REDEVELOPMENT PROJECT UPDATES

The Village Board held a work session on July 9, 2015 as a follow-up to the well attended public information input meeting on redevelopment held on April 28, 2015. Based on what the Board heard at the redevelopment meeting there was a consensus that the Village's Comprehensive Plan and Neighborhood Plan are documents that are relevant and responsive, providing the Village with the general framework it needs to evaluate and consider redevelopment projects along University Avenue.

The following projects are now or will soon be under consideration by the Village and your input is important.

ATT Plaza

This project has been under consideration by the Plan Commission since last October. Two separate public hearings have been held because the project has evolved considerably in response to Plan Commission and resident input.

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE JULY 20, 2015 MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

(Complete detailed minutes will be available on our website or at the Village Hall)

Attendance – Trustee Borisy-Rudin was excused.

Consent Agenda – In an effort to expedite meetings, items on the consent agenda are considered as a group and are adopted with one motion. Any Board member may unilaterally remove an item from the consent agenda if he or she believes the item needs discussion. Consent agenda items included approval of the June 22 minutes; street use permits for ‘Cruisin’ for a Cure’ on August 9 and ‘The Literacy Network’ on October 11; block party permit for Edgehill Drive on September 12.

May 18 Board Minutes – The minutes from the May 18 meeting were removed from the consent agenda to make a slight correction and then approved unanimously.

Dartmouth Road Block Party – The block party permit was removed from the consent agenda in order to change the date from July 26 to August 2. The Board unanimously approved the permit for the Dartmouth Road block party.

Ordinance L-2015-2 – The Board deferred the first reading of ordinance L-2015-2 amending section 7.08(2) Parking, Stopping and Standing regulated by extending no parking exception by permit to include Saturdays, Sundays and holidays on the west side of University Bay Drive from 918 UBD to Oxford Road because the draft ordinance was not ready.

Ordinance L-2015-3 – The Board unanimously waived the first reading of ordinance L-2015-3 adopting general and specific development plans for ATT Plaza redevelopment. Waiver of the reading is the first step toward approval of the rezoning of this property which if passed will allow for the redevelopment of this parcel with a four story mixed use retail apartment project (*see article on page 1*).

Resolution R-2015-6 – The Board unanimously approved [resolution R-2015-6](#) approving the 2014 Compliance Maintenance Annual Report for the sanitary sewer system.

Resolution R-2015-7 – The Board unanimously approved [resolution R-2015-7](#) thanking David Kuenzi for his service as Village Treasurer.

Resolution R-2015-8 – The Board approved [resolution R-2015-8](#) approving the lease with the Blackhawk Country Club on a vote of 5-1 (Mr. Wade voting no). A copy of the lease is available on the Village’s website (www.shorewood-hills.org).

Consider request to amend the October 27 and November 17 Board minutes – The Board considered Marilyn Townsend’s request to amend the Board meeting minutes from October 27 and November 17, 2014 to include Trustee discussions regarding potential ethics violations. The Board will consider the proposed changes at its next meeting.

Consider Special Exception Permit for 3220 Lake Mendota Drive – After considering the Plan Commission findings and recommendation the Board approved the special exception permit for a 140 square foot addition to the home.

Consider Conditional Use Permit for 3220 Lake Mendota Drive – After considering the Plan Commission findings and recommendation the Board approved the conditional use permit for an addition.

Consider Temporary No Parking Signs – The Board considered and approved the placement of temporary “No Parking” signs on certain streets to alert residents of proposed changes to the traffic code related to parking restrictions.

Consider consent for Stafford Rosenbaum to represent Flad Development on unrelated matters while representing the Village in the Pyare Square and ATT Plaza redevelopment matters – Currently there are no matters pending but an attorney who recently began working for Stafford had represented John Flad on lease matters in the past. Stafford Rosenbaum was exploring whether it would be a problem for him to continue this sort of work on separate lease matters if they did not involve the Village of Shorewood Hills. The Trustees decided that that they did not want to consent to this request.

Consider fee waiver policy for recreation program volunteers The Board approved the following policy in order to try and provide an incentive for volunteers to step forward: Volunteer leaders of a Village of

Shorewood Hills team or program, in accordance with its structure, will get one free registration for each session for the volunteer leader's child or a child he or she designates. The programs eligible for this policy include the Land Recreation, Four Corners, Tennis, Canoe/Kayak, Basketball, Soccer and any new programs under the auspice of and upon approval of the Recreation Committee. The term volunteer leader does not include employees of that recreation program who receive payment for his or her position. This policy will take effect in 2016.

Consider communication from WPPA regarding representing the police department as a bargaining agent – The Board adjourned to closed session to discuss this matter and did not take any action upon reconvening to open session.

Consider noise complaint petition – The Board discussed this matter and asked the Village Administrator to continue to work cooperatively with the University of Wisconsin to try to resolve the issue. The willingness of UW to undertake an acoustical study is positive. The Village Administrator and President will work with Gary Brown at UW to try and ensure the study properly addresses the issue.

Road Access to Boathouse Marina and possible actions/referrals – The Board discussed this matter and concluded that vehicle use by the public cannot be condoned due to safety concerns (*see article below*).

Appointments – The Board unanimously approved Mr. Sundquist's appointment of Carl Gulbrandsen and reappointment of Gard Strother, David Ahmann and Karl Wellensieck to the Finance Committee.

Village Administrator's Report – Mr. Frantz reported on a letter from the Department of Revenue regarding suspension of the owner of Accurate Appraisals assessor's license.

Personnel Committee – Mr. Imes reported that the Committee had met recently and would be meeting again on July 29.

Finance Committee – Mr. Benforado reported that the Committee had an interesting meeting devoted to the subject of the municipal court and referred the Board to the draft meeting minutes.

Plan Commission – In addition to other items discussed at the Board meeting, Stone House Development gave a preliminary presentation to the Commission on a project to construct two buildings on Marshall Court that would include office space for Psychiatric Services, presently located at the site, and about 90 apartments.

Recreation Committee – Ms. Readel reported the Committee was exploring programming opportunities for middle school aged children.

Parks Committee – Ms. Readel reported the Committee was looking into the issues of adjacent property owners' encroachments into the parks.

Closed Session – There were closed sessions concerning the Blackhawk lease and the police bargaining request.

Adjourn – The meeting adjourned at 11:40 pm.

BOATHOUSE ACCESS

The Village has recently encountered significant problems with people driving down and then parking in the area around the boathouse in McKenna Park.

Parking in this area is prohibited and vehicles will be ticketed and may be towed. Parked cars block access to the Village sewage lift station. If this lift station were to encounter a problem and service vehicles and equipment were unable to reach it, sewage could flow into Lake Mendota and/or into peoples' homes.

There is zero tolerance for this problem. In addition, access for emergency vehicles must be maintained. The Village will not condone use of this maintenance drive by unauthorized vehicles.

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The Plan Commission has now made a recommendation to the Board for approval and the Board has held the first of three readings of an ordinance to rezone the property and approve the development plan. There will be two more readings that could be combined and held at the next Board meeting on August 17. If that occurs, the rezoning would be granted and the project would be approved from a zoning standpoint. If you are interested in seeing the project plans, they are available at the Village Hall. The next meeting where this project will be discussed is on August 17, 2015. The proposed Flad Development project involves razing the current ATT Plaza at the Shorewood Boulevard entry to the Village and constructing a four story mixed use building, with the fourth story recessed. It will consist of 36 apartments and 10,000 square feet of retail. The building will be setback about nineteen feet off of University Avenue and 51 feet from the corner of University Avenue and Shorewood Boulevard.

Pyare Square

The Plan Commission will hold a public hearing on August 11, 2015 at 7:00 p.m. to take public comment on a proposal; to demolish the Pyare Square building and construct 94 apartment units. The building replicates the Lodge apartment project next door in appearance. This is the opportune time for public input. Copies of this plan are available for review at the Village Hall.

Marshall Court

The Plan Commission heard preliminary plans for the construction of two buildings on Marshall Court on the three parcels on the south side of Marshall Court west of Arbor Crossing. The Stone House Development project would be phased in order to allow Psychiatric Services to continue operations in their current location while a new building is constructed for their new offices.

After the building is constructed and Psychiatric Services moves in, the old building would be demolished and a second building constructed. The combined buildings would contain approximately 94 apartments. Should the project be approved, it is likely the Village will reconstruct the rest of Marshall Court with new sewer, water, pavement and completion of the streetscape improvements. The Village would also secure property to extend the bike path westerly.

An exact timeframe is not yet known but it is likely that project submittals and a public hearing before the Plan Commission will occur within the next few months.

ONE-SIDED PARKING IS COMING TO A STREET NEAR YOU

The Village is considering changes to parking regulations that would make several streets 'one-side parking only' to allow for the safe passage of emergency vehicles. The Village has not received a lot of reaction to this change as publicized in the Bulletin or at meetings held on this subject.



Before considering an ordinance to effectuate these changes and installing permanent signs, the Village is going to test the water and place temporary no parking signs on these streets and see how affected residents react.

ROAD RESURFACING PROJECT

The Village's 2015 road resurfacing project continues through August. A significant number of streets are being resurfaced this year. Parking on the streets may be prohibited during portions of the work.

FOURTH OF JULY IN-REVIEW

It was another picture perfect day for the 4th of July activities in Shorewood Hills, and the day's activities went well. It could not have been accomplished without the help of the EMS & Fire Associations and the many Village residents who answered the call for help.



Work on the July 4th activities begins many weeks before the actual celebration. The people on the front line are the folks at the Village Hall and members the EMS & Fire Associations. David Sykes coordinates all of the activities from preparation and set-up through clean-up so that nothing gets overlooked. Others involved include Police Chief Denny Pine and his officers, Karl Frantz and the Village office staff, and John Mitmoen and the Public Works crew. The Shorewood Hills Community League once again organized a very successful bake sale and arranged to provide frozen treats for everyone following the Parade. A group of volunteers led by Aleasha Anderson and Tricia Underkofler planned

and coordinated the under 6 kids games. A number of Village artisans once again displayed their talents at the Art Fair coordinated by Tad Pinkerton. We are sure there are other artists out there, and we encourage you to come and display your creative side next year. The Board of Trustees chipped in again to man the grills for the Family Picnic. Many other individuals volunteered their time to make things happen (*see list on page 8*). All the activities from the dance through the clean-up went smoothly thanks to all the help.

The Village Dance on the evening of July 3rd was well attended and had the usual mix of kids and adults. The veteran (2 years now!) DJ team of EJ the DJ and Big Jake organized the music complete with the traditional full version of 'American Pie' to end the evening. The daytime activities on July 4th went well. After the Parade wound its way around the school grounds the kids got their balloons and popsicles and then had fun with the booth games for the younger ones and stage games for the rest. The 'water weasel' at the northeast corner of the Heiden Haus field got a workout and kept the kids (and some adults, as well) occupied while the other activities were being organized. The field games got under way with a huge group of kids and adults participating in the annual egg toss. It makes for a bit of a mess, but I think now that we have had a little rain it is once again safe to walk on the field! An injury to one of the participants cut the event a little short this year. The field games concluded with some very competitive waterfights (16 teams this year) complete with the expert play-by-play commentary of veteran EMS & Fire Association 'broadcasters' Dave Ahmann and Jacob Johnson. A new suspension system that made the barrel pretty lively made for some speedy waterfights. Our winner this year was Coop's Troops consisting of Birk, Seth, Cale, Coni, Kristen, and Scott Cooper. There was a good turnout for the Family Picnic with residents bringing a variety of dishes to share to accompany the burgers, chicken, and brats prepared by the Village Board.



At Blackhawk Country Club before the fireworks the Chocolate Shoppe sold ice cream and drinks (a portion of the proceeds were donated to the Fireworks Fund) and the Madison Chamber Orchestra provided musical entertainment including the '1812 Overture' complete with simulated cannon shots courtesy of the EMS & Fire Association pyrotechnicians. There were the usual few minor glitches in the fireworks program that most people don't even notice, but all-in-all it was a great show. One very noticeable glitch was the misspelling of Joanne Rothe's name on a special set piece meant to honor Joanne and Ernie Rothe for their significant bequest to the EMS and Fire Association. We were very pleased with the selection of shells we had this year and particularly with the changes we made to the finale. We are always looking for ways to make the show better. We would like to thank everyone who helped make the show possible with their donations to the

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Fireworks Fund. The final tally is not yet complete (and you can still send in a contribution!), but we should be able to direct at least \$8,000 to the Village towards the cost of the fireworks themselves. Special thanks to Fireworks “Fan”-atics and their families for the very significant donations they made to the Fireworks Fund. We would also like to thank the Blackhawk Country Club for their financial support and cooperation with the use of the grounds for the Fireworks show. Donations to the Fireworks Fund do not cover the entire cost of the show. Blackhawk and the Village split the remaining balance.

One final reminder on fireworks...Each year there are larger and fancier fireworks for sale to the general public, and each year there are tragic accidents involving fireworks. Remember that, while bigger fireworks items are more awesome, they are also more dangerous. Many of us in the EMS & Fire Association have 20 or more years of training and experience. We are very careful in what we do (much more so than the average person would be) and have equipment that allows us to fire most shells remotely, but those years of experience and specialized equipment only minimize the risk of an accident. There is always a potential for problems; and the bigger the fireworks, the bigger the potential danger. Please exercise great care with fireworks if you choose to use them.

All in all it was another very successful Fourth of July! Planning is already under way for next year. All volunteer help is greatly appreciated.

SHOREWOOD HILLS EMS & FIRE ASSOCIATION

The combined Shorewood Hills EMS and Fire Associations remain active in community service to the Village. The purpose of the EMS & Fire Association is to promote the public good within Shorewood Hills and the broader community through community service projects, assisting with the Village's Fourth of July celebration and fireworks, maintaining the Association's antique fire engine, and promoting public health and fire safety.

The Association meets every couple of months to coordinate activities and remain in touch with our friends and former volunteers. GREEN VEGETATION COLLECTION IN JEOPARDY

As a service to Village residents, the Public Works Crew picks up green vegetation and leaves placed at residents' curbsides. The greens are hauled to the County's compost site off of Highway Q while the leaves are taken to the University Houses Gardens.

The Crew was recently notified by the County that the greens deposited at its compost site contain too much soil in the root balls. The County has warned the Village that its permission to use the site may be terminated if the Village's greens continue to arrive with excess soil attached. The Village would then have to haul that material to the landfill and pay considerable amounts to dump it.

Please help protect the present relationship with the County by cleaning the root balls on the greens that you leave at the curb. The Crew will pass on picking up piles of greens with excess soil attached to them.



REMINDERS:

As always, do not rake your greens or leaves into the street (or allow your contracted gardeners to do so). Rain water running through them will wash nutrients to the lake, contributing to algae blooms there. Instead, leave the vegetation on the terrace above the curb.

The Crew does not pick up grass clippings. We highly recommend that you mulch those back into your lawn.

SECURE YOUR HOME BEFORE GOING ON VACATION

For many in the Village, August means vacations. The recreation programs are ending and the swim/dive season is over. It is time to take a break before the school year starts. To avoid a surprise when you get home, please follow these easy safety tips:

- Secure all doors and window in your home and vehicle at night and when away.
- Do not leave valuables or keys in your vehicle(s).
- Contact the U.S. Postal Service and newspaper to stop delivery when going out of town.
- Notify the Police Department when going out of town. A [Vacation Security Report](#) form can be downloaded from the Village's website.
- Inform your neighbors when you will be away and have them check on your home.
- Leave lights on or buy light timers so others think you are home. Lighting is the most cost effective security you have.
- Remove or trim trees and shrubs that may hide windows to your home.
- Take pictures of valuables and serial numbers if the items have them.
- Contact the Police if you notice something out of place. The non-emergency number for the Police Department is 267-1110 (after regular business hours that number is answered by the Dane County Communication Center).

Shorewood Hills Police Department will crack down on drunken motorists during the 'Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over' campaign

To combat drunken driving, Shorewood Hills Police Department will join hundreds of other law enforcement agencies throughout Wisconsin participating in the annual "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over" national campaign from Aug. 21 to Sept. 7.

"Although drunken driving is 100 percent preventable, on average someone is killed or injured in an alcohol-related crash in Wisconsin every three hours," says Officer Weitzel "During the Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over crackdown campaign, our officers will be out in force to arrest drunken drivers before they kill or injure themselves or an innocent victim."

Rather than risk a drunken driving arrest or crash, the Shorewood Hills Police Department urges you to follow these common sense suggestions:

- Choose a sober designated driver before you start drinking.
- If you're feeling buzzed, you likely are over the 0.08 BAC limit and should not drive.
- Take mass transit, a taxicab or ask a sober friend to drive you home.
- The Zero In Wisconsin traffic safety program has a free "Drive Sober" mobile app that can be downloaded by visiting zeroinwisconsin.gov
- Some taverns and restaurants have programs to provide patrons with a safe ride home. Visit www.tlw.org/ and click on Safe Ride.
- Report impaired drivers to law enforcement by calling 911.
