**HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE JUNE 27, 2016 MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES**

*(Complete detailed minutes will be available on our website or at the Village Hall)*

**Attendance** – Ms. Borisy-Rudin and Mr. Lederer were excused.

**Appearances and Communications – Report on Golf Program:** Win Sager has been overseeing the Village's golf program for the past 7 years. He provided the Board a report on the status of the Village's Adult program. Mr. Wade reported that there are 29 participants in the Adult program this year and 23 in the Junior program. The number of participants has remained consistent for the past several years and both programs seem to be working well. **Presentation of 2015 Financial Statements and Report on Internal Controls:** Renee Meinholz of Baker Tilly reviewed the financial statements based on the 2015 audit. Overall the audit went well and Baker Tilly gave a 'clean report' (which is the highest possible classification). The Village is well positioned with the General Fund balance and debt service levels within the Village's policy and statutorily established limits.

**Consent Agenda** – In an effort to expedite meetings, items on the consent agenda are considered as a group and are adopted with one motion. Any Board member may unilaterally remove an item from the consent agenda if he or she believes the item needs discussion. Consent agenda items included approval of the May 16 regular and closed session minutes; a block party permit for Wellesley Road on September 5; Tobacco Licenses for Steve's Wine Market, Copp's, Blackhawk Country Club and Walgreens; Liquor licenses for Copp's, Steve's Wine Market, Blackhawk Country Club, La Brioche, Sa Bai Thong, Chipotle Mexican Grill, Conscious Carnivore, Vom Fass, Noodles & Company, and the Shorewood Hills Fire Department Association; hire of a part-time counselor in training for the 4 Corners program; Tennis program hires; and hiring of a summer community service officer. The hiring of part-time seasonal employees for the Basketball program was taken off the consent agenda.

**Hire of part-time seasonal employees for the Basketball program** – Mr. Benforado recused himself from the vote because his son runs the program. The Board approved the hires on a vote of 4-0 with Mr. Benforado recusing himself.

**Ordinance L-2015-11** – The Board took no action on [Ordinance L-2015-11](#).

**Ordinance L-2016-2** – The Board took no action on [Ordinance L-2016-2](#).

**Ordinance L-2016-4** – The Board unanimously waived the second and third reading and approved [Ordinance L-2016-4](#) changing the zoning classification of the Ronald McDonald House's property at 2712 Marshall Court from C-3 Medical Office Commercial district to a Planned Unit Development (PUD) district.

**Ordinance L-2016-5** – Developer Rich Arneson presented some updated information on parking for the proposed Arbor Crossing II development. It would have 102 residential parking stalls for 95 units. The 10,000 sq ft commercial space would have 40 parking stalls with 10 of those stalls being available to residents for guest parking during non-business hours. Per the Board's discussion at the last Board meeting, Mr. Arneson would be agreeable to changing the TIF agreement to include 7 three bedroom units as affordable (townhome style with separate entrances) rather than the 12 affordable units previously discussed. Scott Harrington of Vandewalle pointed out that the current commercial tenant, Psychiatric Services, has ~30 parking stalls and the future space would include 40+ stalls, effectively moving some of the commercial parking off of Marshall Court. Also, the change to 7 three bedroom affordable units would significantly change the expected residual TIF balance from about \$71,000 to \$1.3M. The Board unanimously waived the second reading of [Ordinance L-2016-5](#) changing the zoning classification of property at 2801-2725 Marshall Court from C-3 Medical Office-Commercial district to a Planned Unit Development (PUD) district.

The trustees will be grilling summer time favorites like burgers, brats, hot dogs and other tasty treats. A community food table will be present if you would like to bring a dish to pass.

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**Resolution R-2016-6** – Mr. Benforado reported that the Plan Commission had a few concerns about the project that were addressed by Ronald McDonald House. The Commission unanimously recommended approval of the resolution. The Board unanimously approved [Resolution R-2016-6](#) approving the Specific Development Plan for the Ronald McDonald House expansion at 2712 Marshall Court.

**Resolution R-2016-7** – The Board unanimously approved [Resolution R-2016-7](#) approving the 2015 sewer compliance maintenance annual report.

**Consider referral of concerns related to parking of boats, trailers, etc. in yards and driveways and possible revisions to ordinance regulations** – The Board referred this matter to the Plan Commission.

**Consider authorization to bring storage building plans to bid ready status** – Mr. Wade, Mr. Frantz and Mr. Mitmoen reviewed the plan presented by Town & Country Engineering at the last Services Committee meeting. The Board requested some additional information and discussed matters related to the overall cost, financial impacts and site work. They decided to take the matter back up again at the July meeting.

**Authorize issuance of RFP for revaluation and assessing services** – The Village was last reassessed in 2007. It has become apparent that there are some inequities related to recent home sales and assessed values. The Village is currently assessed at ~90% of fair market value and is getting close to the State required reevaluation level. The Board of Review at its June meeting recommended the Village consider reevaluation. It would be a significant expense between \$25-100K but the reevaluation cost could be included in a multi-year contract for assessing services. The Board unanimously approved issuing a Request for Proposals for reevaluation and assessing services.

**Affirm or reset August date for Village facilities work session** – The Board decided to set a date for the work session at its July meeting.

**Appointments** – The Board unanimously approved Mr. Sundquist's appointment of Bill Muehl to the Public Health & Safety Committee.

**Village Administrator** – Mr. Frantz reported there will be periodic sidewalk closures related to the construction of The Lodge II and The Boulevard. Equipment and excavation will be too close to the sidewalks to safely keep the sidewalks open during parts of the construction. The status of the projects will be reevaluated weekly throughout the demolition and construction to see if the sidewalks can be reopened. Mr. Frantz also reported that Verizon has contracted locally to collocate three small cellular antennas in the Village to improve cell coverage (Harvard Drive between Yale & Beloit, Oxford/Bowdoin intersection, Western Road). Mr. Mitmoen reported that the main packing for the lift shaft of the elevator at the Village Hall needs to be replaced. This will be an unexpected \$4,200 expense that cannot be avoided.

**Personnel Committee** – Committee member Amy Neeno-Eckwall reviewed a Village/Police compensation report she developed for the Committee. Detailed analysis of the Village's compensation plan in comparison to neighboring communities appeared to show the Village is behind the market for police officer wages. The Board provided Ms. Neeno-Eckwall some input on the report and thanked her for the excellent objective and comprehensive report. The Personnel Committee will consider it further at its next meeting.

**Finance Committee** – Mr. Wade reported on the Village's water rate case presented to the Committee by Vicki Hellenbrand of Baker Tilly. The rate adjustment is needed as the water utility is not self sufficient and significant deficits have been temporarily absorbed by other funds. The Village has incurred over \$2M in debt to replace aging water main infrastructure. The adjustment in rates would reflect new debt requirements of about \$160K per year. The will ask the PSC to schedule a public hearing to set the rates. The Village is seeking a separate action to reduce the large increase in the public fire protection cost.

**Recreation Committee** – Ms. Readel reported the Firehouse Library opened on June 16 to coincide with the LEO Food Cart night; initial reports have been positive.

**Parks Committee** – Ms. Readel reported the Committee is discussing concerns about the invasive Japanese Jumping Worm and some aspects of the Post Farm Park Natural Playground.

**Closed Session** – The Board went into closed session to discuss the tax increment agreement for Arbor Crossing II, 2727 Marshall Court.

**Adjourn** – The meeting adjourned at 10:39 pm.

### LOVE MADISON EVENT

On May 1, we were lucky to have volunteers from our neighbors at Blackhawk Church (and Parks Committee members), helping us out during their annual Love Madison event. The program, which provides volunteering opportunities all over the Madison community, included about 50 people of all ages helping here in the Village. The beautiful day started off with a welcome from the Parks Committee and Georgene Stratman's wonderful refreshments! Nancy and Rick Lindroth (residents and team captains from Blackhawk Church) then introduced the volunteers and their purpose of providing this day of outdoor service. The volunteers were then off to their projects.



Families with younger children were fortunate to be led by Sue Denholm (Parks Committee member and environmental educator). This group helped pull invasive species and transplant shrubs along the new bike path behind the pool. They also cleaned up several of the parks flowerbeds! Another group (led by Nancy Lindroth and Anne Readel) pulled invasive species such as Dame's Rocket and Garlic Mustard, and were extremely helpful in the ongoing parks restoration at Dudley Davis Quarry Park. If you haven't done so yet, take some time to explore the walking paths in the upper Quarry area (the area above the wood chip piles). The last (but not least) team planted about 30 native trees and shrubs at the northeast end of Oxford Road to help

beautify this entrance to the Village. This group also pulled invasive species in the adjacent woods on UW property. A sincere thank you to the Blackhawk Church, the Parks Committee, and all the community members that volunteered!

**FOURTH OF JULY VOLUNTEER HELP IS NEEDED**

The Village's Fourth of July celebration is a community event that relies on volunteers. The EMS & Fire Department Association leads and coordinates many of the activities. We have had a number of Village residents volunteer to help with a variety of jobs, but we are still looking for help with the following:

- Help tend the bar on July 4 (serve beer & soda) during the afternoon for a 30 or 60 minute shift
- Help blow up helium balloons (July 4 morning)
- Help clean up the golf course after the fireworks (July 5 early morning)
- Help haul tables and chairs back to the Community Center (July 5 morning)



**We also need help before the July Fourth fireworks show.** If you don't mind driving around in circles, we could use your help with 'crowd control.' No map or GPS is needed, the directions are very simple, and you get about three feet closer to the fireworks than anyone other than the pyrotechnic crew.

We set out a yellow 'crowd control' rope around the perimeter of the fireworks display to establish a 'fallout' zone, an area where any potentially dangerous fireworks debris could fall. Spectators are not allowed within this zone. To insure that spectators remain outside of this zone we have individuals continuously patrolling this rope in golf carts (that's the driving in circles part) prior to and during the fireworks display. A golf cart is built to accommodate two people, so if you and a friend or family member would like to help by simply sitting in a nice cushy golf cart instead of on the hard ground while also getting an up-close 360 degree view of the show, this might just be the right volunteer activity for you.

We hope we can continue with the full slate of activities this Fourth of July, but it will require some help. Please consider volunteering your time. Contact David Sykes at the Village Hall ([dsykes@shorewood-hills.org](mailto:dsykes@shorewood-hills.org) or 267-2680) if you would like to help.

## LEAVE THE FIREWORKS TO THE PROFESSIONALS

The sale of fireworks typically increases this time of year, but many of the fireworks sold in Wisconsin can not be legally used by individuals. Sparklers (shorter than 36”), stationary cones and fountains, toy snakes, smoke bombs, caps, noisemakers and confetti poppers with less than ¼ grain of explosive mixture are the only legal fireworks allowed in the Village of Shorewood Hills (and neighboring communities). Even these legal fireworks can be dangerous!

Amateur fireworks endanger not only the users, but also bystanders and surrounding buildings. Simple fireworks can cause serious injuries to the eyes, head and hands. Is the risk of potentially permanent injury to you or your family worth a few seconds of fireworks fun?

The Shorewood Hills EMS & Fire Association urges you to avoid using all fireworks and leave the fireworks show to the professionals! Come to see us shoot off an outstanding fireworks display at the Blackhawk Country Club on Saturday night, July 4. Our personnel have completed extensive safety training and work under established guidelines in a controlled setting. Safety is our number one goal.

After this type of large fireworks display, you should never pick up fireworks or casings that may have fallen to the ground. Fireworks that have been ignited and fail to immediately explode or discharge may still be active. Children (and adults) should stay away from smoking or charred remnants and notify the Fire Department immediately for proper disposal.

If you must use fireworks, please:

- Read and follow the directions.
- Have an adult present to supervise.
- Use fireworks outdoors.
- Always have water on hand (a garden hose and a bucket).
- Ignite fireworks on a flat surface away from any combustible or flammable materials.
- Keep fireworks away from the house, dry leaves, decks, woodchips, etc.
- Never give fireworks to small children.
- Never point fireworks at other people.
- Do not let small children use sparklers as they can produce 1,200° heat which is easily enough to burn skin



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- or ignite clothing!
- Never re-light a “dud” firework (wait 15-20 minutes and place the “dud” in a bucket of water to soak).
- The fireworks user should always wear eye protection.
- Never put any part of the body over the fireworks.


