JANUARY - FEBRUARY 2017

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE DECEMBER 21, 2016 MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

(Complete detailed minutes will be available on our website or at the Village Hall)

Attendance – Ms. Borisy-Rudin was excused.

Appearances and Communications – Will Clifton provided the Board an update on the efforts to make Shorewood Hills a dementia-friendly community. The organizational committee consisting of Trustee Benforado and interested Village residents has met to set goals for the next 3-6 months which will include some of them taking a train-the-trainer class on dementia awareness. A number of other municipalities and businesses in the area have joined in the dementia-friendly community initiative. Michael & Trina Schuler and Joni Stein spoke about the recent changes to the ordinance regulating vicious dogs as it relates to cats and the Village being a Bird City. The Board agreed there may have been unintended consequences due to the change in the ordinance as it relates to cats and referred the matter to the Public Health & Safety Committee for further review.

Consent Agenda – In an effort to expedite meetings, items on the consent agenda are considered as a group and are adopted with one motion. Any Board member may unilaterally remove an item from the consent agenda if he or she believes the item needs discussion. Consent agenda items included approval of minutes from the Board's November 21 meeting and a street use permit for the UW Running Club.

Ordinance L-2016-6 – The Board unanimously waived the second and third readings and approved [Ordinance L-2016-6](#) amending section 17.02(7) of the Code of Ordinances to restrict the closing hours for sale of beer and intoxicating liquor.

Ordinance L-2016-7 – Mr. Benforado provided the Board a memo summarizing the Plan Commission's

discussion and recommendation for revision of [Ordinance L-2016-7](#) amending section 18.05 of the Village Code related to Junk, Certain Vehicles, Recreational Equipment and Firewood and Section 10-1-75 Motor Vehicle, Mobile Home and Boat Storage. The Plan Commission recommended keeping the ordinance a complaint driven process and clarifying sections to allow the Village Administrator to more easily review such complaints. The Board unanimously waived the first reading of the ordinance.

Resolution R-2016-11 – The Board unanimously approve [Resolution R-2016-11](#) supporting efforts to make Shorewood Hills a dementia-friendly community.

Consider Organ Donor Policy – Mr. Frantz reported Village counsel had reviewed the required policy as it relates to the State regulations. The Board unanimously approved the organ donor policy.

Set 2017 Meeting Schedule – The Board set the Village Caucus date of Tuesday, January 17, 2017 and approved by consensus the regular Board meeting dates in 2017.

Village President's Report – Mr. Sundquist reported the Village has reserved the Blackhawk Country Club on Saturday, February 18, 2017 for its annual volunteer appreciation dinner. Mr. Sundquist also made the proclamation that the Village will observing Arbor Day on Friday, April 28, 2017 and submitting a Tree

City application again this year.

Village Administrator's Report – Mr. Frantz updated the Board on the One City Learning Initiative and its support from the Shorewood Hills League. Mr. Frantz also reported on the accessibility and elevator project at Shorewood Hills Elementary School. The initial bids came in too high and the school district reduced the project scope to lower the costs. He doesn't believe the project needs to come back to the Plan Commission but it might need an extension of the original conditional use permit.

Joint West Committee – Mr. Wade reviewed his memo provided to the Board regarding the UW Master Plan meeting at the Joint West Campus Committee. The University Bay Fields will continue to be zoned conservancy which means any changes there would require conditional use approval by the City of Madison Plan Commission. The Village would have an opportunity to provide input at such a meeting.

Public Works Committee – Mr. Lederer reported the Committee has been discussing the temporary bump-outs and traffic speed on University Bay Drive. Residents who attended the Committee meeting would like a more permanent version of the bump-outs and for the Village to consider the installation of speed humps. The Committee also heard a resident's concerns about parking pads on Lake Mendota Drive in the Village's right-of-way which limits on-street parking in the area.

Recreation Committee – Ms. Readel reported the Committee met with the 4 Corners Program parent coordinator at its last meeting.

Parks Committee – Ms. Readel reported the Committee is pleased with the new stone installed in the Bigfoot Park spillway and that the Garden Club is considering donating plantings in the area. The Committee also continued to talk about a Forestry Utility.

Adjourn – The meeting adjourned at 9:02 pm.

VILLAGE CAUCUS – Tuesday, January 17

The annual Village Caucus will be held on Tuesday, January 17, 2017 at 7:00 pm at the Village Hall before the regular monthly Board meeting (please note that the meeting will be held on Tuesday due to the Martin Luther King, Jr. holiday on Monday).

The two-year terms of Village President Mark Sundquist and Trustees Felice Borisy-Rudin, Anne Readel and Fred Wade will end in April 2017. At the Caucus, Village residents will nominate the candidates for the three Trustees seats and Village President. Those selected at the Caucus will be included on the ballot at the Spring Election to be held on Tuesday, April 4, 2017.

If more than two candidates for Village President or more than six candidates for Village Trustee are nominated at the Caucus, a "mini-election" will occur immediately that evening with the residents in attendance casting votes to determine who will be selected to run for election in April.

Please plan to attend the Caucus on Tuesday, January 17, 2017 (and stay for the Board meeting following the Caucus). It is a wonderful example of local democracy in action. Anyone interested in running for an available seat or in learning more about the duties of a Trustee should contact Village Administrator Karl Frantz at the Village Hall or any of the current Trustees.

PROPERTY TAX PAYMENTS

2016 tax bills were mailed to property owners on December 13. The Village's policy is to send tax bills to property owners, not mortgage holders. If you escrow your taxes, you should notify your mortgage company of the amount owed when your bill arrives.

If you would like your property tax payment to be credited to 2016 for income tax purposes, it must be received by the Village by midnight on December 31. The Village Hall will be closed on December 30 in observation of the New Year's Eve holiday, which means, if you'd like to pay your taxes in person and have the payment credited to 2016, you will have to stop by the Village Hall before 5:00 pm on Thursday, December 29.

If you can't make it into the office by that time, you may leave your payment in the Village's green '**Drop Box**' in the Village Hall parking lot. The 'Drop Box' will be emptied at midnight on December 31. Any payments made after midnight will be credited to 2017.

Payment sent by mail postmarked on or before December 31, 2016 will be credited to 2016. Similarly, on-line tax payments must also be made by December 31 to be credited to 2016. Make a tax payment on-line at: www.shorewood-hills.org/payments (*convenience fees apply to each transaction*).



If you choose to pay your taxes in two installments, the first half payment is made to the Village of Shorewood Hills and is due January 31, 2017. The remainder of the tax bill is due July 31, 2017 (*payable directly to the Dane County Treasurer rather than the Village*).

Please note: On-line tax payments transactions must be completed by January 31, so the Village's on-line tax payment portal will not be available after 7:00 am on Friday, January 27, 2017.

PET LICENSES

(Dogs, Cats and Chickens)

All dogs and cats living in Shorewood Hills must be licensed annually. To obtain a license, please bring your pet's most recent rabies vaccination record, including the vaccine's expiration date, to the Village Hall. The deadline for obtaining licenses is April 1, 2017. There is a \$5.00 penalty after this date. The late fee increases to \$10.00 after June 1, 2017. Even if your dog or cat is due for the rabies vaccination after the deadline, licenses must be obtained by April 1.

FEES:

Dogs – Neutered or spayed = \$15.00

Cats – Neutered or spayed = \$8.00

Dogs – Not neutered or spayed = \$20.00

Cats – Not neutered or spayed = \$13.00

Please DO NOT purchase your cat or dog license directly from your veterinarian (that is a City of Madison program). Your pet license records should be kept in the community where you live. If a pet is lost or running at large, we can locate the owners much easier if the records are at the Village Hall.

Village residents who keep chickens must also obtain a license. Residents may keep up to four chickens (no roosters). Chicken coops must be raised up off the ground or placed on a hard surface. They must be kept clean, be at least 25 feet away from any residential structure and are prohibited in any front yard. Keepers of chickens must register with the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection.

Complete the Village's **Permit to Keep Chickens** (available on the Village's website: www.shorewood-hills.org) and provide evidence of current registration with the Dept. of Agriculture. The fee is \$20 and the permit is good for three years.

Dementia-Friendly Community

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Village of Shorewood Hills, Village Board hereby resolves to become a dementia-friendly community.

WHEREAS, the State of Wisconsin estimates there are approximately 100,000 individuals in Wisconsin with dementia who currently reside in their homes, with 22 percent living alone.

WHEREAS, as the population ages, the number of individuals with dementia is expected to increase as well; current estimates predict those with dementia will double by 2030 and more than triple by 2050.

WHEREAS, the Village of Shorewood Hills has a long history of being a close-knit community where we are neighborly, where we look after one another, providing assistance and help when needed.

WHEREAS, the Village has a dynamic array of activities and services for residents and families of all ages, whether youth activities, sporting and leisure activities, or a variety of social clubs and events.

WHEREAS, the Shorewood Hills Village Board recognizes the importance of working with community partners to address the needs of our residents with dementia.

WHEREAS, the Village desires to become a Dementia-Friendly Community in partnership with the wider community which will include local citizens, businesses, non-profit organizations, churches, groups, Dane County's Aging and Disability Resource Center and Village services.

WHEREAS, a Dementia-Friendly Community initiative benefits residents and businesses by increasing awareness of dementia and decreasing the stigma for those who live with a disease that causes memory and thinking impairments.

WHEREAS, a Dementia-Friendly Community initiative works to improve the quality of life for all those who are affected, both for the person with memory challenges and their caregivers, by fostering helpful and respectful ways to include people with dementia as important members of your community.

WHEREAS, the Shorewood Hills Dementia-Friendly Community Initiative envisions partnering with the Village and area businesses to educate Village staff and local business employees on how to recognize and best assist a person with dementia.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Village of Shorewood Hills will work with the Shorewood Hills Dementia-Friendly Community Initiative to create a community that is friendly and welcoming for those with dementia.

The foregoing resolution was duly adopted by the Board of Trustees of the Village of Shorewood Hills at a legal meeting on the 21st day of December, 2016.




Be Salt WISE!

1. Shovel



Clear walkways and other areas before the snow turns to ice. The more snow you remove manually, the less salt you will have to use and the more effective it will be.

2. Scatter



If you use salt, scatter it so that there is space between the grains. Believe it or not, a coffee mug of salt is enough to treat an entire 20-foot driveway or 10 sidewalk squares.

3. Switch



When pavement temperatures drop below 15 degrees, salt won't work. Switch to sand for traction or a different ice melter that works at lower temperatures.

4. Love the Lines



Stripes on roads before a storm are anti-icing. They show that your professional maintenance crew is concerned about safety and is saving money, time and protecting our environment!

5. Be Salt Wise All Year



Water softener salt ends up in local freshwater bodies. If your household softener uses more than 1 bag of salt per month, have a professional tune it up or replace it with a high-efficiency model.

Safe winter driving is as easy as 1-2-3:



1. Wait

Wait to allow time for plowing and deicers.



2. Know

Know the current road conditions before you hit the road.



3. Slow

Travel slowly, and use caution and reason.

2017 PARKING PERMITS

Almost every residential street in the Village is in a one- or two-hour restricted parking district (where parking is allowed). The only way to avoid a ticket is to have a parking permit. A parking permit allows residents to park on the street within 100 yards of their home for periods exceeding the posted restrictions. Current parking permits expire on December 31, 2016.

Residents are reminded to stop by the Police Department at the Village Hall to obtain 2017 Shorewood Hills Parking Permit sticker(s). There is no charge for the first sticker per household. Additional stickers are \$5.00 each.

The Police Department has temporary parking permits available if you have contract workers or guests who will be parking on the street in front of your house for more than the posted restrictions.



WINTER PARKING

The Village does not normally have winter alternate-side parking restrictions but when circumstances warrant, a snow emergency may be declared. If such an emergency is declared, vehicles will be ordered off of the roadway entirely. Notification will be posted on the Village website, send out via the Village's "blast" e-mail list and provided to the local media.

During a regular snow event, residents are asked to move their cars off the road before (or as soon as possible after) a snowfall so that the Public Works Crew can properly plow the streets. Past experience has shown that heavy snowfalls early in the season result in narrower roads the rest of the winter. If you can park in your driveway or alternate which side of the street you park on after a snowfall, it will help the Crew clear the streets. Your efforts will also assist the transit of the ambulance and fire engines when called to respond to emergencies in the Village. Thank you!!

ICE SKATING RINK

The recent frigid weather has been good for the Shorewood Hills skating rink. The Public Works Crew has been hard at work flooding the ice rink at the south end of the school grounds. They will do their best to maintain the rink and clear the snow/ice chips. When the **GREEN** flag is flying, the rink is "open" and ready for use. The **RED** flag indicates the rink is "closed" because it has recently been flooded to make new ice or warm weather has created bad ice. Please stay off the ice when the red flag is flying.

The ice rink is divided into an enclosed hockey area and an open skating area. For everyone's safety, please avoid playing hockey on the open skating side. When it gets dark, the rink lights may be turned on via a remote button on the west side of the Heiden Haus building. Once pushed, the lights will remain on for the duration of the evening. The skating rink closes at 10:00 pm Sunday through Thursday and at 11:00 pm on Friday & Saturday nights. The lights will automatically shut off near these times. Safe Skating!

Parent's note: The DPW crew works hard to maintain the ice skating rinks. The smooth surface was recently intentionally damaged by chipping skates and a shovel. Please remind your children to refrain from any activities that will ruin the ice and prevent the rinks' enjoyment by all skaters.



ADOPT A FIRE HYDRANT

During the winter, keeping fire hydrants clear of snow is a difficult job. The Madison Fire Department (MFD) provides fire protection services to the Village. Searching for a buried hydrant or having to dig one out could waste time in an emergency.

The Public Works Crew does its best to keep the Village fire hydrants clear of snow but they could use your help. The Village is asking you and your neighbors to “adopt” the fire hydrant near your home and help clear the snow around it. A few minutes of time and effort after it snows can help ensure MFD will have quick access to water when needed. Clear a path from the road to the fire hydrant and maintain a clear area of about three feet around it.



We’d like to thank those residents who have been shoveling out their area hydrants in the past. Your efforts do not go unnoticed!

SNOW SHOVELING ENTREPRENEURS

Winter is here! Do you need help with snow shoveling (or other odd jobs)? For several years, the Village Hall has kept a list of Shorewood Hills kids interested in doing odd jobs including shoveling snow, dog walking, pet sitting, raking leaves, mowing lawns or other work. Residents looking to hire help may contact the Village Hall to get a list of these young community entrepreneurs.



If you have kids who would like to be included on this database, they may e-mail Karla (kendres@shorewoodhills.org) or call the Village Hall at 267-2680. Kids, Karla will need your full name; phone number; if you are interested in shoveling snow, raking leaves, yard work in general, pet sitting, dog walking, etc. Please indicate if you will work anywhere in the Village or just in your own neighborhood (include your address if only working in your neighborhood).

If you have been a part of the Village Hall database in the past and would no longer like your name/number given out, please contact Karla to be removed.

AMHERST DRIVE CLOSED

Please be aware: now that we have adequate snow cover, Amherst Drive is closed between the addresses of 1121 and 1137.

The Village does this each year to allow for safe sledding down the hill at Bradley Park.



DISPOSAL OF CHRISTMAS TREES

There are a couple of options when you take down your Christmas tree this year. Many residents put the tree in their backyards after the holidays. It makes a wonderful bird refuge during the long winter months. You could also use the tree as mulch for your garden or tender shrubs.

If you’d rather get rid of the tree entirely, the Village Crew will be chipping Christmas trees until the end of January. Place your tree at the curb in front of your house before January 31, 2017. Please be sure to remove all ornaments, wires, straps or anything else on your tree. The metal and other objects could injure a member of the crew or damage the chipper blades. At \$400 per blade they are expensive to replace!

Wreaths and garland cannot be chipped. Put those items out with your regular trash.



RESIDENT'S PRIVILEGES AT BLACKHAWK COUNTRY CLUB

Shorewood Hills residents (who are not members) have certain privileges included in the lease agreement with the Village.

Food and Beverages – Adult residents, their children (when accompanied by a parent) and their guests have food and beverage privileges at the Club two times each month from November 1 through April 15. Availability may be limited when the Club is booked for specific events. Dining is on a cash basis. No gratuity or service charge will be automatically added to food and beverage bills. It is expected that residents will tip accordingly, based on the quality of service received, just as they would in any other restaurant. Reservations are appreciated. Casual attire is appropriate. Dining hours are:

Lunch: Wednesday-Saturday from 11:30 am to 2:00 pm

Dinner: Thursday-Saturday from 5:30 to 8:00 pm

Sunday Bistro: 10:00 am to 12:30 pm

Easter Brunch will be April 20th from 9:30 am to 1:00 pm

Friday Night Fish Fry: 5:00 to 8:00 pm

Social Membership – Village residents may apply for a social membership in the Club and the initiation fee shall be waived.

Use of the Grounds – Village residents shall have the right to use the grounds for winter sports (i.e. sledding, cross country and downhill skiing) from December 1 to April 1 (weather permitting). Putting greens, tee boxes and other areas of the course may be protected with fencing. Please keep out of these areas.

Clubhouse and Bar – On Saturday afternoons, the Blackhawk Clubhouse and Bar is open for residents to come inside to warm up while sledding and skiing, to use the restrooms, or to have a complimentary cup of hot cocoa or coffee. Residents are welcome to use the clubhouse to warm up any time it is open.

Golf – Adult residents also have certain golf privileges during the golf season.
