**HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE JULY 21, 2014 MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES***Complete detailed minutes will be available on our website or at the Village Hall*

**Attendance** – All Trustees were in attendance.

**Consent Agenda** – In an effort to expedite meetings, items on the consent agenda are considered as a group and are adopted with one motion. Any Board member may unilaterally remove an item from the consent agenda if he or she believes the item needs discussion. Consent agenda items included approval of a Block Party (1101 Edgehill Drive); the **June 16** meeting minutes; a solicitor permit for Liliana's Restaurant; and, a Class B Beer/Class C Wine license for First Unitarian Society.

**Consider elimination of east side sidewalk extension on Dartmouth Road from street construction contract** – The Board invited residents to express their opinions regarding the extension of the sidewalk. Many residents spoke regarding the issue with opinions on both sides. Some of the discussion topics included: safety concerns for children walking to school, as well as other pedestrians; sidewalk had been in place there in the past; lack of a need since there is a complete sidewalk on the west side of the road; burden of shoveling the new sidewalk; potential harm to the trees in the area; and a direct impact on two particular residences. The Board voted 5-2 (Mr. Lederer and Mr. Hurley voting no) to eliminate the east side sidewalk from the Dartmouth Road construction contract. The Board further directed the Village Engineer and the Public Works Committee to consider design of a mid-block crosswalk where the sidewalk ends.

**Consider acceptance of proposal for Village space needs planning** – The Board unanimously accepted the proposal by Potter Lawson dated May 6, 2014 not to exceed \$2,600.

**Review and recommendation regarding University Bay Fields Master Plan** – No new information was available at the time of the meeting and no action by the Board was required.

**Village Administrator's Report** – Mr. Frantz notified the Board of the resignation of police officer Jeff Beck who will be leaving to take a position with the Sauk City Police Department; the Village Forester Corey George's recommendation to consider a different vendor for future rain garden installations; and a recap of the Board's July 4 picnic. Village Engineer Brian Berquist and Public Works Crew Chief John Mitmoen reported on some emergency repairs as a result of recent heavy rains. A sinkhole appeared near a manhole south of the pool, outside the fence, that needs immediate repair for an estimated \$3,000. A rusted pipe collapsed in McKenna Park near the Rustic Bridge and caused the sidewalk to collapse. A repair was done to mitigate the current problem but the entire pipe needs to be repaired. Mr. Berquist indicated that the pipe could be lined for about \$5,000 which would solve the problem. Mr. Mitmoen reported on repairs to the Tally Ho water booster station pumps. One pump (of three) failed and was replaced. Another pump had been repaired about 5 years ago and he is recommending that the third pump be rebuilt next year. Water service to residents was not interrupted.

**Plan Commission** – Mr. Frantz reported the Commission has been working on developing a chicken ordinance. Currently the keeping of chickens is not included in the Zoning Code which means it would not be permitted in the Village. The ordinance would make it a permitted use for the residents who are keeping chickens.

**Public Works Committee** – Mr. Lederer reported the Committee is beginning work on the 2015 roads program. The Village's borrowing capacity may be limited for the next several years, so the Committee is investigating the possibility of milling and resurface the roads only and leaving the replacement of the underground utilities until the future. The Committee is also working on reconciling the Village ordinances and the street signage.

**Pool Committee** – The Board received a design of the proposed patio expansion to the west of the pool concessions area in Post Farm park.

**Adjourn** – The meeting adjourned at 10:04 pm.

## ELECTION INFORMATION

On Tuesday, August 12, 2014, Wisconsin will hold a primary election to select candidates for the November general election. This election is a primary, which means electors can vote for the candidates of ONE party only (no cross-over voting is allowed).

In-office absentee voting is allowed for two weeks ahead of the primary, from Monday, July 28 through Friday, August 8, 2014. In-office absentee voting is NOT allowed the day before the primary (Monday, August 11).

*Please Note:* The Wisconsin Legislature recently further limited the hours voters can cast in-person absentee ballots. Now, although the Village Hall typically opens at 7:30 am, ballots can not be handed out before 8:00 am.

Absentee ballots may be obtained by mail. If you are already a registered voter in Shorewood Hills, you may send an e-mail to the Village Clerk, Cokie Albrecht ([cokie@shorewood-hills.org](mailto:cokie@shorewood-hills.org)) to request a ballot be mailed to you. To allow enough time for a ballot to be returned to the Clerk, the last day to request a mailed ballot is Thursday, August 7, 2014.

## NEW RESIDENT VOTER REGISTRATION

New Village residents, please note that the polling location for all voters in Shorewood Hills is the Village Hall at 810 Shorewood Boulevard. To be eligible to vote in the Village, you must have resided in Shorewood Hills for at least 28 days prior to the election. To register prior to the August 12, 2014 primary, please complete and return the voter registration form that you received in your New Resident Packet. Alternately, the registration form can be found in the downloadable forms section of the Village website ([www.shorewood-hills.org](http://www.shorewood-hills.org)) or stop by the Village Hall. It is also possible to register at the polls on election day. Your registration must be accompanied by proof of your residency in Shorewood Hills. Acceptable forms of proof include a driver's license, bank statement or utility bill. The proof must include your name and Village address. If you have any questions about registering or voting in Shorewood Hills, please call the Clerk's office at 267-2680. Welcome to the Village! We look forward to seeing you at the polls.

## WAISMAN CENTER CHILDREN'S THEATER

One of only 14 centers of its kind in the United States, the Waisman Center encompasses laboratories for biomedical and behavioral research, a brain imaging center, an inclusive preschool, specialty clinics, and a clinical biomanufacturing facility. In addition to its research efforts, the Center provides an array of services to people with developmental disabilities, offers numerous early intervention, educational, and outreach programs to young children and their families, and trains scientists and clinicians who will serve our nation in the future. The Waisman Center Children's Theatre (WCCT) enhances the arts for young children in Dane County by providing high quality, diverse, educational, and interactive live theatrical performances at a modest cost and in fully accessible settings. The indoor auditorium has a formal stage and individual seats accommodating up to 250 people. The fully accessible auditorium provides an intimate yet informal traditional theatre experience.

The WCCT features a variety of performers—magicians, singers, dancers, musical groups, educators, and professional theatrical companies. Many of the performances showcase children as the sole performers or “stars” of the production. ## THE BLUE-GREEN ALGAE SEASON HAS BEGUN

### *Take Care to Avoid Contact*

[ *From a Public Health of Madison & Dane County (PHMDC) press release* ] Based on recent news reports about blue-green algae sightings on Lake Mendota, as well as several beach closing notices, it is safe to assume that this year's blue-green algae season has begun.

Blue-green algae are actually not algae, but photosynthetic bacteria known as cyanobacteria. They occur naturally in lakes, streams and ponds and have been around for millions of years. They only become a problem for us when they grow enough to produce large scummy mats on the surface of lakes and rivers. They tend to be green to blue-green in color, but can also be reddish-purple, or brown sometimes looking like paint.

Some of these blooms are capable of producing toxins. Exposure to these toxins can produce a range of reactions, from rashes and lip blistering to harmful effects on the liver and nervous system. Other reactions can include sore throats, headaches, muscular and joint pain and asthmatic and gastro-intestinal symptoms. If you believe you have been exposed, contact your doctor right away.

When you see a blue-green algae bloom keep yourself, your children, and your pets out of the water and avoid all contact. Dogs swimming in or drinking water covered with a bloom can suffer near fatal or fatal consequences. The only benefit to its disgusting appearance and smell is that it tends to keep people away.


Blue-green algae blooms occur frequently throughout the summer. Spells of hot weather and heavy rains carrying nutrients to the lake can create conditions that increase the possibility for blue-green algae blooms though they are hard to predict. Since the lakes are always in motion, the wind and waves that bring a bloom to a beach are just as capable of blowing it away. Blooms can linger for a few hours or days depending on weather conditions.

There are no quick chemical fixes that we can use to make these blooms go away. We have discovered that if we use herbicides or algaecides, we may succeed in killing the bloom, but as the bacteria die, they will release their toxins into the water and thus create a potentially bigger problem. One long-term strategy includes reducing the amount of phosphorous and nitrogen applied to our yards and fields that runs off into the lakes. This would help reduce the growth of algae.

PHMDC regularly monitors water quality at many Madison area beaches including routine, weekly testing for bacteria and blue-green algae. If test results show that beach conditions are not safe, the beach will be closed for swimming. Follow-up testing is done every day until the problem clears up.
