TEMPORARY NO PARKING SIGNS

The Trustees are considering changes to the Village parking regulations. If enacted, parking on several streets will be limited to one side only. The change would be to facilitate emergency response access, as well as access for service vehicles like trash trucks and snow plows.

Temporary no parking signs were recently put up on these streets in an effort to obtain input from residents before more permanent decisions are enacted. The Public Works Committee has solicited public comment through Bulletin articles, public hearings and e-mail blasts but has not received much input. Concerned the lack of comment was not to be taken as implicit acceptance,

SEPTEMBER - OCTOBER 2015

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE AUGUST 17, 2015 MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

(Complete detailed minutes will be available on our website or at the Village Hall)

Attendance – Mr. Imes and Ms. Readel were excused.

Appearances & Communications – Gary Johnson reported on the successful July 4 event and in particular the fireworks. The Village and Blackhawk cost share was under \$300.00 a piece due the significant number of donations received. The Board and those in attendance gave Mr. Johnson a round of applause in appreciation of all his hard volunteer work to pull this off each and every year. Marilyn Townsend appeared and referred to a memo she had prepared for the Board. She requests the Board consider taping closed sessions.

Consent Agenda – In an effort to expedite meetings, items on the consent agenda are considered as a group and are adopted with one motion. Any Board member may unilaterally remove an item from the consent agenda if he or she believes the item needs discussion. Consent agenda items included approval of the July 9 special meeting minutes; July 20 open and closed meeting minutes; Class A Liquor License for Lee's Oriental; LTE Hires for the tennis program, basketball program, and public works; Wage adjustment for Police seasonal CSO; Wage adjustment for five pool employees. The minutes were all removed from the consent agenda for slight revisions, they were then approved. The liquor license was also removed so that a question could be answered, it was then approved. Hires for the basketball program were removed due to a Board member having a family member being hired and the Trustee wished to be recused from that action.

Ordinance L-2015-2 – The Board deferred the first reading of ordinance L-2015-2 Amending Section 7.08(2) Parking, Stopping and Standing regulated by extending no parking except by permit to include Saturdays, Sundays and holidays on the west side of University Bay Drive from 918 University Bay Drive to Oxford Road. The Board referred the matter back to the Public Works Committee due to indications that there were residents not in favor of the new regulation especially north of Harvard Drive. It seems as though residents south of Harvard are in agreement with the new regulation but that needs verification. If there is support, the regulation can be extended to just the 900 block of University Bay Drive.

Ordinance L-2015-3 – The Board waived the second reading of ordinance L-2015-3 Adopting General and Specific Development Plans for ATT Plaza redevelopment. Action on the third and final reading will occur at the September 21 Board meeting.

Ordinance L-2015-4 – The Board waived the first and second reading of ordinance L-2015-4 attaching territory from the City of Madison.

Resolution R-2015-9 – The Board unanimously approved resolution R-2015-9 thanking the City of Madison Fire Department for providing the Village with high quality emergency service.

Consider approval of CSM for ATT Plaza – The Board unanimously approved the certified survey map for ATT Plaza with the conditions that the developer, Flad Development, takes title to the property, the zoning change is approved, and the development agreement is signed and entered into by the developer and Village.

Consider action on Communications from the WPPA – The Board took this item up in closed session noticed later on the agenda.

Consider action on Marilyn Townsend requesting amending minutes of October 27 and November 17 – The Board deferred action until the September Board meeting to have time to review the issue more and to listen to segments of the meetings in question.

Consider bid and contract award for sanitary sewer lining project for Lake Mendota Drive area – Village Engineer Brian Berquist reviewed the project bids and responded to questions. This clay sewer line is located off street on the lake side of homes and even runs under some homes. It is very difficult and in some areas impossible to clean. Video shows segments of cracked pipe, open joints and roots. This project will use cured in place pipe (CIPP) technology. CIPP is a trenchless method to repair existing pipelines. The result is a seamless, jointless pipe within a pipe. Root problems occur at clay pipe joints where roots enter the pipe and then grow in a nutrient rich environment into masses that block flow and catch other

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materials. After the project, these joints will no longer exist except where laterals meet the pipe. In other areas of the Village the crew can use our sewer jetter and root cutter to clean out the pipes. The project was awarded to the low bidder, Terra Construction, in the amount of \$162,800. By extending the completion date to May 1, 2016 the Village saved \$10,000.

Village President's Report – Mr. Sundquist reported on the status of the noise complaint issue. Village officials met with the UW, UW Hospital, and Wisconsin Department of Administration that are funding the study and the consultant. It was a very productive and positive meeting. Locations where the noise measurements will be taken have been identified and include properties where the Village has received complaints. Monitoring will be taken at night when conditions are optimal as well as during the day (for instance, waiting until after the cicada season is over). A report should be completed by mid-October. The shared goal is to identify the most often reported noises that are creating the annoyance and to mitigate or eliminate them if possible. The UW Hospital noted its commitment to work with the Village to solve the problems.

Village Administrator's Report – Mr. Frantz reported on the status of access to the McKenna Park boathouse and marina. Parking will not be allowed on or at the bottom of these service accesses and violators will be ticketed and towed. Access is officially restricted to authorized service vehicles.

Plan Commission – The Plan Commission held the required public hearing for redevelopment of the Pyare Square site to 94 apartments. The project is proposed by Flad Development and would consist of two buildings mirroring the Lodge apartment project to the east. The Plan Commission is likely to take action on the proposal at its September meeting. The Plan Commission also heard an initial staff report on Village tax increment financing districts and possible amendments as well as the possible formation of two new TIF districts to deal with new developments.

Public Health & Safety Committee – Ms. Borisy-Rudin reported on the meeting along with Trustee Lederer. A major portion of the meeting had been devoted to the Boathouse and marina access issue, a review of Madison Fire-EMS reports, and the purchase of a rifle for the police.

Closed Session – There was a closed session regarding the Police Association's request to be represented by the Wisconsin Professional Police Officers Association (WPPA) for bargaining reasons. Upon returning to open session, the Board voted 5-0 to require an election of eligible officers to certify as a WPPA-represented bargaining unit. This ensures that statutorily established processes and procedures are followed by all parties.

Adjourn – The meeting adjourned at 9:45 pm.

Comments about the proposed parking restrictions will be shared with the Public Works Committee at its September 14, 2015 meeting. If the Public Works Committee recommends the change and the Trustees decide to proceed with changes to the parking regulations, there will be additional opportunities for input as the parking ordinance would take two to three months of Board meetings to approve.

The EMS & Fire Association is very appreciative of the generous support we have received from Village residents and businesses throughout the years.



RESIDENTIAL COMPUTER & ELECTRONICS RECYCLING ROUNDUP

Village's Services Committee, in conjunction with the Shorewood Hills EMS & Fire Association, will be sponsoring an e-cycle event on **Saturday, September 26, 2015** from 10:00 am to 1:00 pm (same date & time as the Association's Car Wash fundraiser).

Residents of the Village may dispose of their old computers, monitors, TVs, radios and other small home electronics by bringing them to the Public Works Garage (old Fire Station). The collection point for computers and electronics will be the north end of the parking lot (look for a Public Works truck). Computers and most home electronics can be dropped off for free. Our recycling partner charges a modest fee to recycle old computer monitors, TVs, copier/fax machines and window AC units because of the materials involved. We pass that fee along to you (ranging from \$5-\$60 per item based on size/weight). We can take dehumidifiers, small dorm room style refrigerators, etc. but there may be small pass-through fees for these items as well. Alternatively, you would take your old TV to the Dane County Clean Sweep site on Hwy 12 near Cambridge which is currently only charging \$10 per TV/monitor.



Help keep potentially damaging materials out of our landfills by disposing of your old computer, TVs and other electronics on September 26.

LAWN MOWING, LEAF RAKING, DOG WALKING ENTREPRENEURS


SAFETY TIPS FOR DRIVING NEAR THE SCHOOL

School starts up again on September 1. The safety of every child going to and coming from the Shorewood Hills Elementary School is everyone's concern. Students are encouraged to walk or bike to school. If parents feel they need to accompany their children, the Police Department suggests doing so on foot or by bicycle. Fewer people driving will reduce traffic congestion and will help keep our children safe.

Crosswalks

During the school year, the Village provides adult crossing guards at key intersections in the Village for students' walking and biking safety. Crossing guards are located at the Oxford-Bowdoin intersection and at the Shorewood-Topping-Harvard intersection. Please remember pedestrians in any crosswalk have the right of way.

Drivers must come to a complete stop prior to the crosswalk and remain stopped until everyone in the crosswalk has cleared the roadway. At intersections staffed with a crossing guard, all traffic is required to stop from the time the crossing guard walks into the street until the crossing guard returns to the side of the road. Crossing guards often use STOP signs and traffic vests to increase their visibility.



Drop-Off and Pick-Up Areas

Shorewood Boulevard has designated 'Drop-Off' and 'Pick-Up' areas on the west side of the street opposite the school entrance. You may stop in the 'Drop-Off' and 'Pick-Up' area and walk your child safely across the street, but you must **immediately** return to your vehicle and leave the area. Columbia Road has a 'Drop-Off-Only' lane just south of the Amherst Drive intersection. Drivers may stop briefly to drop off students but since it is a single lane, **drivers are not allowed to exit their vehicles** and hold up the traffic flow.

If you choose to walk your child into the school and leave your vehicle unattended you must be parked in a legal spot (not in the 'Drop-Off' and 'Pick-Up' areas or an area posted 'No Stopping, Standing or Parking from 7:30 am to 4:30 pm on school days'). No Parking, Stopping or Standing areas will be enforced. Vehicles must be attended at all times. Space is limited and vehicles parked illegally will be ticketed.

Speed Limits

The speed limit on all streets in the Village is 20 mph with the exceptions of the school zone when children are present (15 mph), and Locust Drive (25 mph). The Shorewood Hills Police Department strongly enforces all traffic laws and drivers should pay attention to all signs and obey all the rules of the road.

THERE'S A BAT IN MY BEDROOM: WHAT SHALL I DO?

Following your Instincts may be a Risky Choice

PHMDC Press Release (August 13, 2015) – Bats are actually wonderful creatures and are very important to our natural environment and ecosystem (eating 4,500 bugs including mosquitoes every night). They do not seem quite as wonderful when they show up in our homes. Bats tend to find their way indoors more often at this time of year because young bats born in the spring are now old enough to take to the air in search of food and new places to live.

Finding a live or even a dead bat in your bedroom can be upsetting. It can also present a serious risk to your health because bats can be infected with rabies. While only a very small percentage of bats actually carry rabies, the consequences of rabies exposure can be catastrophic because an untreated rabies infection is almost always fatal. Bats are the primary carriers of rabies in Wisconsin, although so far this year only two bats tested positive for rabies in Dane County and seven have tested positive state-wide.

Below are some tips on how to safely manage things when a bat gets into your living space. If you find a bat dead or alive in your home, especially in your bedroom in the morning, there is a possibility that you could have been bitten while you were asleep. This risk applies to anyone sleeping in the area, including an infant or a pet. Even though all your instincts may tell you to shoo the live bat out, or toss the dead bat in the trash, **THIS IS ACTUALLY A VERY BAD IDEA!** Following are some examples to consider:

1. With no bat to test it's impossible to know if you or a loved one was exposed to rabies (the probability is low but the health risk is high).
2. Bat bites are often hard to notice.
3. The only way to properly evaluate your exposure risk is to have the bat tested in a lab.
4. If the test is negative, you are in the clear.
5. If the result is positive or if the bat is unavailable for testing you will need to undergo rabies vaccination.

If you find a dead bat, use a paper towel or disposable rubber gloves and carefully place it in a container (cottage cheese type container) and put it in the fridge for safe keeping. Call Public Health – Animal Services at (608) 255-2345, they will pick up the bat and transport it to the lab.


If you find a live bat, try to catch it safely. Be extremely careful when attempting to catch the bat to avoid being bitten. The most common method of capture is to wait until the bat lands on a wall or other surface, then place an empty cottage cheese or other container over it, slide the cover under and secure it. Some people use a broom or tennis racket to knock the bat out of the air and then capture it. Once safely captured, keep the bat in the room with the doors and windows closed. Be sure to not let it escape or set it free.

If you wind up having to kill the bat, be careful not to damage the bat's head since the brain needs to be intact for proper testing. Put the container with the bat in it in the fridge to help conserve the tissues that need to be analyzed. Then call Animal Services at the number above for pick up. Animal Services may also be able to help you capture the live bat if you are having trouble doing it yourself.

If you find a bat outside or in a closed off area of the home or workplace that DID NOT have access to a sleeping person or pet there is no need for a rabies test. You can either leave the bat alone or release it outside. If you have any questions about such a situation, contact Animal Services.
