## TAX BILL ADDRESS UPDATES

The best way to do this is by checking last year's tax bill. If the address is incorrect or you are not sure what mailing address is being used, contact the Village Hall at 267-2680 or by e-mail at [info@shorewood-hills.org](mailto:info@shorewood-hills.org). Any address changes must be received by November 15 before the tax bills are printed by Dane County.

Village policy is to send the tax bill to the property owner. Tax bills will not be sent to your financial institution. Village staff expects to send out tax bills to property owners in mid-December.

**HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE SEPTEMBER 21, 2015 MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES**

*(Complete detailed minutes will be available on our website or at the Village Hall)*

**Attendance** – All trustees were present.

**Consent Agenda** – In an effort to expedite meetings, items on the consent agenda are considered as a group and are adopted with one motion. Any Board member may unilaterally remove an item from the consent agenda if he or she believes the item needs discussion. Consent agenda items included approval of the August 17 open and closed meeting minutes; Solicitor's Permits for Wisconsin Public Television representatives; and, Street Use Permits for Huffin' for Habitat 5K Run on September 27, and the Waisman Whirl 5K Run, Walk and Roll on October 18.

**Ordinance L-2015-2** – The Board unanimously waived the first reading of ordinance L-2015-2 Amending Section 7.08(2) 'Parking, Stopping and Standing Regulated' by extending no parking except by permit to include Saturdays, Sundays and holidays on the west side of University Bay Drive from 918 University Bay Drive to Harvard Drive. The Board expects to complete the second and third readings of the ordinance at its October meeting.

**Ordinance L-2015-3** – The Board waived the third and final reading of ordinance L-2015-3 Adopting General and Specific Development Plans for ATT Plaza redevelopment on a vote of 6-1 (Ms. Readel voting no).

**Ordinance L-2015-4** – The Board unanimously waived the third and final reading of ordinance L-2015-4 attaching territory detached from the City of Madison and approved the ordinance.

**Consider action on Marilyn Townsend requesting amending minutes of October 27 and November 17** – After comments from the public and Ms. Townsend, and a discussion by the Trustees, the Board decided to continue its practice of not recording closed session meetings per the recommended best practice from the League of Wisconsin Municipalities. The Board also voted to not change the previously approved minutes but to include Ms. Townsend's memos in this month's meeting minutes on a 5-1-1 vote (Mr. Sundquist voting no, Ms. Readel abstaining).

**Consider addition to Village Financial Policies and Procedures Manual concerning Post Debt Issuance Compliance Training** – The Board tabled this issue until the Finance Committee is able to review the compliance training requirements and possibly change the language to be included in the manual.

**Consider recommendations of Public Works Committee concerning Village parking restrictions** – Mr. Lederer reviewed the conditions and thought process of the Public Works and Public Health & Safety Committees to date. A couple of residents questioned the criteria of using 28 feet as a minimum road width and the inconsistency of measurements on specific sections of the streets. The suggestion was made to focus on specific narrow points of individual streets first before instituting sweeping changes throughout the Village. Mr. Sundquist pointed out the Committees and the Board were trying to balance the needs of residents, emergency vehicles, pedestrians and other vehicles. The Board directed staff to take down the temporary no parking signs for now, then put signs back up on specific sections of streets. The issue was referred back to the Public Works and Public Health & Safety Committees for further consideration.

**Village President's Report** – Mr. Sundquist reported on the UW Master Plan Executive Committee meeting. They have not yet discussed any plans for the University Bay fields. He will continue to attend the meetings and provide updates when available.

**Village Administrator's Report** – Mr. Frantz reported that there is money available if any trustees are interested in attending the League of Wisconsin Municipalities Annual Conference. He also provided an update on the Tax Incremental Financing and Districts. TIF #3 and #4 may close with a surplus which could possibly fund major University Avenue improvements. The Village's consultants are reviewing the TIFs as they relate to the ATT Plaza and Pyare Square redevelopments. A discussion of possible amendments to TIF #3 for ATT Plaza and a new TIF for Pyare Square will likely occur at the October Board meeting.

**Finance Committee** – Mr. Benforado reported the Committee is meeting several times in September and October to work on the 2016 budget. The Finance Committee would prefer to have recommendations from

committees for specific line items, equipment and policies.

**Plan Commission** – Mr. Sundquist reported that the Commission recommended the Lodge II project on a vote of 6-1. The no vote was related to concerns that there should be more affordable housing in the project and spread affordable units to areas other than Marshall Court. It was pointed out that the economic realities for each project contribute to the ability of the Village to subsidize affordable units. Following the vote, Mr. Flad discussed the possibility of increasing the Lodge II to a 5-story building. He would need to begin the zoning process again if he wanted to change the project.

**Parks Committee** – Ms. Readel reported the Committee was looking at landscaping possibilities for Oxford Road near University Bay Drive as well as the encroachment of private property improvements into Village parks. She mentioned that the new entry sign built by the Public Works Crew looks great.

**Closed Session** – The Board went into closed session to discuss a potential employee wage claim.

**Adjourn** – The meeting adjourned at 10:24 pm.

## Next Bulletin Deadline: Monday, October 19

**RESIDENT ELECTED TO MMSD BOARD** – Prior to 2016, members of the Board overseeing the Madison Metropolitan Sanitary Sewerage District were appointed by the County Executive. A change was made through legislation that provided for representation by Dane County municipalities who are members of the district. This change seems to make sense since it is mostly Cities and Villages that pay for the treatment of wastewater and who belong to the district. The City of Madison was the primary lobbyist advocating for this change.

The Dane County Cites and Village Association administered the election of three municipal representatives to sit on the Board. The City of Madison has its own seats to fill. Village President Mark Sundquist along with Monona Mayor Mark Miller nominated Village resident Brian Potts for election to this Board. Mayors and Village Presidents voted on the nominees. Mr. Potts was the top vote getter and was elected to serve a three year term. It will be very beneficial to the Village to have a resident serving on this important Board which is tackling crucial water quality issues facing Dane County including a proposed adaptive management program. Mr. Potts is an environmental attorney at Foley and Lardner and also provides counsel to the Yahara Clean Lakes Alliance.

**ONE-SIDE PARKING** – After hearing from residents the Village Board and Public Works Committee has decided to approach this issue more incrementally, focusing on streets that are less than 24 feet in width and pinch-point areas on streets that have varying widths. This approach takes the number of streets under consideration, for additional parking restrictions, down dramatically.

### DEVELOPMENT PROJECTS

- The **ATT Plaza** project rezoning for a mixed-use apartment building has been approved. The Village will now consider whether tax increment financing will be made available for the project. Half of the \$900,000 TIF request is to provide affordable housing units. The other half is to pay for relocation costs of current leaseholders.
- The **Pyare Square Lodge II** apartment project rezoning has been recommended to the Board for consideration in October.

**BLACKHAWK LEASE** – The new lease was approved by the Board in July and has now been signed by all parties. The new lease provides the Village with much needed space to construct a storage building and preparations for that project are being made.

## FIRE PREVENTION WEEK (*October 4-10, 2015*)

This year's Fire Prevention Week campaign slogan is 'Hear the BEEP where you SLEEP' referring to smoke detectors.

**Smoke alarms that are properly installed and maintained play a vital role in reducing fire deaths and injuries.** Smoke alarms save lives. If there is a fire in your home, smoke spreads quickly and you need smoke alarms to give you time to get out. Having a working smoke alarm cuts the chances in half of dying in a reported fire. Almost two-thirds of home fire deaths resulted from fires in homes with no smoke alarms or no working smoke alarms.

Here's what you need to know:

- Install smoke alarms in every bedroom, outside each sleeping area and on every level of your home.
- Test your smoke alarms every month.
- When a smoke alarm sounds, get outside and stay outside.
- Replace all smoke alarms in your home every 10 years.

## KEEP LEAVES OUT OF THE STREET

Choices you make this fall can help keep area waters clean next summer. Red, gold, and orange leaves gently falling from trees is a true symbol that autumn has arrived here in Wisconsin. The choices we make with falling leaves today can impact the health of our land and water next summer. Nutrients released from decaying leaves are a great addition to lawns and gardens, but are unwelcome guests to area lakes and rivers.

Leaves and yard debris in the street gets washed directly to lakes and streams via storm drains when it rains. Even if the leaves never move, rainwater running over and through them makes a nutrient-rich tea that's carried directly to the storm drains promoting algae growth in lakes and rivers. The good news is that together we can take simple actions to keep leaves and nutrients out of our waters.

**Mulch** – Mulch leaves directly on the lawn. Shredded leaves act as a natural fertilizer returning nutrients to the lawns. If your lawn mower has a bagger, empty the chopped up leaves on gardens, flowerbeds or around trees and shrubs.

**Compost** – Mix leaves with other compostable items and spread it on gardens next spring. It saves money and water, helps your gardens, and benefits the environment. **Rake** – If you rake, pile leaves on the terrace, not in the street. Covering the piles with a tarp is a good idea to prevent them from blowing around and reduce nutrients that can leach from them during a rain. During the fall, the Village Crew can usually make a complete circuit through the Village to pick up leaves.

## BRUSH COLLECTION

Throughout the spring, summer and fall the Village Crew will chip resident's brush left at the curbside. The Village's “Chipper” can take branches up to 12 inches in diameter. For ease of pickup, residents should arrange the brush on the curb such that the ends of the branches are all oriented in the same direction. Longer branches are easier for the Crew to feed into the chipper, so there is no need to cut branches down to any specific length. Brush piles should be three feet from obstructions like trees, poles, signs and mailboxes.

Village residents doing their own work are allowed to pile brush and trimmed greens at the curb. If you hire a contractor, like Green Acres, Madison Tree Service, etc., to do your yard work, the contractor is responsible for hauling away the material.



## FALL LEAF PICKUP

The Village Crew has started seasonal leaf collection. Because of the large number of trees in Shorewood Hills, leaf collection is a monumental task. The Crew uses a leaf picking machine to suck up leaves into a box truck for disposal. To assist them in their task:


- Please do not bag leaves. Rake them to the curb, not into the street.
- Leaf piles should be three feet from trees, poles, signs and mailboxes so that the vacuuming arm is not obstructed.
- Please make sure that you keep all rocks, construction debris, soil and branches out of your leaf piles. Rocks, nails, dirt, etc. wreak havoc on the leaf picker causing expensive repairs and endanger the operators.
- When picking up leaves, the Crew makes an entire round of the Village from one end to the other (usually once a week). Special pickups are not possible.
- If the Crew picks up your neighbors' leaves but not yours, the reason may be as simple as the box truck was full, a car was blocking the leaf pile, or time ran out in the day. They will get back to your leaf pile as soon as possible.
- The Crew will pick up leaves until they are covered with snow or frozen to the ground.

## LEAF RAKING, SNOW SHOVELING, DOG WALKING ENTREPRENEURS

The weather is turning colder now that fall is officially here. Before we know it, the snow will be flying. Do you need help with leaf raking or snow shoveling? For several years, the Village Hall has kept a list of Shorewood Hills kids interested in doing odd jobs including raking leaves, mowing lawns, dog walking, pet sitting, shoveling snow or other work. Residents looking to hire help may contact the Village Hall to get a list of these young community entrepreneurs.

### IMMUNIZATION CLINIC IN NOVEMBER

Home Health United will be at the Village Hall on Tuesday, November 3 in the morning (7:30 am to 9:00 am) and afternoon (4:30 pm to 6:00 pm) as part of its series of immunization clinics in Dane County.

Annual immunization is necessary since new strains of the flu appear each year. The 2015-2016 flu vaccine will protect against the influenza viruses that research indicates will be most common during this season.

Officials at the Center for Disease Control (CDC) say the best time to get a flu shot is October through December. High-risk individuals should get their flu shot in October. Everyone is encouraged to get vaccinated to prevent becoming ill with influenza or transmitting it to others.

If you do catch the flu, the vaccination should lessen your symptoms. The CDC especially recommends the following groups get vaccinated:

- Those with chronic medical conditions and persons who live with or care for persons in the high-risk groups (like healthcare workers or primary care givers)
- All children over six months old
- Adults age 65 or over
- Pregnant women

## WORD OF THE WOODS

### OAK PRUNING SEASON OPEN


As our Village ordinance indicates, pruning of oak trees is allowed from October 1 to March 31, which will help prevent the spread of disease and bug infestation. So now is a good time to schedule any pruning needs you may have for oak trees on your property.

### MONEY REALLY DOES GROW ON TREES!

#### Summary of Public Tree Inventory and Benefits:

- Shorewood Hills receives \$937,622 in annual benefits from its public trees. Comparing this to annual tree maintenance costs of \$130,000, a benefit to cost ratio of 7:1 is calculated. For each dollar the Village invests in its forestry operations it receives \$7.21 in return.
- 6,182 trees have been inventoried on Shorewood Hills public property (3,421 are street trees and 2,761 are found in parks and other Village green spaces).
- The replacement value (Council of Tree and Landscape Appraiser's formula) for these trees is \$6.9 million (an average of \$1,128 per tree).
- Annually, public trees in Shorewood Hills sequester nearly 2 million pounds of carbon. This carbon load is equal to driving an average car 1.9 million miles.
- Trees in Shorewood Hills intercept 8.2 million gallons of stormwater per year resulting in an annual benefit valued at \$221,917.
- 5,130 pounds of air pollutants are removed annually by trees included in this inventory for a total value of \$31,139 each year.
- Aesthetic and cultural benefits provided by public trees were attributed a value of \$620,674.
- Energy savings, brought about by lower cooling and heating costs, total \$228,841 annually for Village residents.
- 116 different tree species are found within Shorewood Hills.
- The top five most common tree species found were hackberry (8.7%), Norway maple (7.9%), black locust (5.7%), white oak (5.7%), and green ash (5.7%).
- 63% of the trees inventoried are considered mature or old.
- 65% of public trees inventoried were in good or excellent condition, while 8% were rated in poor or very poor condition.
- The total value of the public trees inventoried was \$6,290,054.
