 24 hours to transmit the disease, so these timely checks are really important.

If you do find a tick, use thin bladed tweezers to slowly remove it. Folk remedies like petroleum jelly, nail polish remover or burning matches DO NOT WORK and are not safe.

The symptoms of Lyme disease can be fever, headache, chills, pain in the muscles or joints, enlarged lymph nodes, or facial paralysis. A "bull's eye" rash often appears at the bite area between 3 and 30 days after a bite. The disease is treatable with antibiotics and should be treated as soon as possible.

WET WEATHER MEANS MORE MOSQUITOES (*Avoiding bites and enjoying the outdoors*)

[Taken from PHMDC press release in June] The mosquito season in Dane County started this past May but mosquito activity has been relatively low until now. Recent rainfall has spurred the emergence of an extra large crop of pesky mosquitoes that are causing problems in many parts of Dane County. The majority of the mosquitoes that are pestering us are the floodwater mosquitoes, which generally don't carry disease such as West Nile virus but can be a significant deterrent to our enjoyment of the many outdoor activities in Madison and Dane County.

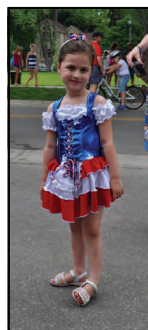
The best way to protect yourself from mosquito bites is by keeping mosquitoes out of your house, wearing long pants and long sleeves while outside, and using a repellent that contains Deet, Picaridin (KBR3023), or oil of lemon eucalyptus. The US Environmental Protection Agency has a new tool to help pick the repellent that may work best for you. The tool can be found at: <http://cfpub.epa.gov/oppref/insect/index.cfm#searchform>

While we cannot completely exclude mosquitoes from our outdoor activities, you can reduce their presence by eliminating standing water on your property that can provide excellent locations for mosquitoes to lay their eggs. These small stagnant water sources around our homes are especially attractive to the Culex mosquitoes that are most likely to be carrying West Nile virus in our area. To decrease your property's chance of being a mosquito nursery:

- Clean out clogged rain gutters,
- Change the water in birdbaths, wading pools, and pet water dishes at least every three to four days,
- Properly dispose of old tires, see the Recyclopedia for more information: <http://www.cityofmadison.com/streets/documents/recyclopedia.pdf>
- Make sure that items on your property (boats, pool covers, pots, bird baths, etc) do not hold water for more than 3-4 days.
