**HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE OCTOBER 27, 2014 MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES**

*(Complete detailed minutes will be available on our website or at the Village Hall)*

**Attendance** – All trustees were in attendance.

**Consent Agenda** – In an effort to expedite meetings, items on the consent agenda are considered as a group and are adopted with one motion. Any Board member may unilaterally remove an item from the consent agenda if he or she believes the item needs discussion. Consent agenda items included approval of minutes from the Board's [September 15 meeting](#).

**Street Use Permit – Miles for Sight Delta Gamma Fraternity Run/Walk-November 2** – Mr. Sundquist requested that this item be removed from the consent agenda and asked if Madison Fire had been notified of the event. Mr. Frantz assured the Board that all street use permits are forwarded to Madison Fire for its consideration. The street use permit was unanimously approved.

**Consider approval of conditional user permit application for deck addition at 3448 LMD** – The Plan Commission reviewed and recommended approval of the permit application. The Board unanimously approved the project.

**Resolution R-2014-11** – The Board unanimously approved [resolution R-2014-11](#) terminating the Village's participation in the Wisconsin Service Awards Program for fire and EMS volunteers.

**Review and recommendation regarding Village space needs study** – Brian Reed of Potter Lawson gave an overview of the space needs analysis commissioned by the Village. The Board accepted the study and took it under advisement.

**Discussion and possible recommendations on new lease agreement with Blackhawk Country Club** – Laura Callan, attorney for Stafford Rosenbaum, summarized the lease proposal developed by her and Village attorney Matt Dregne. The Board and Blackhawk representatives discussed some specific points of the proposed lease ([see article on page 3 for more information](#)).

**Closed Session** – The Board went into closed session to further discuss the Blackhawk Country Club lease negotiations.

**Consider amendments to the Agreement to Undertake Development relating to the proposed Oak Park Place development & extending certain deadlines relating to the General Development Plan (GDP)** – Developer Scott Frank and Attorney Hal Karas updated the Board on the status of the project. It has taken a long time to obtain the needed contracts with the State of Wisconsin for an easement and obtain a parcel of land from the City of Madison. Obtaining financing for the project has also been a long process. Oak Park Place has a new equity partner which should satisfy that need. The developer is asking for an extension to the GDP and TIF agreement in order to get the project underway. The property owner has notified the Village that his agreement with Scott Frank has expired and he is entertaining an offer from another developer. Laura Callan of Stafford Rosenbaum advised the Board that the Village would be free to view and possibly approve zoning for another proposed development plan even if the Village gave Oak Park Place an extension. The Board unanimously approved a resolution to extend the recording date of the GDP and Specific Development Plan to March 2, 2015. The Board also unanimously amended and restated the deadline of the development agreement to March 2, 2015.

**Appointments** – Mr. Sundquist appointed Rick Chappell to the Public Works Committee and David Boutwell to the Parks Committee to fill vacancies. The Board unanimously approved the

**VILLAGE BUDGET MEETING**

Village staff and the Finance Committee have spent the last couple of months working on the budgets.

appointments.

**Village President** – Mr. Sundquist reported the Village had been contacted by a resident with regard to removing a criminal history question on the Village's general employment application like the City of Madison has done. The matter was referred to the Personnel Committee.

**Village Administrator** – Mr. Frantz reported on a significant water utility issue. The average daily water purchased from Madison Water Utility has more than doubled in recent months which could indicate a metering issue at the city or a large leak in the system. Staff have taken steps to isolate sections of the water system, hired a leak detection company and made a few repairs to hydrants and pipes. But, the issues found were not at the level corresponding to the water loss. Full investigation of the problem continues and is pointing towards a metering/date issue. Mr. Frantz also reported on several pending redevelopment projects including the Pyare Square property, AT&T plaza (apartments with first floor commercial) and 700 UBD (apartments with a 5-10,000 sq ft commercial space).

**Personnel Committee** – Mr. Imes reported the Committee met with staff to discuss the work environment and pay. The Committee made a recommendation to the Finance Committee for a pay increase of one step on the Village's compensation plan plus 1%.

**Services Committee** – Ms. Borisy-Rudin reported the Committee has been reviewing the space needs analysis, a possible storage facility next to the salt shed on Old Middleton Road and a capital needs plan for replacement of vehicles and major equipment.

**Public Health & Safety Committee** – Mr. Hurley reported the Committee will meet to consider the purchase of a new squad car to replace the 2008 vehicle that is in need of major repair to the driver's side floor board.

**Finance Committee** – Mr. Benforado discussed specific aspects of the proposed 2015 budget including the possibility of the Village no longer printing and mailing the Village Bulletin to all residents (*see article on page 4*).

**Adjourn** – The meeting adjourned at about 12:15 pm.

### PUBLIC HEARING AND REFERENDUM QUESTION ON BLACKHAWK CC LEASE

The Village is negotiating a new long term lease with the Blackhawk Country Club at the request of the Club. An advisory referendum of the electorate is required by Village code before the Board of Trustees can consider entering in to a new lease.

The referendum question will be on the April 2015 ballot and the question itself will need to be short and simple, and approved by the Village attorney. But the lease is a more complex document that will require the electorate to become educated on the matter and the Village to provide outreach and objective information to help educate the voters. The Village Board will hold a public information meeting on the lease at its December 15 meeting at 7:00 pm.

**VILLAGE BULLETIN MAY RETURN TO ON-LINE ONLY PUBLICATION**

The Board of Trustees is again considering a change to produce the Village Bulletin only as an on-line newsletter. In 2012, printing and mailing of the Bulletin was stopped in order to save the Village about \$13,000 per year. In June of 2013, some on the Board felt that the Bulletin wasn't reaching enough residents. The Arbor Crossing apartments were opening at that time as well and the Board decided to reinstate the print version. At that time about 1/5 of the Village opted-out of receiving a printed copy, happy to read the Bulletin on-line.

The budget is tight again this year and saving \$13,000 on printing and mailing costs may be an attractive option to help balance the 2015 budget. Residents without internet access will have options for a paper copy of the Bulletin, but will need to proactively 'opt-in' for the paper copy. The administrative process has not yet been determined but more details will be included with the tax bills this December.

**NO DECEMBER BULLETIN**

The Village has not produced a December issue of the Village Bulletin for the past few years. In an effort to save a month's worth of printing and postage costs, the December issue was chosen to skip mainly because the Thanksgiving holiday would delay the Bulletin until well after the first of the month.

## VOTING: WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW NOW...

The Village's goal is for all eligible Shorewood Hills voters to be able to cast a ballot and have that ballot counted. Please contact the Village Hall (267-2680) if you have any questions after reading the information listed below.

**Photo ID: Not Required** – On Thursday, October 9, 2014, the United States Supreme Court issued an order blocking implementation of Wisconsin's voter photo ID law for the November 4, 2014 General Election. It is possible voter identification requirements will be in place for future elections.

**Voter Registration** – If you are already registered to vote in Shorewood Hills, you do not need to reregister. If you are a new resident, you must have resided at your Shorewood Hills address for at least 28 consecutive days to be eligible to register to vote in the Village. The deadline to register by mail is 20 days before the election has passed (October 15, 2014). From now until the November 4 election, only in-person registration at the Village Hall is allowed. A copy of the voter registration form may be downloaded from the Village website: <http://www.shorewood-hills.org> (go to: Departments >> Administration and click on 'Elections & Voting'). It is possible to register at the polls on Election Day. **However, to avoid possible long lines at the polls please plan to register early.** Be sure to bring your Wisconsin driver's license (if you have one) and proof of your residency in the Village when you register. If your WI driver's license (or ID card) doesn't show your current Village address, common proofs of residency include (among others): a utility bill, bank statement, paycheck, government document, or lease in your name at your Village address (*please note: recent legislation prohibits registering to vote the day before the election—Monday, November 3*).

**Absentee Voting** – You must be registered to vote in Shorewood Hills in order to obtain an absentee ballot from the Village. In-person absentee voting is restricted to the two weeks before an election. Absentee voting on the day before an election is prohibited. In-person absentee voting therefore ends at 5:00 pm on the Friday before the election. For the Fall election, the in-person voting period began Monday, October 20 and will continue through Friday, October 31. The Village Hall typically opens at 7:30 am, but new voting regulations prohibit ballots being given to in-person absentee voters before 8:00 am.

**Absentee Ballot Requests** – You may download the absentee ballot application form from the Village website at <http://www.shorewood-hills.org/> (go to: Departments >> Administration and click on 'Elections & Voting') The completed form may be faxed to the Village Hall (608-266-5929); e-mailed to the Village Clerk ([cokie@shorewood-hills.org](mailto:cokie@shorewood-hills.org)); mailed to or dropped off at the Village Hall at 810 Shorewood Boulevard, Madison, WI 53705. Alternatively, you may send an e-mail to Cokie stating: you would like an absentee ballot for the November 4, 2014 election; your address in the Village; and where you would like the ballot sent. The deadline to request an absentee ballot to be mailed is the Thursday before the election (October 30). A ballot postmarked by Election Day (November 4) and received at Village Hall by the Friday after the election (November 7) will be counted. However we would prefer that all absentee ballots were returned to Village Hall by Election Day. Those ballots then can be counted with the other Election Day votes and included in the totals reported that evening.

**Signing the Poll Book** – All voters must sign the poll book in order to obtain a ballot. The poll book contains a signature block for each voter. Anyone using a fictitious signature will be required to re-sign the book before he/she will be allowed to vote. Voters unable to sign the poll book because of a disability are exempt from this requirement. If this applies to you, simply tell the Election Officials that you are unable to sign because of a disability. You do not need to disclose the nature of your disability to the Election Officials or to any observers. Election Officials will write "exempt by order of inspectors" in your signature block.

## NEED A HOLIDAY GIFT IDEA?

## FALL LEAF PICKUP

The Public Works Crew will soon start seasonal leaf collection. With all the trees in Shorewood Hills, dealing with the leaves is a monumental task. The Village Crew uses a leaf picking machine to suck up leaves into a box truck for disposal. To assist the crew in their task:

- Please do not bag leaves. Rake them to the curb, not into the street.
- Leaf piles should be three feet from trees, poles, signs and mailboxes so that the vacuuming arm is not obstructed.
- Please make sure that you keep all rocks, construction debris, soil and branches out of your leaf piles. Rocks, nails, dirt, etc. wreak havoc on the leaf picker and endanger the operators.
- When picking up leaves, the Crew makes an entire round of the Village from one end to the other (usually once a week). Special pickups are not possible.
- If the Crew picks up your neighbors' leaves but not yours, the reason may be as simple as the box truck was full, a car was parked in front of the leaf pile, or time ran out in the day. They will get back to your leaf pile as soon as possible.
- The Crew will pick up leaves until they are covered with snow or frozen to the ground.



## LEAVE YOUR LEAVES

Consider leaving your leaves on your lawn as mulch. A new trend in sustainability is mulching your leaves and leaving them on your lawn to improve the soil's water retention and provide critical nutrients, reducing the need for fertilizer in the spring. There may be some leafy residue for a few days after mowing but it quickly disappears.

Mulching attachments for your lawn mower are available at hardware stores or ask your lawn care provider about leaf mulching services.

## CROSSING GUARD NEEDED

## VACATION SECURITY REPORT FORMS

The Shorewood Hills Police Department monitors resident homes when they are reported to be vacant (usually due to occupants going on vacation). You can now submit a 'Security Check Report' form on-line by going to the Police Department section of the Village's website ([www.shorewood-hills.org](http://www.shorewood-hills.org)).

If you don't have internet access, paper copies of the form are available at the Village Hall. Please use the updated form (*Rev. 8/2013*) which allows officers to track their routine checks. If you have a stash of older 'Security Check Report' forms, please recycle them and start a new stockpile of the current form. Complete all fields, especially the returning date. If you return early, you can call the police department (267-1110) during office hours to report you are home.

The information on the paper 'Security Check Report' form is sensitive and could be misused by someone with bad intentions. Please take care when submitting the paper form. Submit it directly to a police department employee at the Village Hall or consider putting the form in a sealed envelope.

## DOG COMPLAINTS

It has been said that "good fences make good neighbors." The same may not be true for invisible fences and noisy pets. The Village Hall has received some complaints from around the Village regarding dogs being left outside all day. They are presumably free to roam in the owner's yard "behind" invisible (or real) fences. Whenever anyone walks by or bicycles past, the dog(s) bark continuously and disturb the neighborhood.

Please be a good neighbor. If you have a dog that barks a lot, keep it indoors as much as possible or consider purchasing a 'Sonic Bark Collar' to discourage your dog from making noise.



The Village Hall has also received complaints about dog waste around the Village, especially in the Village parks and walking path between Harvard Drive and the Pool area. Picking up after your dog is not only the law but common courtesy. Thank you for your continued efforts in these areas.

## IMMUNIZATION CLINIC ON ELECTION DAY

Home Health United will be at the Village Hall on Tuesday, November 4 in the morning (7:30 am to 9:00 am) and afternoon (4:30 pm to 6:00 pm) as part of its series of immunization clinics in Dane County. Annual immunization is necessary since new strains of the flu appear each year.

Officials at the Center for Disease Control (CDC) say the best time to get a flu shot is October through December. High-risk individuals should get their flu shot in October. Everyone is encouraged to get vaccinated to prevent becoming ill with influenza or transmitting it to others. If you do catch the flu, the vaccination should lessen your symptoms. The CDC especially recommends the following groups get vaccinated:

- Those with chronic medical conditions.
- All children over six months old
- Persons who live with or care for persons in the high-risk groups
- Adults age 65 or over
- Pregnant women

**RESPIRATORY VIRUS EV-D68 UPDATE – NO CAUSE FOR ALARM*****Five Cases Reported in Dane County*** (from an October 3, 2014 public health press release)

Enterovirus D68 (EV-D68) is a virus that is reportedly causing mild to severe respiratory illness (runny nose, cough, difficulty breathing) with and without fever. On October 3 Public Health of Madison and Dane County (PHMDC) was notified of test results revealing five cases in Dane County.

This presents no cause for alarm. Enteroviruses are very common. There are over 100 types of enterovirus, although this EV-D68 strain has previously been uncommon in the U.S. Most of these enterovirus infections will produce a mild illness and the vast majority of children who are infected will not require medical attention. However, parents of children with asthma or other lung conditions should be aware that their children may be more susceptible to serious illness. In other states, presumed EV-D68 outbreaks are resulting in growing numbers of children requiring emergency room visits and hospitalizations, primarily for difficulties with breathing and severe asthma. No such details are currently available regarding the Dane County cases.

EV-D68 can be found in saliva, nasal mucus, or sputum and, like the common cold, likely spreads from person to person when an infected person coughs, sneezes, or a person touches contaminated surfaces. Infants, children and teenagers are more likely than adults to get infected with enteroviruses and become sick.

According to Amanda Kita-Yarbro, communicable disease epidemiologist for PHMDC “It is common to see more respiratory illnesses at this time of year caused by many different viruses. Usually symptoms are mild and limited, but if you are concerned about your own or your child’s symptoms, it’s important to call your health care provider.”

People who are not experiencing severe illness do not need to seek medical evaluation or testing for EV-D68. However, when anyone with asthma develops any respiratory illness, it is very important to make sure that the asthma symptoms are under control and to seek immediate medical attention if breathing problems develop.

There is no specific treatment for EV-D68 infections and there is no vaccine available for this illness. As with most respiratory illnesses, the standard advice is to get plenty of rest and fluids. Some over-the-counter medications may help ease symptoms in standard cases. The illness can only be confirmed by laboratory testing, which is only offered to patients that meet specific criteria set by the Wisconsin Division of Public Health.

Respiratory viruses often spread in the fall when children return to school. Prevention of EV-D68 is the same as prevention of colds and other respiratory viruses:

- Wash your hands often (alcohol hand-sanitizer gel can be used if hand washing is not possible)
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth
- Don’t share drinks or eating utensils with people who are sick
- Cover coughs and sneezes
- Stay home if you’re sick

If you have questions about symptoms you or your child are having, call your doctor. If someone is having trouble breathing, call 9-1-1 and seek medical care right away.

EV-D68 is not a reportable disease, which means that hospitals and health care providers are not required to report cases to local health departments.
