4TH OF JULY VOLUNTEER HELP IS NEEDED

The 4th of July celebration in Shorewood Hills has been a tradition almost as old as the Village itself. The work of planning and carrying out the day's activities had largely been the responsibility of the members of the Shorewood Hills Fire Department and Emergency Medical Service. We have two 4th of July celebrations under our belt without our FD and EMS but we had a good deal of help from volunteers in the community. From bartending at the Dance to hauling around tables and chairs to providing crowd control at the fireworks show, the community really stepped up to help.

We learned a lot from last year and have identified a number of tasks that will need bodies to complete. We are calling these '30 minute jobs'. These are jobs any

JUNE - JULY 2016

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE MAY 16, 2016 MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

(Complete detailed minutes will be available on our website or at the Village Hall)

Attendance – Mr. Sundquist was excused.

Consent Agenda – In an effort to expedite meetings, items on the consent agenda are considered as a group and are adopted with one motion. Any Board member may unilaterally remove an item from the consent agenda if he or she believes the item needs discussion. Consent agenda items included approval of the April 18 regular and closed session minutes; street use permits for Her Madison Half Marathon on June 26, Let's Eat Out! food carts in June, July and August, July 4th Parade and Fireworks; block party permits for Wood Lane on June 11 and the Independence Day Dance on July 2; a Temporary Class "B" Liquor License for the Garden Club's Gala on the Green II event on June 18; and a transient merchant permit for the Let's Eat Out! food carts.

Ordinance L-2015-11 – The Board discussed [Ordinance L-2015-11](#) which had been tabled at the previous meeting. The Board decided to table the ordinance again as more Marshall Court parking information becomes available.

Ordinance L-2016-2 – The Board discussed the revised version of [Ordinance L-2016-2](#) provided by the Village Attorney. The Board waived the second reading of the ordinance on a vote of 5-1 (Ms. Borisy-Rudin voting no) and referred it back to the Public Health & Safety Committee with suggestions regarding the animals running at large section and a clarification on the definition of a vicious animal.

Ordinance L-2016-4 – Steve Hoff of Flad Development reviewed the changes to the General Development Plan suggested during the Plan Commission's deliberations on the Ronald McDonald House expansion project. The Plan Commission unanimously recommended approval of the zoning change. The Board unanimously waived the first reading of [Ordinance L-2016-4](#) changing the zoning classification of property at 2712 Marshall Court from C-3 Medical Office Commercial district to a Planned Unit Development (PUD) district.

Ordinance L-2016-5 – Developer Rich Arneson and architect Randy Bruce presented the redevelopment plan for properties at 2725, 2727 and 2801 Marshall Court. The project, currently being referred to as Arbor Crossing II, would be built in two stages to accommodate Psychiatric Services' remaining on Marshall Court. Building 1 would include 10,000 sq ft of commercial space for Psychiatric Services, three floors of apartments and two levels of underground parking (66 stalls). Building 2 would be all apartments for a total of about 95 units in the development. As many as 12 affordable units might be included. The two levels of underground parking beneath Building 2 would add 72 stalls. The building height would be 48' and 48'9" respectively (which is above the 46' height limit established in the Village's comprehensive plan for that area). The fourth floor of both buildings would be stepped back on the north side to minimize the perceived height of the buildings to neighboring properties. Jeff Held of Strand compared the 2016 Traffic Study to the 2008 study. The additional traffic on Marshall Court is on track with what was expected from national models for this type of development. Scott Harrington of Vandewalle provided a review of the feasibility of a 3-story vs. 4-story building. The Board expressed concerns about on-street parking pressure from Arbor Crossing I and a lack of adequate visitor parking spaces within the development. The Board will want these parking issues addressed in the Arbor Crossing II development. Mr. Arneson indicated he is working to address guest parking issues and shared information on the make up of tenant parking at Arbor Crossing I. Pending approvals by the Village, construction of Building 1 could start as early as September 2016. Each building would take about 12 months to complete. Occupancy of Building 1 is projected to occur in late 2017 or early 2018. The Board unanimously waived the first reading of [Ordinance L-2016-5](#) changing the zoning classification of property at 2801-2725 Marshall Court from C-3 Medical Office-Commercial district to a Planned Unit Development (PUD) district.

Consider purchase of replacement police server for vehicle video system – The Board referred the matter to the Public Health & Safety Committee for review and a recommendation.

Consider authorizing use of Old Village Hall for Firehouse Library – Ms. Readel reviewed the Recreation

Committee's proposal to set up a small lending library and small group meeting space in the former Fire Department section of 1008 Shorewood Boulevard. Security issues in the building have been addressed. The activities would be supervised by volunteers. Ms. Readel expects minimal cost to address some building maintenance issues. The Board unanimously approved use of the building for the library and asked for quarterly reports on its status. The Board would reexamine the use in 1 year with consideration to other Village space needs priorities.

Consider date for Village facilities work session – The Board set two potential dates to discuss Village facilities: Tuesday, August 2 or Thursday, August 25 each from 5:30-9:00 pm.

Appointments – Mr. Benforado appointed, on Mr. Sundquist's behalf, Gary Johnson to the Waterfront Committee and reappointed Andy Stoltman as the EMS & Fire Association's representative to the Public Health & Safety Committee. The Board unanimously approved the appointments.

Village Administrator – Mr. Frantz and DPW Chief John Mitmoen reported problems with the play structure at Four Corners Park. The wood supports in one portion of the structure are rotting away and are unsafe. The entire 22 year old play structure should be replaced in the not too distant future. The Board referred the matter to the Services Committee and directed staff to do what was necessary to make the structure safe before the Four Corners program starts in June.

Closed Session – The Board went into closed session to discuss the tax increment agreement for Arbor Crossing II, 2727 Marshall Court.

Adjourn – The meeting adjourned at 11:29 pm.

BOARD OF REVIEW

If, after discussing your assessment with the Village's assessor at the Open Book session on May 25, you wish to object to your 2016 property assessment, you may file a "Form of Objection" and schedule an appointment before the Village's Board of Review (BOR).

**Board of Review
Rescheduled from 6/13 to
Tuesday, June 14
from 4:30-6:30 pm**

The BOR consists of residents appointed by the Village Board, charged with determining if a contested assessment is accurate. The Board functions like a court in that it is required to evaluate evidence based on fact. A property owner appealing before the BOR must provide factual information showing a property is incorrectly assessed.

The BOR will hold hearings to consider requests to revise assessments on **Tuesday, June 14, 2016** (rescheduled from previously published date of June 13) from 4:30 pm to 6:30 pm at the Village Hall.

Appointments are required. Contact the Village Hall by Friday, June 10 to make an appointment.

able-bodied person can be of assistance, no special skills required. Some may take a bit longer than 30 minutes, some less.

- Help setup tables and chairs for the Independence Day Dance (Saturday, July 2 afternoon)
- Help serve beverages (“bartend”) at the Dance (Saturday, July 2 evening)
- Help serve beverages (“bartend”) during the July Fourth activities (July 4 afternoon)
- Help set up the Art Fair (July 4 morning)
- Help blow up helium balloons (July 4 morning)
- Help clean up the stage games (July 4 afternoon)
- Help clean up the kids games and fire truck rides (July 4 afternoon)
- Help pick up the “Water Weasel” and hose (July 4 afternoon)
- Help pick up the waterfight hose and equipment (July 4 afternoon)
- Help clean up the golf course after the fireworks (July 5 early morning)
- Help haul tables and chairs back to the Community Center (July 5 morning)

There are some more involved jobs that would require a longer commitment and some extra, simple training.

NO WIPES DOWN THE PIPES

Pre-moistened personal wipes are convenient and sanitary, which has sharply increased their popularity over the past few years. Although these products are labeled “flushable,” they are not necessarily safe for sewage systems.

Products that are truly septic-safe will disintegrate into tiny pieces and not harm wastewater treatment equipment. However, most “flushable” wipes do not completely decompose which can clog the pump station and could cause expensive damage to the Village’s sanitary sewer system.

Even though a product may say it is “flushable”, **unless it is toilet paper, it should not be flushed!** See the Madison Metropolitan Sewerage District’s informational flyer: [Is it Flushable?](#)

PET LICENSES

(June 1 deadline for dogs and cats to avoid additional late fee)

Have you purchased your pet license for 2016? All dogs and cats in the Village must be licensed annually. To obtain a license, please bring your pet’s most recent rabies vaccination record which should including the vaccine’s expiration date to the Village Hall. The initial deadline for obtaining licenses without a penalty was April 1. There is a \$5.00 late fee after this date. **The late fee increases to \$10.00 after June 1.**

FEES (without penalty):


- Dogs – Neutered or spayed = \$15.00 + late fee
- Dogs – Not neutered or spayed = \$20.00 + late fee
- Cats – Neutered or spayed = \$8.00 + late fee
- Cats – Not neutered or spayed = \$13.00 + late fee




CANOE / KAYAK SHARE PROGRAM
