WORD OF THE WOODS

INVASIVE PLANTS TO WATCH OUT FOR IN YOUR YARDS!

As most of you are aware, Garlic Mustard is an invasive species on the Shorewood Hills noxious weed list and must be removed per Village ordinance. We have made great progress over the years reducing and even eliminating this weed from many sites. Keep up the good work! The same goes for buckthorn and non-native honeysuckle. The Village currently doesn't require removal of these invasive shrubs, but we highly encourage it.

In this article, we would like to focus on a few other common invasive species. The following plants have become a significant problem in the Village and action should be taken to abate them on your properties.

JULY - AUGUST 2015

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE JUNE 22, 2015 MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

(Complete detailed minutes will be available on our website or at the Village Hall)

Attendance – Mr. Sundquist and Mr. Lederer were excused.

Appearances and Communications – A communication from Marilyn Townsend was received requesting changes to Board minutes related to ethics issues and closed session proceedings. This item wasn't on the agenda for consideration and will be discussed at a future meeting.

Consent Agenda – In an effort to expedite meetings, items on the consent agenda are considered as a group and are adopted with one motion. Any Board member may unilaterally remove an item from the consent agenda if he or she believes the item needs discussion. Consent agenda items included approval of special events street use permits for July 4th, block party permits for July 4th dance and Topping/Oak Way.

May 18 Board Minutes – Mr. Wade requested the minutes be removed from the consent agenda and recommended that the changes to the Blackhawk Lease discussed with the Village Attorney in the closed sessions and announced in the open session be more clearly enumerated. Approval of the minutes was deferred until those changes could be made.

May 28 Board Minutes – The May 28, 2015 meeting minutes were approved with some spelling corrections.

Tobacco and Liquor Licenses – Mr. Wade asked that the licenses be removed from the consent agenda so that he could ask some general questions about the licensing process. Mr. Frantz provided background information on licensing, specifically related to enforcement and the quota system that regulates on-site liquor consumption licenses. The number of licenses a municipality can issue is one "Class B" for every 500 population. The Village is limited to three licenses. This has an adverse impact on the ability of the Village to attract dining establishments that require a liquor license. The Village and many other communities have attempted to seek revisions to this law, but the Wisconsin Tavern League has a very strong lobbying presence at the state legislature and is against any changes. The Village has been informally advised by the Tavern League that it may be possible to get one time incremental license increases by requesting specific language be inserted into a biannual state budget bill. Upon question Mr. Frantz said he would also look into whether we could prohibit the sale of tobacco products by not issuing licenses including the new vapor cigarettes. The Board unanimously approved liquor licenses for Steve's Liquor, Copps, Sa Bai Thong, Blackhawk Country Club, La Brioche, Chipotle, Vom Fass, Noodles & Company, The Conscious Carnivore, Shorewood Hills EMS & Fire Association; and tobacco license renewals for Steve's Liquor, Walgreen's, Copps, Blackhawk Country Club.

Ordinance L-2015-2 – The Board considered the first reading of ordinance L-2015-2 amending section 7.08(2) Parking, Stopping and Standing regulated by extending no parking exception by permit to include Saturdays, Sundays and holidays on the west side of University Bay Drive from 918 UBD to Oxford Road. This item was deferred until Public Works Chairperson Mark Lederer was in attendance and the ordinance language could be cleaned up.

Consider changes to 2015 road resurfacing project concerning Edgehill/Topping Intersection – The Public Works Committee held an on-site meeting with residents. There was strong support for the project. The Board unanimously approved the inclusion of the Edgehill/Topping intersection as budgeted in the 2015 roads project. The intersection will be tightened up significantly to require vehicles to slow down to make more acute, deliberate turning movements onto and off of Edgehill Drive. The crosswalk may also be painted with colored epoxy paint.

Thank Garden Club for donation to support parks seasonal help – The Board thanked the Garden Club for its \$2,500 contribution to support the forestry and parks seasonal employee salaries.

Village Administrator's Report – Mr. Frantz reported on the status of Blackhawk lease negotiations where the Club may suggest a straight percentage escalator rather than increases based on membership. He also reported on pending redevelopment projects coming to the Plan Commission in July. The Commission will see presentations for a new mixed use, two building, medical office apartment project encompassing three parcels on the southside of Marshall Court; an apartment project at the Pyare Square property; and a revised plan for the AT&T Plaza site reducing the proposed building to three stories. Mr. Frantz provided some materials from the last “Board Retreat” and they discussed some possible topics and dates for two working session meetings to develop direction on planning/redevelopment matters and Village facilities.

Personnel Committee – Mr. Imes indicated the Committee would schedule a meeting to discuss a letter from the Wisconsin Professional Police Association (WPPA) that the Shorewood Hill Police Association is requesting representation by WPPA. Mr. Frantz indicated that because the Village is under 2,500 population last best offer binding arbitration does not apply if there is impasse after voluntary mediation. The Village can require an election from prospective members of the bargaining unit which the Board can consider at its July meeting.

Finance Committee – Mr. Benforado reported the Committee will delve into the economics of the Village's municipal court at its July 15 meeting.

Plan Commission – Concerning the University Bay Fields, it was learned at a recent Joint West Campus meeting that the fields are zoned as a conservancy and any changes to the current use of the land would require conditional use approval from the City of Madison Plan Commission.

Recreation Committee – Ms. Readel reported on the Committee's discussion regarding the 4 Corners and Land Rec programs. Parent volunteers for these programs are scarce. A suggestion to entice prospective parent volunteers could be waving all or a portion of the program fee for their child. The Committee will discuss this further and bring a proposal to the Board. The Committee also discussed a hiring issue. They would like the authority to hire program staff delegated to the Rec Committee to avoid the lag time inherent in the Personnel Committee's recommendation and Board approval to hire employees. Mr. Imes indicated the Personnel Committee would discuss options to streamline the process. Mr. Benforado voiced his preference that the Board ultimately approve all hires in the Village.

Parks Committee – Ms. Readel reported on the Committee's meeting at Big Foot Park. The area was cleared last year to restore access to a sewer manhole and the Committee is looking at beautification options for the park. The Committee is also working on a landscape plan for Oxford Road near the University Bay Drive intersection and standard notification letters for the Forester to use when beginning projects in the Village.

Adjourn – The meeting adjourned at 9:02 pm.

ROAD RESURFACING PROJECT

The Village's 2015 road resurfacing project is well underway. A significant number of streets are being resurfaced this year. Parking on the streets may be prohibited during portions of the work.



FOURTH OF JULY VOLUNTEER HELP IS NEEDED

Preparations for this year's Fourth of July celebration in Shorewood Hills are coming along but we could use some more volunteers from the community. Last year a good number of residents and friends came out to help. We learned a lot in our first year without extra personnel from the Fire Department and have identified a number of tasks that just need bodies to complete. We are calling these '30 minute jobs'. These are jobs any able-bodied person can be of assistance, no special skills required. Some may take a bit longer than 30 minutes, some less.

- Help set up the Art Fair (July 4 morning)
- Help blow up helium balloons (July 4 morning)
- Help pick up the fire hose for the "Water Weasel" (July 4 afternoon)
- Help pick up the waterfight hose and equipment (July 4 afternoon)
- Help clean up the golf course after the fireworks (July 5 early morning)
- Help haul tables and chairs back to the Community Center (July 5 morning)

There are some more involved jobs that would require a longer commitment and some extra, simple training. The Shorewood Hills EMS & Fire Association is still deeply involved in the Village's Fourth of July celebration and is always looking for new members to join. The group has been meeting every other month to conduct business, plan activities, and socialize. Membership in this Association is open to anyone who wishes to participate.

We hope we can continue with the full slate of activities this Fourth of July, but it will require some help. Please consider volunteering your time or even becoming a member of the Association. MUSIC BEFORE THE FIREWORKS

The Village of Shorewood Hills and the Blackhawk Country Club will once again co-sponsor the fireworks show at Blackhawk on the evening of July 4th. We are delighted to once again have the **Wisconsin Chamber Orchestra** playing holiday favorites on the 10th tee (sponsored by Physicians Plus Insurance Corporation, Meriter Medical Group and UW Credit Union). The concert will begin at about 8:00 pm and last an hour or so. There will be plenty of chairs set up to the south of the 10th tee or enjoy the music from your spot on the hill.

In addition, there will be ice cream and popcorn available for sale outside the clubhouse to tempt you before the show begins! The fireworks will start when it is sufficiently dark (about 9:30 pm).



ONCE MORE AROUND THE PARK, DRIVER!

Volunteers are needed at the 4th of July fireworks show to driving around in circles. No map or GPS is needed, the directions are very simple, and you get about three feet closer to the fireworks than anyone other than the pyrotechnic crew.

We set out a yellow 'crowd control' rope around the perimeter of the fireworks display to establish a 'fallout' zone, an area where any potentially dangerous fireworks debris could fall. Spectators are not allowed within this zone. To insure that spectators remain outside of this zone we have individuals continuously patrolling this rope in golf carts (that's the driving in circles part) prior to and during the fireworks display. A golf cart is built to accommodate two people, so if you and a friend or family member would like to help by simply sitting in a nice cushy golf cart instead of on the hard ground while also getting an up-close 360 degree view of the show, please contact David Sykes (dsykes@shorewood-hills.org or 267-2680) at the Village Hall.

ANNUAL LEAGUE JULY 4TH BAKE SALE!



LEAVE THE FIREWORKS TO THE PROFESSIONALS

The sale of fireworks typically increases this time of year, but many of the fireworks sold in Wisconsin can not be legally used by individuals. Sparklers (shorter than 36"), stationary cones and fountains, toy snakes, smoke bombs, caps, noisemakers and confetti poppers with less than ¼ grain of explosive mixture are the only legal fireworks allowed in the Village of Shorewood Hills (and neighboring communities). Even these legal fireworks can be dangerous!

Amateur fireworks endanger not only the users, but also bystanders and surrounding buildings. Simple fireworks can cause serious injuries to the eyes, head and hands. Is the risk of potentially permanent injury to you or your family worth a few seconds of fireworks fun?

The Shorewood Hills EMS & Fire Association urges you to avoid using all fireworks and leave the fireworks show to the professionals! Come to see us shoot off an outstanding fireworks display at the Blackhawk Country Club on Saturday night, July 4. Our personnel have completed extensive safety training and work under established guidelines in a controlled setting. Safety is our number one goal.

After this type of large fireworks display, you should never pick up fireworks or casings that may have fallen to the ground. Fireworks that have been ignited and fail to immediately explode or discharge may still be active. Children (and adults) should stay away from smoking or charred remnants and notify the Fire Department immediately for proper disposal.

If you must use fireworks, please:

- Read and follow the directions.
- Have an adult present to supervise.
- Use fireworks outdoors.
- Always have water on hand (a garden hose and a bucket).
- Ignite fireworks on a flat surface away from any combustible or flammable materials.
- Keep fireworks away from the house, dry leaves, decks, woodchips, etc.
- Never give fireworks to small children.
- Do not let small children use sparklers as they can produce 1,200° heat which is easily enough to burn skin or ignite clothing!
- Never point fireworks at other people.
- Never re-light a "dud" firework (wait 15-20 minutes and place the "dud" in a bucket of water to soak).
- The fireworks user should always wear eye protection.
- Never put any part of the body over the fireworks.

CANOE / KAYAK SHARE PROGRAM

Enjoy Lake Mendota by kayak or canoe this summer by joining the Village's Canoe / Kayak Share Program. The \$30 annual membership fee per household includes unlimited use (as available) of the Village's canoes and kayaks for the season May 15 to October 15. The 2015 membership form is available on the Village website (www.shorewood-hills.org) >> **'Recreation Program'** >> **'Canoe / Kayak Share Program'** or you can fill out the on-line form at the front counter at the Village Hall.

Adult residents are eligible for membership. Guests may use the boats when accompanied by a member. WORD OF THE WOODS *(continued from page 1)*

Goutweed (*Aegopodium podagraria*) – Also called Bishop's Weed and Snow-in-the-Mountain. It is an aggressive ground cover that readily out-competes native species. This perennial is shade tolerant and spreads via rhizomes (roots that spread from the original plant and can sprout new plants). Removal of goutweed is difficult and is most effective when done consistently over time.



When digging them up, you must go at least 6 inches deep to locate and remove all the rhizomes. Cutting back or mowing can help reduce its spreading ability. Do NOT place plant material in compost sites as you will likely spread the weed to other areas.

Creeping Bellflower (*Campanula rapunculoides*)

– While Creeping Bellflower was originally introduced as an ornamental plant in gardens, it has become a highly competitive invader found in woodlands, stream banks, prairies, and urban areas. It has become especially problematic in many Village flowerbeds! Creeping bellflower grows 1-3' tall and has blue-purple bell-shaped flowers.



Like goutweed, creeping bellflower is particularly difficult to remove by pulling or digging. You need to dig at least 6 inches deep to locate and remove all rhizomes. For more information go to: <http://learningstore.uwex.edu/Assets/pdfs/A3924-05.pdf>.

Japanese Knotweed (*Fallopia japonica*) – Japanese Knotweed has bamboo-like stems and forms large shrub-like colonies that can grow up to ten feet tall. Like many other invasive species it can re-sprout from small segments of root left behind, so it is important that all of the roots are removed. Japanese knotweed is particularly invasive because it produces chemicals that are toxic to the surrounding vegetation, killing nearby plants and taking over the newly emptied areas.

Dame's Rocket (*Hesperis matronalis*)

– Dame's Rocket, like Garlic Mustard, is in the mustard family and is a biennial. Often, when Garlic Mustard is removed, Dame's Rocket is among the first to colonize the area. Although its purple and white flowers make this an attractive plant, its ability to monopolize large areas make it a threat to native ecosystems and gardens. Removal of Dame's Rocket is relatively simple and can be done effectively via pulling the plants, taking care to including the roots.




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Control of Noxious Weeds – It is everyone’s responsibility to try and eradicate noxious weeds from the Village. Otherwise these invasive plants overwhelm the area’s native species and drastically reduce the diversity and function of the ecosystem.


