## FOURTH OF JULY VOLUNTEER HELP IS NEEDED

**HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE MAY 18, 2015 MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES**

*(Complete detailed minutes will be available on our website or at the Village Hall)*

**Attendance** – All Trustees were in attendance.

**Appearance and Communications** – Marilyn Townsend requested the opportunity to address the Board.

Ms. Townsend expressed her concerns about the Village's ability to monitor Blackhawk Country Club membership numbers and other issues with the terms of the proposed lease.

**Consent Agenda** – In an effort to expedite meetings, items on the consent agenda are considered as a group and are adopted with one motion. Any Board member may unilaterally remove an item from the consent agenda if he or she believes the item needs discussion. Consent agenda items included approval of the April 21 minutes; a special event street use permit for the Her Madison Half Marathon on June 28; and authorization to publish notice of intention to circulate a notice of petition to detach a strip of land near the Pyare Square building from the City of Madison to Shorewood Hills.

**Consider accepting 2014 financial statements** – Vicki Hellenbrand of Baker Tilly was present to summarize the Village's 2014 financial statements, auditor's report and management letter. The Finance Committee received a similar report and recommended acceptance. The Board unanimously accepted the 2014 financial statements.

**Consider 2015 road resurfacing project and request for additions** – Mr. Lederer and Public Works Chief John Mitmoen reviewed the 2015 project scope and rating program used to determine road conditions. After some requests from residents to include additional sections of certain streets in the resurfacing project, Mr. Mitmoen and Village Engineer Brian Berquist reevaluated some of the streets. The Board asked the Public Works Committee to meet to discuss Mr. Mitmoen's and Mr. Berquist's recent evaluation and make a recommendation to the Board regarding adding streets to the 2015 resurfacing project and if additional streets need resurfacing and/or repair in 2015/2016. The Board could add approximately \$112K to the current road resurfacing contract and will meet on May 28, 2015 to consider the recommendation from the Public Works Committee.

**Resolution R-2015-5 Authorizing the issuance/sale of \$2.2M general obligation promissory notes** – Brad Viegut of R.W. Baird reviewed the six bids received this morning. The low bid came from UMB Bank in Kansas City with an overall rate of 1.74%, which was lower than estimated. Mr. Viegut stated Standard & Poor's gave the Village an AA+ rating and noted the Village's strong ability to repay the bonds over a relatively short period (10 years) as factors in the high rating. The Board unanimously approved Resolution R-2015-5 authorizing the issuance and sale of \$2.2M general obligation promissory notes to UMB Bank.

**Consider additional costs incurred to pave Blackhawk Country Club parking lot** – During excavation of the old parking lot, the contractors ran into heavy clay and poor weather turned it into a soft mucky mess that couldn't be paved over. The bad material needed to be removed and new stone and gravel put down causing an unexpected expense to the project. The Board agreed to roll the approximately \$28K additional cost to repave the parking lot into the original \$110K loan agreement with Blackhawk Country Club that was approved at the previous Board meeting.

**Consider lease with Blackhawk Country Club** – Village Attorney Matt Dregne summarized items in the proposed lease that have been the subject of discussion:

- Clarification of the membership categories to exclude honorary social members and student members which pay minimal dues and fees in order to lower the base which should be an advantage to the Village in order to establish the base membership number as of October 2014.
- Use of a unique membership ID number and procedure to allow the Village the ability to audit the number of memberships without disclosing personally identifiable information.
- Including access to food and beverage service for guests of resident non-members and their families.
- Blackhawk's bank request that they have the ability to assign the lease in the event of default without the Village's consent as the bank views the lease as Blackhawk's main source of collateral.

The Board went into closed session twice to discuss these matters. In open session the Board reported it

authorized Mr. Dregne to redraft language in the lease incorporating the first three measures listed above and include verbiage regarding the assignment of the lease to require prior consultation with the Village and 90 days notice prior to any assignment, sublet, transfer or encumbrance.

**Consider alternative date for June meeting** – Due to potential quorum issues, the Board decided to reschedule it's regularly June meeting to Monday, June 22, 2015 at 7:00 pm.

**Appointments** – The Board unanimously approved the appointment of Sean Cote to the position of Village Treasurer.

**Village President's Report** – Mr. Sundquist reported on the UW Master Plan Executive Leadership Committee meeting where he articulated the Village's concerns regarding the University Bay Fields Plan and commended UW-Madison's efforts towards sustainability (energy efficient buildings, lighting, etc.).

**Public Works Committee** – Mr. Lederer reported the Committee will hold a joint meeting with the Parks Committee at 5:00 pm on June 8 to discuss restoration of "Big Foot Park" and possible reclassification of the land. Also on June 8 at 7:00 pm the Committee will hold a public information meeting regarding the possible change to parking restrictions in the Village.

**Adjourn** – The meeting adjourned at about 12:45 pm.

**Independence Day Dance** – We kick off the 4th of July celebration with the traditional Independence Day Dance. 

### DISPLAY FIREWORKS 101 WORKSHOPS

Have you ever entertained thoughts of getting involved with the 4th of July fireworks show? Have you ever just been curious about display fireworks and how they are set up and fired? Want to know the difference between a peony and a chrysanthemum, black match and quick match, or a hummer and a tourbillion?

The pyrotechnicians of the EMS & Fire Association will hold a **Fireworks 101 Workshop** for anyone that would like to attend. The date will be **Wednesday, June 17 at 6:30 pm**. We hope to be outdoors on the school grounds, but we can move inside the Fire Station if necessary.

We will cover the basics of the different types of display fireworks, their composition, how they are constructed, and how we set up and fire our 4th of July fireworks show. Children are welcome to attend if accompanied by an adult. Unlike the 4th of July, everyone can get up-close and personal since we will not actually be firing fireworks. The Workshop will last probably less than an hour.

## POSSIBLE CHANGES TO PARKING RESTRICTIONS

**One-sided parking only? Whose side? What for? Sounds like a one sided issue.** The Village Public Works and Public Health & Safety Committees will hold a public information/input meeting at the Village Hall on **Tuesday, June 8, 2015 at 7:00 pm** regarding a plan to create a new ordinance that would limit parking to one-side only on many Village streets, and no parking on both sides of a few sections of streets.

The predominate reason that this change is being considered is to allow the passage of fire trucks on Village streets. If cars are allowed to park on both sides of the streets and are opposite each other, fire trucks are unable to get through. Additionally, plow trucks and trash trucks can't make it through either.

Traditional traffic engineering standards require one-sided parking only on streets less than 32 feet wide. However, the Village plan has modified this standard to any street less than 28 feet in width. If people park carefully and snow banks are not too large, fire vehicles can narrowly pass on a street 28 feet wide with cars parked on both sides. A typical car needs eight feet of width to park and a typical fire vehicle needs 10 feet to pass through. That is tight squeeze and doesn't leave much room to maneuver, especially when the speed of arrival may have life safety implications.

Below is a list of streets to be considered no-sided and one-sided including which side of the street parking will be allowed. The side chosen for no parking was based on the following criteria with the base assumption being that more parking is better:

- Where is more space available, either due to fewer driveways, narrower driveways, or more clustered driveways?
- Are there any sight constraints due to curving streets (preference for being on outside of curve)?
- Are mailboxes predominantly on one side? Can they be combined to be opposite parking?
- Are there steep driveways on either side, potentially creating a problem in icy conditions (cars leaving driveways sliding into parked cars)?
- Are steep grades (either cliffs or dropoffs) present that would make parking difficult?

If you have questions, concerns and wish to provide input please consider coming to the June 8 meeting. The next step would be for the Village Board to consider an ordinance affecting these changes.

If, after the Open Book session and/or talking to the assessor, you wish to object to the assessment contact the Village Clerk at 267-2680 to file a "Form of Objection" and to schedule an appointment before the local Board of Review. You will need to file a written or oral intent to object with the Clerk at least 48 hours prior to the Board of Review. The Board will be meeting at the Village Hall on **Tuesday, June 9, 2015 from 4:30 pm to 6:30 pm.**

Appearances at the Board of Review are by appointment only. The Board of Review functions like a court in that it is required to evaluate evidence based on fact. You must provide factual information showing your property is incorrectly assessed.


### CANOE / KAYAK SHARE PROGRAM


Adults & Kids > 12 years old:
