MARCH - APRIL 2011

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE FEBRUARY 21, 2011 MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

(Complete detailed minutes will be available on our website or at the Village Hall)

Attendance – All trustees were in attendance.

Appearances and Communications – Michael Chaim, Manager of Borders Books, appeared to report on the store closing. Nationally Borders Group is in bankruptcy and closing 200 of its 650 stores. Mr. Chaim has not been given a reason from management as to why this Borders store is being closed. He thanked the Board for the Village's support throughout the years. The Police, Fire and EMS held their annual recognition dinner this past weekend. Each year a video production is made reviewing the activities of the year. The Board viewed an encore showing of this year's video.

Consent Agenda – In an effort to expedite meetings, items on the consent agenda are considered as a group and are adopted with one motion. Any Board member may unilaterally remove an item from the consent agenda if he or she believes the item needs discussion. Consent agenda items included approval of the minutes from the January 18, 2011 caucus, regular meeting and closed session; three operator's licenses, and a denial of a sewer back up claim due to untimeliness.

Ordinances L-2010-3 – The Board unanimously approved the third and final reading of [Charter Ordinance L-2010-3](#) that would retain a two year term for the municipal court judge.

Ordinance L-2011-1 – The Board unanimously approved the second reading of [ordinance L-2011-1](#) amending chapter 15 of the code of ordinances (Building Regulations) that would repeal and recreate 15.02(1)3. to read: "Refinishing of interior surfaces and installation of cabinetry shall be exempt from these permit requirements." Roofing and siding will no longer be exempt from permit requirements.

Ordinance L-2011-3 – The Board had a long discussion regarding proposed changes to the Village's Ethics Code. The Board approved the first reading of [ordinance L-2011-3](#) adding the following text that attempts to clarify the original intent of the Ethics Code "...*For purposes of his Ethics Code, the membership of a local official in the Village pool or other Village enterprise or recreation program shall not in of itself be deemed to constitute "a direct personal interest not common to other citizens of the Village."* The vote was 5-0-2 with Mr. Ridders and Mr. Hurley abstaining. The Board also unanimously approved a motion to reconstitute the Ethics Committee to give guidance to the Board during subsequent readings of this ordinance.

Ordinance L-2011-2 – The Board unanimously approved the first and second reading of [ordinance L-2011-2](#) combining the Traffic, Public Works and Stormwater Committees.

Resolution R-2011-2 – The Board approved [resolution R-2011-2](#) that would urge residents to vote yes on a County referendum on the Spring election ballot to support an amendment to the U.S. Constitution related to the constitutional rights of human beings as opposed to corporations on a 4-2-1 vote. Ms. Center voted 'no' and repeated her opinion expressed at the last meeting that this resolution is outside the purview of municipal government and that Village residents are capable of making their own decision on the topic. Ms. Borisy-Rudin also voted 'no' and Mr. Ridders abstained from the vote.

Budget and Financial Policies and Procedures Manual – Treasurer David Kuenzi reviewed the changes proposed this year, mandated by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, which included: creating special revenue funds for the Village Pool and Marina so that excess monies would be retained by the funds rather than rolled into the Village's general fund; changes in terminology that describe fund balances as 'unassigned' rather than 'undesignated' funds; and, including the all of the prior resolutions approved by the Board in the document. The Board unanimously approved the Budget and Financial Policies and Procedures Manual.

Impact of Governor Walker's Budget Repair Bill on the Village – Mr. Frantz gave an overview of the potential impacts to the Village and staff. He expects State aid to municipalities will be reduced tremendously. The Village receives about \$27K in shared revenue funds. The impact of the budget repair bills provisions relating to health insurance on the Village will likely not be as much as it will in some other communities since employees already pay 10% of their health insurance premiums. However, the man-

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dated employee contribution toward retirement will be significant for staff. Mr. Frantz estimates the average staff person could lose about \$5,000 in take home pay after increased health insurance and retirement contributions. The average staff salary is about \$50,000 per year. He believes the State should allow village boards and city councils to manage their own staff and budgets. The budget repair bill eliminates local control by the locally elected representatives. The Board directed Mr. Frantz to draft a letter spelling out these concerns to be sent to Governor Walker by President Sundquist on behalf of the Board.

Appointments – The Board unanimously approved the appointment of Mark Lederer to replace Michelle Vassallo on the Public Health & Safety Committee.

Administrator's Report – Mr. Frantz reported that he recently had a staff meeting to discuss the 2011 budget. Rising fuel costs, higher than expected insurance premiums, potentially lower property tax revenues with the closure of Boarders and the impending budget repair bill may put pressure on the Village's finances. Staff are expected to be very careful with expenses during the year. Mr. Frantz also read a thank you letter from a number of children for the excellent condition of the skating rink this year.

Finance Committee – Mr. Benforado reported the Committee is looking at a possible water and sewer rate increase to fund 2011 projects along with the pros and cons of quarterly (rather than semi-annually) water billing. He also asked if the Board could look at the road reconstruction schedule and other capital projects at its March meeting to make some decisions on how and when the Village should spend the capital budget.

Traffic / Public Works Committees – Ms. Center reported on sanitary sewer system repair and maintenance plans for the problematic Tallyho Lane and Topping Road areas. The Committee is also looking at possible revisions to the Stormwater Ordinance.

Ad hoc Community Center Committee – The public meeting with TKWA on March 10, 2011 was very productive. There was a good discussion of various aspects of the proposed project. Parking, traffic and cost seem to be the foremost issues for consideration.

Public Health & Safety Committee – Mr. Hurley reported the Committee embarks on the delivery of services study with Baker Tilly at its meeting Wednesday night.

Adjourn – The meeting adjourned at 10:11 pm.

VOTER REGISTRATION

Residents are reminded that, since January 1, 2006, all voters must be registered in their municipality BEFORE being able to cast their ballot. If you have not already done so, stop by the Village Hall during regular business hours to register to vote. You may register on Election Day but be prepared to spend more time at the polls.

Bring your Wisconsin driver's license or DOT-issued ID. Bring additional proof of your Village residence if your Shorewood Hills address is not listed on your license or ID: a bank statement, pay stub, utility bill, etc. with the Shorewood Hills address printed will suffice.

If you have moved from one house to another house in the Village, you will need to re-register using your new address.

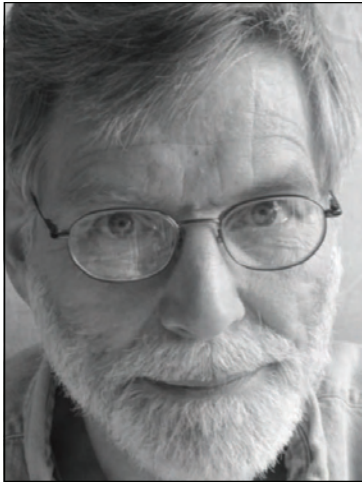
VOTER ID

As of the date of the Bulletin printing, it is uncertain if the proposed voter ID bill will pass, and be implemented, prior to the April 5 election. Presently the bill's provisions include, among others: all electors must provide proof of identification at the polls; the use of corroboration as an alternative to providing proof of residency is eliminated; and all electors must sign the poll books.

As a result, please plan to bring your state-issued ID with you when you vote, your OWN proof of residency if you are registering to vote in the Village for the first time (e.g., a utility bill or bank statement in **your name**, not your spouse's name). Please recognize that collecting the signature of each voter may mean delays at the polls.

MARK SUNDQUIST

I would like to thank you all for your confidence in letting me run unopposed for a third term. Here is a brief view of the state of the Village:

- + We have excellent Village Staff and services and truly fine committees.
- + We have new environmentally sound development in the commercial district and ongoing replacement of aging infrastructure throughout the Village.
- + We have a superb AA+ bond rating, a healthy reserve fund and a reasonable debt level.
- + We have two TIF districts, which have already contributed significant amounts to road construction.

But all is not rosy.

- The Village faces serious uncertainties which proposed draconian state legislation may drop on us, and we are working through a discrimination investigation by the US Dept of Housing and Urban Development. These are sensitive and very serious issues.
- We are studying how to approach inevitable changes in the way we provide Fire and Ambulance services.
- On the bright side, the Village has always faced challenges, and has always met these in such a way that the Village maintained its essential character. My goal is to keep the Village running smoothly and working together to achieve all that is best for our Village.

ABSENTEE BALLOTS

Requests to vote by absentee ballot must be done in writing. There are three ways registered voters may request an absentee ballot:

- 1) Complete the official form which is available at the Village Hall, on the Village's website (www.shorewood-hills.org/forms.htm), or request that a copy of the form be mailed to you (e-mail the Village Hall at info@shorewood-hills.org or call 267-2680).
- 2) Send an e-mail request for an absentee ballot to the Village Clerk (cokie@shorewood-hills.org).
- 3) Send a letter requesting an absentee ballot.

Both e-mail and letter requests must include the following: 1) your name and voting address (clearly printed), 2) the address you wish to have the ballot sent to (it can be sent to your home or elsewhere), 3) the election date(s) you are requesting the ballot for, 4) a statement that you meet all eligibility requirements to vote in the election, and 5) your signature. If there is more than one person making a request in the same letter, both individuals must sign the letter.

A request for an absentee ballot to be mailed to you must arrive at the Village Hall by 5:00 pm on the Thursday before the election (March 31). You may vote absentee in person at the Village Hall until 5:00 pm on the day before the elections (April 4). Please contact the Village Hall if you have any questions.

Absentee ballots for the spring election should be available in mid-March.

CITIZENS' POLICE ACADEMY 2011

2011 PARKING PERMITS

To avoid getting a ticket, pick up a 2011 Parking Permit at the Police Department in the Village Hall during regular business hours. The first sticker per household is free; additional stickers are \$5.00 each.

(Qty) LARGE TREES

- _____ 1. **Chinkapin Oak (\$160.00 per 1.75" caliper tree):** "2009 Urban Tree of the Year". WI native oak that tolerates our alkaline soil better than other oaks. 60-80' tall.
- _____ 2. **Shagbark Hickory (\$153.00 per 1.5" caliper tree):** WI native tree that produces sweet tasting nuts and has beautiful "Shaggy" exfoliating bark as the tree ages.
- _____ 3. **Quaking Aspen (\$64.00 per 1.5" caliper tree):** Fast growing WI native. Leaves tremble in a light breeze and turn golden-yellow in the fall. 40' tall x 25' wide.
- _____ 4. **River Birch (\$69.00 per 7' tree):** WI native birch with attractive exfoliating bark. Tolerates a wide range of soil moisture conditions. 40' tall x 30' wide.
- _____ 5. **Katsura Tree (\$138.00 per 1.75" caliper):** Heart shaped leaves emerge purple-red, turn blue-green in summer, to apricot-orange in the fall. 40-60' tall x 20-35'.

- _____ 1. **Redbud (\$134.00 per 1.5" caliper tree):** "2010 Urban Tree of the Year". Purple-pink flowers in early spring. Available as single or multi-stem.
- _____ 2. **Apple Serviceberry (\$97.00 per 5' tree):** Showy white flowers to announce spring and tasty berries that birds love. 20' tall by 10' wide.

PET LICENSES

All dogs and cats in the Village must be licensed annually. To obtain a license, please bring your pet's rabies vaccination record, including the vaccine's expiration date, to the Village Hall. If your dog or cat does not need a rabies booster, you may bring in the 2010 Village-issued license tag number or your copy of the 2010 license. We can obtain the necessary information from past records.

The deadline for obtaining licenses is **April 1, 2011**. There is a \$5.00 penalty after this date. The late fee increases to \$10.00 after June 1, 2011.

REMEMBER, even if your dog or cat is due for the rabies vaccination after the deadline, licenses must be obtained by April 1.

FEE (Dogs): Neutered or spayed	\$13.50	FEE (Cats): Neutered or spayed	\$ 7.50
Not neutered or spayed	\$18.50	Not neutered or spayed	\$12.50

Do NOT purchase your license from your veterinarian. In order for the Village to receive credit from Dane County, we must have your records on file here in the Village. Also, if a pet is lost or running at large, we can locate the owners much easier if the records are at the Village Hall.
