The weather has finally warmed up and it's time to get out your summer clothes. It's time for some news shorts...



The **Post Farm Path** and infiltration project is nearing completion.

If you have not ventured about to see it, you should take a look and see what you think. The lighting (a minimal amount) is now being manufactured and it will be six weeks before it is ready. Tables, benches, trash and recycling receptacles will be put in shortly.

Pyare Square Redevelopment – All Village approvals and TID gap financing have been approved for this \$40M project to demolish and replace the Pyare Square building with a 150 unit continuum of care facility (independent living, assisted living, full nursing home and memory care). The developer is in the process of completing financing for the project. Village approvals will expire

JUNE - JULY 2014

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE MAY 19, 2014 MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES*Complete detailed minutes will be available on our website or at the Village Hall*

Attendance – All Trustees were in attendance.

Appearances and Communications – Renee Meinholz from Baker Tilly presented the Village's 2013 financial audit statement. Ms. Meinholz reported it was a "clean audit" (Baker Tilly's highest possible opinion). She highlighted several key figures in the audit statement and answered Trustees' questions. The Board unanimously voted to accept the financial statement and management letter.

Consent Agenda – In an effort to expedite meetings, items on the consent agenda are considered as a group and are adopted with one motion. Any Board member may unilaterally remove an item from the consent agenda if he or she believes the item needs discussion. Consent agenda items included a block party permit for Crestwood Drive on Sunday, June 8, 2014 and seasonal employment hires. Mr. Benforado asked that the minutes of the previous meeting be removed from the consent agenda in order to make a correction in the amount listed regarding the Oak Park Place TIF request in the April 21 minutes. The Board unanimously approved the minutes from the open and closed sessions of the [April 21](#) and [May 12](#) meetings with the correction.

Consider Conditional Use Permits – Due to the Village's lake front ordinance, any proposed construction on Lake Mendota Drive beyond the established "meander line" is subject to the conditional use permit process. The Plan Commission held public hearings for a deck addition at 3410 Lake Mendota Drive and a lake access stairwell and patio at 3414 Lake Mendota Drive. The Plan Commission recommended approval. The Board unanimously approved the conditional use permits.

Consider Special Exception Permit – The property owner at 3309 Tallyho Lane has applied for a special exception permit to exceed the Village's height regulations by two feet. The property has a significant slope towards Locust Drive. The point of the roof is very small and inconspicuous. It will have no adverse impact on adjacent properties. The Board unanimously approved the special exception permit.

Consider whether the Village wants to review the Safer, Walkable Community policy – The Board unanimously approved reconstituting the Safer, More Walkable Task Force to review the policy, status of the achievements since adoption, and make possible recommendations for future action. Greg Lampe, the chair of the previous task force, indicated he would be willing to reprise his role as chair. Mr. Frantz stated that he would put together a report on progress made since the policy was put in place for the Board to review at the June meeting.

Consider policy to allow accrual of vacation and sick leave while on workers' compensation – Mr. Imes explained the policy is consistent with the State, UW and numerous municipalities. The Board unanimously approved the policy.

Consider amendment to Village financial policies and procedures manual adopting a policy concerning credit risk – The Finance Committee is recommending the adoption of the policy to address an issue noted in the auditor's management letter for several years. The policy defines how the Village would mitigate risk by only investing in "authorized and suitable" investments with the objectives of "safety" and "liquidity." The Board approved the policy on a 6-1-0 vote (Ms. Borisy-Rudin voting no).

Consider per inspection fee increase of \$1.75 for building, electrical, plumbing, HVAC inspectors – The Board unanimously approved the increase.

Review and consider changes to recreation fee reimbursement – The current reimbursement rate to the Village of 10% is not adequate to cover the administrative costs of the recreation programs. The Board referred the matter to the Recreation Committee for a possible recommendation on a change to the fee structure.

Consider extension of zoning approval for Oak Park Place Hills planned unit development (PUD) – There are no substantive changes to the PUD previously approved by the Board. The Board unanimously approved and extension to the PUD zoning through October 31, 2014.

Consider Resolution R-2014-6 development agreement with Oak Park Place Properties of Shorewood

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Hills, LLC – Village attorney Matt Dregne reviewed the draft agreement negotiated on direction from the Board at a previous meeting. Mr. Dregne outlined the TIF agreement which would be similar to the agreement the Village approved for The Lodge at Walnut Grove project. The TIF would be for \$3.9M split into two parts. The first half would be \$1.95M financed by the Village and include an initial payment of up to \$1.45M for demolition and construction capital. The second half would be developer financed also \$1.95M. The developer would guarantee a property value of \$30M upon completion of the project and would provide a letter of credit to protect the Village. The Board unanimously approved [resolution R-2014-6](#).

Consider promotion of John Mitmoen to DPW Crew Chief – The Board congratulated Mr. Mitmoen, who was in the audience and unanimously approved his promotion and set his salary at Step 5 Grade 18 of the Village's pay plan.

Consider issuance of request for proposals (RFP) to select firms for a Village space and facility needs – After a discussion, the Board voted 4-2-0 (Mr. Sundquist and Ms. Borisy-Rudin voting no) to issue a limited scope RFP for a space needs study for Village's operational facilities.

Review and recommendations regarding University Bay Drive fields Master Plan – There is nothing new to report.

Consider EMS & Fire Association Requests – The Shorewood Hills EMS & Fire Association provided the Village with a letter requesting support for the continuation of their community service projects including the fireworks display and portions of the Village's July 4th celebration. The Board directed staff to develop a resolution of support that could be considered at its June meeting.

Blackhawk Lease Negotiating Task Force – Mr. Ridders and Fred Wade provided the Board with a review of the task force's deliberations to date. The task force will meet again on Wednesday, May 28, 2014 at 5:00 pm to continue discussions.

Appointments – Mr. Sundquist appointed and the Board unanimously approved Trustee Mark Lederer as chair of the Public Works Committee. All other trustee committee positions were reappointed unanimously ([see page 10 for a full list of the Trustee appointments](#)).

Village Administrator's Report – Mr. Frantz reported on the following: a \$30,000 in cost savings for the new booster and lift station telemetry system and annual cost savings of over \$1,500 for building alarm systems; the status of Fire and EMS equipment sales; a donation of \$2,500 from the Garden Club to help fund horticultural seasonal help; a cost savings for in-house maintenance of the stormwater infiltration basins (rather than contracting out); and a \$1,500 expense to mitigate a dangerous situation at the pool where tiles were falling off of the roof soffit. Mr. Frantz also introduced the Emerald Ash Borer management plan developed by the Forester and Parks Committee. The plan could be discussed further at the next Board meeting.

Adjourn – The meeting adjourned at 10:45 pm.

BOARD OF REVIEW

The Board will hold hearings on **Tuesday, June 10, 2014** from 4:30 pm to 6:30 pm at the Village Hall. The Board will consider your request to revise your assessment.

ONCE MORE AROUND THE PARK, DRIVER!

Volunteers are needed at the 4th of July fireworks show to spend 90 minutes or so driving around in circles. No map or GPS is needed, the directions are very simple, and you get about three feet closer to the fireworks than anyone other than the pyrotechnic crew.

We set out a 'crowd control' rope around the perimeter of the fireworks display to establish a 'fallout' zone, an area where any potentially dangerous fireworks debris could fall. Spectators are not allowed within this zone.

To insure that spectators remain outside of this zone we have individuals continuously patrolling this rope (that's the driving in circles part) prior to and during the display (from about 8:45 until about 10:15) in golf carts.

A golf cart is built to accommodate two people, so if you and a friend or family member (18 or older, please) would like to help by simply sitting in a nice cushy golf cart instead of on the hard ground while also get an up-close 360 degree view of the show please contact David Sykes at the Village Hall (dsykes@shorewood-hills.org / 267-2680).

Shorewood Hills Police Department to mobilize for Click It or Ticket safety belt enforcement from May 19 to June 1

Shorewood Hills Police Department will join hundreds of law enforcement agencies throughout Wisconsin for the annual Click It or Ticket safety belt enforcement mobilization from May 19 to June 1.

“Our officers will be on the lookout day and night for unbuckled motorists. If you’re not wearing a safety belt, we will stop your vehicle and you will get a ticket,” said Officer Jeffrey Beck. “During the Click It or Ticket mobilization and throughout the year, we stringently enforce Wisconsin’s mandatory safety belt law to motivate motorists to buckle up every time they drive or ride in a vehicle. Tragically, too many people are needlessly injured or killed because they believed a crash would never happen to them so they did not buckle up.”

In Wisconsin, approximately one out of five motorists does not buckle up, according to the Wisconsin Department of Transportation. More than half of the drivers and passengers killed in Wisconsin traffic crashes in 2013 were not wearing safety belts. Last year, there were more than 70,000 convictions for failure to fasten a seat belt.

“Consistent safety belt use is the most effective protection against being ejected from a vehicle during a crash or thrown around violently inside it and possibly hitting another person in the vehicle with massive force,” Officer Beck says. “Our officers take safety belt enforcement seriously in an effort to reach the ultimate goal of zero preventable traffic deaths in Wisconsin.”



RESIDENTIAL COMPUTER & ELECTRONICS RECYCLING

After a brief hiatus, the Village’s Services Committee, in conjunction with the Shorewood Hills EMS & Fire Association, will be sponsoring an e-cycle event. Residents of the Village may dispose of their old computers, monitors, TVs, radios and other small home electronics by bringing them to the Public Works Garage on Saturday, June 7, 2014 between 10:00 am and 12:00 pm.

Help keep potentially damaging materials out of our landfills. Our recycling partner, Resource Solution Corporation, will take most household electronics at no fee. But, due to the special requirements to recycle picture tubes and a few other items, there may be a modest pass-through cost charged for certain items (usually \$5-20 but TVs larger than 27” may be a bit more).



CANOE / KAYAK SHARE PROGRAM

Enjoy Lake Mendota by kayak or canoe this summer by joining the Village's Canoe/Kayak Share Program. The annual per household membership fee of \$30 includes unlimited use (as available) of the Village's canoes and kayaks for the season May 15 to October 15. 

Garlic Mustard in the Spring



Garlic Mustard in the Spring

Garlic Mustard Season is Upon Us – A friendly reminder to residents that garlic mustard is a ‘Noxious Weed’ and **must be removed from all properties within the Village**. If not removed, the Village has the legal authority to have the plant removed at the property owner's expense.

Garlic Mustard Disposal – Garlic mustard plants that are pulled **must be placed in clear plastic bags**. Dispose of the bags by:

- Placing the sealed bags in your trash cart or...
- Putting the sealed bag on top of your trash cart or...
- Depositing the sealed bags into one of the Village trash dumpsters at the Fire Station, the Village Hall, or Pool/Community Center.

If you choose to use an herbicide like ‘ROUND-UP,’ it is best to spray in April when the plants are young. Spraying plants that are already flowering is not as effective and the plant will most likely still go to seed. Spraying early also reduces the chances of killing desirable plants that have not emerged yet.

PET LICENSES

All dogs and cats in the Village must be licensed annually. To obtain a license, please bring your pet’s rabies vaccination record, including the vaccine’s expiration date, to the Village Hall. If your dog or cat does not need a rabies booster, you may bring in the 2013 Village-issued license tag number or your copy of the 2013 license. We can obtain the necessary information from that record.

The initial deadline for obtaining licenses was **April 1, 2014**. There was a \$5.00 penalty after that date. The late fee increases to \$10.00 after **June 1, 2014**. REMEMBER, even if your dog or cat is due for the rabies vaccination after the deadline, licenses must be obtained by June 1.

BASE FEE (Dogs):

- Neutered or spayed \$15.00
- Not neutered or spayed \$20.00

BASE FEE (Cats):

- Neutered or spayed..... \$ 8.00
- Not neutered or spayed..... \$13.00

Do NOT purchase your license from your veterinarian (that is a City of Madison program). If a pet is lost or running at large in the Village, it is much easier to locate the owner(s) when the records are at the Village Hall. Also, the Village receives credit from Dane County for licenses only if your pet’s records are on file at the Village Hall.

DOGS RUNNING AT-LARGE

Please be a good neighbor and maintain control of your dog. Village ordinance states that dogs must be kept under the control of someone by leash or otherwise. Please don’t let your dog run at-large as it may ruin neighbors’ flower beds, dig up their yards or possibly run into an elderly person out for a walk. Further, be sure to ALWAYS pick up after your pet. Thank you!

LAWN MOWING, LEAF RAKING, DOG WALKING ENTREPRENEURS

If you are currently part of the Village Hall database and would no longer like your name/number given out, please contact Karla to be removed.



SPRING CLEANUP EVENT

On Friday, Saturday and Sunday, May 30, 31 and June 1 the Village will have two 30 yard dumpsters available outside the Public Works garage (north end of the Fire Station lot) from 8:00 am to 5:00 pm. Bring items (not fit for donating or garage sales) to dump in the dumpsters.

Prohibited Materials: Appliances; Asphalt Shingles; Batteries; Brush / Grass / Leaves; Office Paper; Cardboard / Boxes; Computers / Monitors; 30 & 55 Gallon Barrels / Drums; Fluorescent Bulbs; Light Fixtures; Hazardous / Infectious Materials; Oil & Oil Filters; Paint; Recyclables; Sharps / Needles; Tires; Dirt / Brick / Concrete; and Asbestos.



2014 Street Projects and Beyond – The Village has not yet received a date from the contractor for the start of the Dartmouth & Wellesley Roads project, but it will likely begin in late June or in July. A stretch of Tally Ho Lane will also be resurfaced. The Village will be making decisions over the next few months on its ability to finance and sequence more streets for reconstruction, most likely Oak Way and/or Edgehill Drive. Once those determinations are made, residents will be contacted.

There are also a few other streets in the Village that need attention including but not limited to portions of Lake Mendota Drive, Blackhawk Drive, Crestwood Drive, Sumac Drive and Topping Road. As the Village nears its borrowing limits it may need to look at less expensive fixes for these streets like milling off the surface and replacing it with an overlay rather than full reconstruction. This will improve the surface for a period of ten to fifteen years but does not replace water and sewer mains (which on the west side of the Village are not as old as the east side mains).

Space Programming Analysis – The Village Board has approved a project to begin making decisions about the future uses of Village facilities. Contracting of Fire and EMS has created space at the Fire Station but the building itself is in marginal condition. Village Hall is in good condition but always seems to be the subject of someone interested in a development project. The Village leases cold storage space for Public Works and the lease will run out in a couple of years. The Board has decided it is time to plan for the short and long term.
