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SHOREWOOD HILLS POLICE DEPARTMENT NEWS

After hour non-emergency Police calls

The Shorewood Hills Police Department (SHPD) will be changing the way non-emergency calls to the SHPD office are answered after regular business hours. Right now, an after-hours call to the Police Department (267-1110) rings in its office three times, it then rings over to the Fire Station where our Fire-EMS Interns answer the call. Starting October 15, 2010 those non-emergency calls (on weekends and after 5:00 pm on Monday through Friday) will be transferred to the Dane County Communications Center's Public Safety Communications Non-emergency Line. The PSC line has an auto-attendant which will promptly answer, greet and assist callers to reach the appropriate party. *For example, if you would like to speak with the on-duty Shorewood Hills police officer, select that prompt. Your call will be transferred to a live person who will take your information and relay it to the on-duty SHPD officer.*

In a true emergency – CALL 9-1-1

For all other Village business, please call the Administrative Office line 267-2680. During non-business hours, our Fire / EMS Interns answer these calls. Thank you – Chief Dennis Pine

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE SEPTEMBER 20, 2010 MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

(Complete detailed minutes will be available on our website or at the Village Hall)

Attendance – Mr. Hurley was excused.

Appearances and Communications – Gary Johnson reported on the Fourth of July Fireworks. His report included a financial summary of donations and final cost to the Village and Blackhawk Country Club, which split the remaining cost of the fireworks display. He also demonstrated a new, safer, electronic firing system for the fireworks.

Consent Agenda – In an effort to expedite meetings, items on the consent agenda are considered as a group and are adopted with one motion. Any Board member may unilaterally remove an item from the consent agenda if he or she believes the item needs discussion. Consent agenda items included approval of the August 16, 2010 regular Board meeting minutes and special meeting minutes from August 23, 2010; Operator's licenses; a Block Party permit for 914 Cornell Court; and, a Temporary "Class B" liquor license for the First Unitarian Society.

October Board Meeting Time – The Board unanimously approved changing the October meeting time to 6:30 pm, from the usual 7:00 pm start, to facilitate discussion of the Community Center project with Village committees and the architect, The Kubala Washatko Architects, Inc. (*see article on page 4*).

Resolution R-2010-17 – The Board unanimously approved [resolution R-2010-17](#) endorsing the proposed Dane County Interoperability Radio System project. The Board had previously gone on record supporting the project but since that time there have been significant changes. The project as proposed would still allow the Village to utilize radios already purchased with grant money.

Claim of Conflict of Interest – The Trustee responses to Mr. Ridders' claim of conflict of interest were submitted into the record. The claim relates to Trustees who are members of the pool voting on the hiring of summer staff. Mr. Ridders stated he would review the responses and continue along the procedure for handling conflicts with the Village's Ethics Code.

Pool Liner Project – Ms. Center summarized the Pool Committee's meeting with a reps from Renosys Corp regarding extending the new pool liner to cover the caulk line between the pool walls and gutter system. The addition of a stainless steel "skirt" would make the liner and gutter system virtually one unit and require little ongoing maintenance. The project was originally budgeted at \$125,000 and \$90,000 was spent on the original liner installation. Extending the liner and installation of the stainless steel strip to cover the caulk line was quoted at \$24,000. The new liner has been well received. The Board unanimously approved the expenditure. The Village borrows money for these types of improvement projects and the Pool, as a separate enterprise fund, will pay back the loan over time as part of its regular operating budget.

Tree Planting on University Avenue – The Board unanimously approved \$10,000 this fall (and possibly more money next spring) for a tree planting project to add new trees and replace trees removed or damaged

due to road construction along University Avenue. There are also quite a few ash trees along the Avenue that will probably succumb to the emerald ash borer in the future. The projects specifies planting 60 trees on the north side of University Avenue from University Bay Drive to Segoe Road that would help beautify the busy transportation corridor and in the future provide a canopy to reduce heat island effects. The quote for the entire project was \$20,000 which includes planting, a watering program and one year tree guarantee. The project is eligible to be paid for by TID funding and there is a possibility of a 50% matching grant for the

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spring planting.

Finance Committee – Mr. Benforado reviewed the preliminary budget submitted to the Finance Committee, discussed the refinement process and the schedule of upcoming meetings. He asked Trustees, if their committees have any specific funding requests, that they get those requests to Mr. Frantz as soon as possible, so that they can be considered before the next Board meeting.

Plan Commission – Mr. Sundquist gave an update on the certified survey map (CSM) / lot splitting issue on Beloit Court. A recorded agreement between area residents, to which the Village is not a party, to not split the lots in the area was brought to the Commission's attention. But, it appears a lot in that area was previously split without any complaint. No action has been taken so far so that staff can investigate the situation further. The new property owner agreed to waive the 60 day limit for the Village to act on the CSM.

Traffic / Public Works Committees – Ms. Center reported that the Committees have been looking at the Bike-Walking Path between Shorewood Boulevard and Marshall Court. There is no consensus at this time for the area east of Swarthmore Court so the Committee is focusing on the area along Purdue Street. On October 4, 2010 the Committee will meet with residents on-site to discuss the 2011 reconstruction of Colgate and Yale Roads (*see article on page 4*).

Adjourn – The meeting was adjourned at 8:56 pm.

NOVEMBER 2 ELECTION

The Fall General Election will be held on Tuesday, November 2, 2010. Residents may cast their votes on Election Day from 7:00 am to 8:00 pm in the basement meeting room at the Village Hall, 810 Shorewood Boulevard.

Residents are reminded that all voters must be registered in their municipality BEFORE being able to cast their ballot. If you have not already done so, you may register to vote at the Village Hall during regular business hours. You may register on Election Day too but be prepared to spend more time at the polls. Your Wisconsin driver's license or DOT-issued ID is required to register. Bring additional proof of your Village residence if your Shorewood Hills address is not listed on your license or ID (a bank statement, pay stub, utility bill, etc. with the Shorewood Hills address printed will suffice).

The Village should receive ballots on, or about, October 4. Residents may vote absentee soon-after the ballots arrive. For more information on absentee voting go to http://www.shorewood-hills.org/departments/admin/absentee_ballot_info.htm or contact the Village Hall.

NO DECEMBER BULLETIN

FUTURE PLANS FOR THE COMMUNITY CENTER AND POST FARM PARK

On Monday, October 18, 2010 at 7:00 pm the Village Board of Trustees and Ad hoc Community Center Committee will meet with The Kubala Washatko Architects, Inc (TKWA) consultants hired to facilitate possible Community Center renovations and changes to the Post Farm Park area.

TKWA has developed a document they refer to as "Patterns" that summarizes a questionnaire filled out by the Board of Trustees, Plan Commission, Traffic, Parks, Public Works, Pool, Services and Recreation Committees. The questionnaire helped TKWA gain knowledge of the many issues, needs and concerns that would be involved in a project of this sort. TKWA also developed a preliminary program for the project. The Patterns and project program are what will be discussed at the meeting. Residents interested in this project are encouraged to attend this meeting and get involved. PUBLIC INFORMATION MEETING *Colgate and Yale Roads Reconstruction*

In 2011 the Village plans to reconstruct Colgate and Yale Roads (and a portion of Columbia Road). The project will include water main replacement, repairs to segments of sanitary sewer, stormwater improvements and new pavement. Over the past few years, the Village's Public Works / Traffic Committees has solicited resident input as the project goes into the design phase, prior to it being recommended to the Board of Trustees.

On October 4, 2010 at 6:00 pm, residents are invited to join in an on-site walk of the affected streets and a subsequent meeting at the Village Hall. The Village Engineer, Brian Berquist, will lead the walk and present preliminary plans for review and comment. We will meet at the intersection of Colgate Road and University Bay Drive, work our way to Yale Road and Harvard Drive, and then reconvene at the Village Hall. Columbia Road between Harvard Drive and Dartmouth Road was originally going to be reconstructed in 2010 and has already gone through the on-site meeting and design phase.

Resident involvement is vital to the success of this project. We hope to see you at Colgate and UBD on the October 4.

U-AVE RECONSTRUCTION UPDATE

This complicated project has been moving along. It has been a bit of a surprise to see more traffic delays now that the work has been shifted to the south side of the roadway. Limited access to right turn lanes at Segoe Road and Midvale Boulevard has been more challenging than first thought. But, we should be able to see light at the end of the tunnel. The project is scheduled to be completed by October 30, 2010.

The next traffic lane shift is expected on, or about, October 8. Westbound traffic will remain where it is. Eastbound traffic will be moved to the new completed south side of the roadway. Crews will then work on the medians in the center section.

Prior to shifting the eastbound traffic to the south side of the avenue, there will be significant road work done at the Midvale Boulevard intersection. Expect closures and detours for short and long periods of time between September 27 and October 5.

The Village will continue to send out informational "blast" e-mails when appropriate to residents and interested parties on our e-mail distribution lists. The Village's Public Works Department has made a great effort to change out all residential and commercial water meters in the Village over the past few months. This is one of the many Villages services provided to you. There is no charge for the upgrade. It should improve water read accuracy and be much more convenient for you and the Crew.

These meters, typically located in your basement, have radio-read technology and can be read remotely. That means Department of Public Works crew members won't have to enter your house to read meters any longer.



But, we still have a few meters left to install. If you haven't had your water meter changed yet, please contact Karla at the Village Hall **today**. It only takes about 10-15 minutes to change out the water meter.

COMMUNITY GARDENS CLOSING SOON

The weather is turning cool and the Community Gardens will be closing soon. As a rule, we try to keep the gardens open as long as possible. The normal procedure is to officially close them up one week after the first hard frost or October 15 (whichever occurs later) so that the Village Crew can shut the water off, mow and prepare for the winter. When the closing date becomes certain an e-mail will be sent out to registered gardeners.

Please note that as gardeners, we are required to remove ALL non-organic material from the annual plots. This includes lumber, fencing, plastic mulch, stakes, carpet pieces, etc. If the Village Crew has to clean up a plot, the individual gardener will be charged.

As always, thank you for your cooperation. Special thanks to the Garden Committee and to the Village Crew for providing everything from water to manure throughout the season. You may have noticed that Bob Gerber planted and beautified the area around the compost bins at the head of the garden.

Please enjoy the harvest and the fruits of your labor until closing, and please consider donating what you can't use to the food bank. An e-mail will be sent out shortly to explain how you can participate without any effort on your part in this valuable endeavor.

DANE COUNTY CLEAN SWEEP CLOSING

The Household Hazardous Waste Program (also known as Clean Sweep) provides an opportunity for homeowners of Dane County to safely dispose of hazardous waste, free of charge. But the collection season is coming to a close on Saturday, October 30, 2010. It will open again in May next year.

The Clean Sweep site (located in Madison at 2302 Fish Hatchery Road behind the Dane County Highway Garage) is open every Tuesday, Wednesday, Friday, and Saturday from 7:30 am to 2:00 pm. When you bring in a load, products and materials should be packaged to keep them from spilling or breaking on the way. Leave materials in their original containers. FIRE DEPARTMENT CAR WASH FUNDRAISER

The Shorewood Hills Volunteer Fire Department Association will be conducting its annual Car Wash fundraiser on Saturday, October 2, 2010 from 10:00 am to 1:00 pm in front of the Fire Station. Our mailing should have arrived recently. The Fire Department Car Wash is held each year around the time of Fire Prevention Week (October 3-9). The Fire Department takes this opportunity to increase fire safety awareness and solicit donations that support our non-firefighting activities throughout the year.

The focus of Fire Prevention Week this year is **“Smoke Alarms: A Sound You Can Live With!”** Our fundraiser mailing included some smoke detector safety tips. During October we will be visiting with area pre-schools, nursery schools and kindergarten classes to spread the fire safety message. If we talk to one of your children, please encourage their enthusiasm for fire safety by helping them check the batteries in your smoke detectors.



The Fire Department provides more than just emergency services when needed. We feel like we are a part of the Shorewood Hills community. The money raised during the Car Wash allows the Fire Department Association to put on the Fourth of July Dance, parade, games and other activities (donations collected on July 4th go exclusively toward the cost of the Fireworks show). The Fire Department Association also uses this money for upkeep and maintenance on our 1929 Mack Fire Engine. Unfortunately, after a number of years without any major problems, “The Mack” needs a significant exhaust system repair before next season. The Fire Department Association, when able, commits to a community improvement project. Through volunteer hours and financial investment, we have made extensive repairs and improvements to the 4 Corners Park over the years.

COMPUTER & ELECTRONICS RECYCLING

Recycling your e-waste (electronic waste) is one of the topics getting attention in the media lately. The Village’s Services Committee, in conjunction with the Fire Department Association, has been helping resident e-cycle for years by sponsoring the Autumn (and Spring) Recycling Roundups.

Residents of the Village may dispose of their old computers, monitors, TVs, radios or other small home electronics by bringing them to the Fire Station on Saturday, October 2, 2010 between 10:00 am and 1:00 pm (same date and time as the Fire Department’s Annual Car Wash Fundraiser). Look for the green Public Works truck at south end of the Fire Station parking lot.

You can help keep potentially damaging materials out of the landfills. Our recycling partner, Resource Solution Corporation, will take most household electronics at no fee. But, due to the special requirements to recycle picture tubes and a few other items, there may be a modest pass-through cost charged for certain things.

MAKE A CHANGE FOR FIRE SAFETY

Smoke detectors are your first alert in the event of a fire. Dead batteries in smoke detectors can be a serious problem. Fire safety experts recommend changing the batteries in your smoke detectors annually. To remind you of this chore, Energizer® batteries and the International Association of Fire Chiefs (IAFC), came up with the **Change Your Clocks, Change Your Batteries** promotion. At daylight savings time (November 7), when you change your clocks, also change the batteries in your smoke detectors.

How safe is your household? Below are some simple things you can do to protect your family:

1. **Count Your Smoke Alarms** – Be sure there is at least one smoke alarm installed on every level of your home, including one in every bedroom and outside of each sleeping area.
2. **Change Your Smoke Alarm and Carbon Monoxide Detector Batteries** – It only takes a moment, but this simple habit is the best defense your family has against the devastating effects of a home fire or accidental carbon monoxide poisoning. The IAFC and fire experts nationwide encourage people to change smoke alarm and carbon monoxide detector batteries at least annually. An easy way to remember to do so is to change the batteries in your smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors when you change your clocks back to standard time on November 7 (*this doesn't apply to the new smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors that have a 10-year battery*).
3. **Test Your Smoke Alarms and Carbon Monoxide Detectors** – After inserting a fresh battery in each smoke alarm and carbon monoxide detector, push the safety test button to make sure alarms are in proper working condition. Continue to test your alarms and detectors monthly. Never disconnect your smoke alarm battery! Remember that a “chirping” alarm is a signal that it needs a fresh battery. Test your alarms and detectors if you’ve been away from your home for more than three days. The battery may have “chirped” the entire time you were gone and ran out of power completely before you returned home (*again, this doesn't apply to the new smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors that have a 10-year battery*).
4. **Clean Your Smoke Alarms and Carbon Monoxide Detectors** – Ensure you smoke alarms’ and carbon monoxide detectors’ sensitivity by cleaning them each month of dust and cobwebs. You can do this by gently vacuuming or blowing canned air through the detectors.
5. **Replace Your Smoke Alarms** – Install brand new smoke alarms every ten years. The alarm may continue to beep when tested but after ten years they become significantly less sensitive to smoke or flames.
6. **Change Your Flashlight Batteries** – Keep flashlights with fresh batteries at your bedside for help in finding the way out and signaling for help in the event of a fire.
7. **Install Fire Extinguishers** – Install a fire extinguisher in or near your kitchen, and be sure that every adult family member knows how to use it.
8. **Get the Whole Family Involved** – Once smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors are installed and have fresh batteries, you should also make sure family members—children in particular—know what the alarms and detectors sound like and what to do if the alarms ever go off.

FALL LEAF PICKUP

Soon the fall colors will be in regalia, followed by the leaves jumping off the trees in great numbers. The Village Crew is preparing for leaf collection season. Residents are reminded that they should **NOT** bag their leaves but rake them to the curb instead. Leaf piles should be three feet from obstructions like trees, poles, signs and mailboxes. Do not put leaves in the street for both safety and environmental reasons: a Child playing in a leaf pile in the street may not be seen by cars and the leaves are easily washed down our storm drains and eventually to the lake during moderate to heavy rains.

Throughout the spring, summer and fall the Crew will chip brush left at the curbside of residences. The Village's "Chipper" can take branches up to 12 inches in diameter. For ease of pickup, residents should arrange the brush on their curb in such a way that the ends of the branches are all oriented in the same direction. Longer branches are easier for the Crew to feed into the chipper, so residents don't need to cut branches down to any specific length. Brush piles should be three feet from obstructions like trees, poles, signs and mailboxes.

Village residents doing their own work are the only ones allowed to pile grass clippings / greens in the quarry and leave brush on the curbside for chipping. If you hire a contractor, like Green Acres, Barnes, etc., to do your yard work, then the contractor is responsible for hauling the material out of the Village.

TAX BILL – ADDRESS UPDATES

The Village has started collecting information in order to print property tax bills. Now is the time to make sure your mailing address is accurate. The best way to do this is by checking last year's tax bill. If the address is incorrect or you are not sure what mailing address is being used, contact the Village Hall at 267-2680 or by e-mail at info@shorewood-hills.org.

Village policy is to send the tax bill only to the property owner. Tax bills will not be sent to your financial institution. Any address changes must be received by mid-November before the tax bills are printed by Dane County. We expect to send out tax bills to property owners in mid-December.

COMMUNITY SERVICE PROJECTS IN OUR PARKS

If you or anyone you know would like to get involved in community service, we have plenty of great opportunities in our Village Parks. We've recently had the pleasure to work with a couple wonderful groups in the Quarry Park. The Wisconsin School of Business (MBA, 2011) gave their all while pulling, digging, and cutting buckthorn in the Quarry (picture to the right). Most of the 10 participants admitted they knew little to nothing about buckthorn, let alone invasive species. But by the end of the day, they proclaimed they would never forget this plant!

IMMUNIZATION CLINIC

Home Health United (HHU) will be at the Village Hall on Election Day, Tuesday, November 2 in the morning (7:30 am to 9:00 am) and afternoon (4:30 pm to 6:00 pm) as part of its series of Immunization Clinics around Dane County.

Annual immunization is necessary since new strains of the flu appear each year. This past summer, Influenza A virus infections (designated H3N2) were detected in several states across the U.S., including small localized outbreaks in two non-bordering eastern counties in Iowa. The H3N2 strain, along with last year's H1N1 strain, will be included in the 2010-11 seasonal influenza vaccine.

Officials at the Center for Disease Control (CDC) say the best time to get a flu shot is October through December. High-risk individuals should get their flu shot in October. Everyone is encouraged to get vaccinated to prevent becoming ill with influenza or transmitting it to others. If you do catch the flu, the vaccination should lessen your symptoms. The CDC recommends that **all children, people over age 50, those with chronic medical conditions and persons who live with or care for persons in the high-risk groups** (like healthcare workers or primary care givers) get vaccinated. Pneumonia vaccine will only be available at clinics held at HHU's office at 4639 Hammersley Road. For a complete list of clinics and more influenza information go to www.HomeHealthUnited.org.
