PUBLIC LISTENING SESSION ON TRAFFIC CALMING MEASURES IN THE VILLAGE

As part of its agenda at its upcoming meeting on **October 12 starting at 7:00 pm**, the Public Works Committee will host a public listening session on traffic calming measures.

The objective of the session is to gather comments and concerns before the Committee attempts to draft a policy on the adoption of traffic calming measures later this year. If adopted, such a policy might guide the Committee's future deliberations as to when additional steps should be taken, what steps will be considered and other relevant questions. Examples of traffic calming measures include, but are limited to, signage, heightened enforcement, speed boards, narrowed roadway and speed humps.

The meeting will be held in the lower level meeting room at the Village Hall. Residents are encouraged to participate in the discussion.

OCTOBER - NOVEMBER 2017

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE SEPTEMBER 18, 2017 MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

(Complete detailed minutes will be available on our website or at the Village Hall)

Attendance – All trustees were in attendance.

Appearances and Communications – **New Police Chief Aaron Chapin** introduced himself and gave a brief review of his background. He had been a Lieutenant with the UW Police Department for the past 17 years. He and his wife Amy have four kids ranging from fifth grade to college age. He is excited about the opportunity to work in Shorewood Hills beginning October 2. The Board welcomed Chief Chapin to the Village. **Dane County Executive Joe Parisi** and his staff gave a presentation on a Yahara Chain of Lakes cleanup initiative. Research by the Dane County Land & Water Resources Department has identified previously unknown source of phosphorus and particulate in lakes and streams. Sediment has built up over decades in the bottom of streams. This “muck” is high in phosphorus, which diffuses into the water and can cause algae blooms in lakes. Dane County is undertaking a 4-year, \$12M project to remove the pre-existing muck from the bottom of streams. The project will begin with Dorn Creek, which is near an old gravel pit on County land. The sediment removed will be used to fill the old gravel pit and restore it to useable prairie land.

Consent Agenda – In an effort to expedite meetings, items on the consent agenda are considered as a group and are adopted with one motion. Any Board member may unilaterally remove an item from the consent agenda if he or she believes the item needs discussion. Consent agenda items included approval of the August 30 closed and open session minutes; a block party permit for Tallyho Lane on September 24; and, a Class B beer/Class C wine license for First Unitarian Society.

Minutes of August 21 Board Meeting – The August 21, 2017 meeting minutes were removed from the consent agenda. Two modification were made to the minutes. The minutes were approved unanimously as amended.

Ordinance L-2017-2 – The Board approved [ordinance L-2017-2](#) amending section 17.06 of the Village Code amendments from the second reading on a vote of 6-1 (Mr. DeVito voting no). *For more details, see the [article on page 4](#).*

Consider one-year extension of PUD and SDP zoning for Ronald McDonald House expansion – Kevin Huddleton, Executive Director at the Ronald McDonald House (RMH) discussed the status of their fundraising effort to expand their facility to the east. The fundraising is a slow process but they are well on their way to reaching their goal. They expect to reach 80% of their goal by spring of 2018 and there will be able to break ground on the project. The Board previously approved the Planned Unit Development (PUD) and Specific Development Plan in June of 2016. The PUD expires after one year if construction has not yet started but the Village Code allows the Board to extend the approval of the rezoning for another year. Steve Hoff of the RMH Board indicated there were no changes to the proposed building footprint or design from what was previously approved. The Board unanimously approved a one-year extension from the previous approval date to June 24, 2018.

Consider approval of conditional use permit for emergency generator at 3321 Tally Ho Lane – The Plan Commission recommended approval of the conditional use permit to install an emergency generator that would not be connected to the home’s electrical system thus preventing the possibility of back feeding into the electrical grid. Specifications of the generator indicate the sound impact would be below 50 dB. The generator would only be used during a power outage to run a light, microwave, etc. up to the capacity of the generator. The Board unanimously approved the conditional use permit.

Consider approval of special exception permit to exceed floor area limit at 3140 Oxford Road – The Plan Commission recommended approval of the special exception permit to exceed the floor area limit to address a water infiltration problem created by an addition put on by the previous homeowner. The addition would be small (250 sq. ft.) on to the back of the house that is adjacent to the University Houses gardens. The footprint of the house would not change. The homeowner, Kurt Roots, indicated the neighbors had seen the plan and signed off with their support. The Board unanimously approved the

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special exception permit.

Consider approval of quote to replace Police Department carpet – Interim Police Chief Jerry Jansen provided the Board with four quotes to replace the carpet in the Police Department. The Board unanimously approved a quote from Bisbee in the amount not to exceed \$6,612. Bisbee's quote included disposal of the old carpet but the Board thought it was important to ensure the carpet was recycled. Public Works Chief John Mitmoen had previously stated the Crew could haul the old carpet to the recycling center for ~\$200. Interim Chief Jansen will investigate if Bisbee would reduce its quote if the Village hauled away the carpet.

Consider approval of quote to replace air-handling unit at Village Hall – The present unit is 20 years old and is becoming exceedingly expensive to repair. The Board postponed action until John Mitmoen was in attendance to answer questions about the efficiency of the various models identified in the quotes.

Consider issuance of Municipal Revenue Obligation for 700 University Bay Drive, LLC – The property owner of 700 UBD should have submitted a formal request for payment of the approved Municipal Revenue Obligation (MRO) in 2016 when the building was complete and occupied. Through a simple oversight, the request was not made until recently. The MRO is comprised the return of TIF tax proceeds paid by the developer provided the increment is adequate to cover costs related to the development. Mr. Frantz worked with legal counsel and consultants to ensure the Village would not come out on the short end for some reason if the payment were made now using the 2016 date. The payment schedule presented to the Board would satisfy the agreement and not harm the Village. Some Trustees were concerned that the Village was not obligated to backdate the payment schedule. Other Trustees felt that this was a simple oversight and the Village should abide by the original agreement. The Board approved issuance of the MRO for 700 UBD based on Schedule 1 on a vote of 4-1-1 (Mr. Lederer voted no and Mr. DeVito abstained).

Appointments – Ms. Readel provided a list of individuals interested in serving on the Ad hoc Sustainability Committee. The Board unanimously approved the following appointments: Ms. Readel as chairperson, Mark Redsten, Anne Helsley-Marchbanks, Sarah Goldenberg, Tracy Bailey, Matthew Silverman, Cara Coburn Faris, Fritz Grutzner, Karen Knetter, Eric Adelman, Ty Cashen and Nadeem Afghan.

Village President – Mr. Benforado reported he would begin discussions with Marshall Court property owners with the goal of completing the bike path in the 2018 construction year.

Village Administrator – The Board decided to postpone discussion of cyber security and the computer crash/data restoration until the next meeting. Mr. Frantz did mention Mr. DeVito's suggestion of a possible ad hoc committee to take advantage of computer expertise in the Village by looking at business continuity practices and security. Mr. Frantz also reported on discussions with UW Hospital regarding tobacco use by its staff on University Bay Drive. UW's community relations director identified 'smoking just off the UW property' as an issue and will work on it at the upper levels of the hospital administration.

Public Works Committee – Mr. Lederer reported the Committee will have a listening session on traffic issues in October including speeding, traffic calming (speed humps), etc.

Services Committee – Mr. Wade suggested Trustees tour the Public Works building with John Mitmoen before the next meeting.

Golf Committee – Mr. Wade indicated he asked the Golf Pros from Blackhawk Country Club to attend this meeting but a tournament schedule did not allow them to be at the meeting. He will invite them to the next Board meeting to discuss some community golf ideas.

Pool Committee – Mr. Lederer reported the Committee will be working on a long-term capital plan.

Adjourn – The meeting adjourned at 11:34 pm.

VILLAGE BOARD AMENDS REGULATION OF PETS ORDINANCE

The Village Board has concluded its work on revisions to the Village Code concerning **Licensing of Dogs and Cats, Regulation of Pets**. Over the course of many months, the Board and Public Health Safety Committee listened to Village residents and how they felt about the regulation of cats and whether they should continue to be allowed to roam off the pet owner's property. Ironically, this issue came up when the Board revised language in the Code to control vicious dogs and some residents became concerned about other code provisions.

The existing ordinance allowed a cat to roam as long as it had a bell attached to its collar. The ongoing discussions included aspects of property owner's rights, trespassing vs. pets being a nuisance if on someone's property without permission, antipredation devices, as well as whether the issue rose to a level that it needs to be codified. Some residents felt a small group was driving complaints; and that the problem was being blown out of proportion. They cited studies that disputed cat impacts on birds. Other residents expressed their desire that cats not be on their property, not prey on wildlife in their yards and also registered concerns about impacts of cats on bird populations citing studies and also questioned the Village status as a Bird City.

Taking these things into consideration the Board has decided that no person shall allow a pet, while on another person's property without consent of the property owner, to harass, injure, or kill any animal. They also added a provision that provides for antipredation devices other than bells. Specifically, antipredation device means a device that effectively warns other animals of the pet's presence, such as, a bell that is audible at least 15 feet away from the pet and cannot be silenced by the pet, an electronic device that emits an audible signal at least once every ten seconds, a large multicolored "clown" collar, or a hard apron that limit's the pet's ability to catch prey. In addition to the required identification, an effective antipredation device shall be attached to the collar of any cat at all times that it is off the property of its owner and not under the physical control of the owner. A cat shall not be considered to be running at large if it is wearing its license and an antipredation device.

FIRE PREVENTION WEEK (October 8-14)

The 2017 National Fire Protection Agency's (NFPA's) Fire Prevention Week campaign slogan is 'Every Second Counts: Plan 2 Ways Out'.

In a fire, seconds count. Seconds can mean the difference between residents of our community escaping safely from a fire or having their lives end in tragedy. That's why this year's Fire Prevention Week theme: "Every Second Counts: Plan 2 Ways Out!" is so important. It reinforces why everyone needs to have an escape plan. Here's this year's key campaign messages:

- Draw a map of your home with all members of your household, marking two exits from each room and a path to the outside from each exit.
- Practice your home fire drill twice a year. Conduct one at night and one during the day with everyone in your home, and practice using different ways out.
- Teach children how to escape on their own in case you can't help them.
- Make sure the number of your home is clearly marked and easy for the fire department to find.
- Close doors behind you as you leave – this may slow the spread of smoke, heat, and fire.
- Once you get outside, stay outside. Never go back inside a burning building.

FALL LEAF PICKUP

The Village Crew has started seasonal leaf collection. Because of the large number of trees in Shorewood Hills, leaf collection is a monumental task. The Crew uses a leaf picking machine to suck up leaves into a box truck for disposal. To assist them in their task:

- Please do not bag leaves. Rake them to the curb, not into the street.
- Leaf piles should be three feet from trees, poles, signs and mailboxes so that the vacuuming arm is not obstructed.
- Please make sure that you keep all rocks, construction debris, soil and branches out of your leaf piles. Rocks, nails, dirt, etc. wreak havoc on the leaf picker causing expensive repairs and endanger the operators.
- When picking up leaves, the Crew makes an entire circuit around the Village, from one end to the other, usually once a week. Special pickups are not possible.
- If the Crew picks up your neighbors' leaves but not yours, the reason may be as simple as the box truck was full, a car was blocking the leaf pile, or time ran out in the day. They will get back to your leaf pile as soon as possible.
- The Crew will pick up leaves until they are covered with snow or frozen to the ground.

BRUSH COLLECTION

Throughout the spring, summer and fall the Village Crew will chip residents' brush left at the curbside. The Village's "Chipper" can take branches up to 12 inches in diameter. For ease of pickup, residents should arrange the brush at the curb such that the ends of the branches are all oriented in the same direction. Longer branches are easier for the Crew to feed into the chipper, so there is no need to cut branches down to any specific length.

Brush piles should be three feet from obstructions like trees, poles, signs and mailboxes. Village residents doing their own work are allowed to pile brush and trimmed greens at the curb. If you hire a contractor, like Green Acres, Madison Tree Service, etc., to do your yard work, the contractor is responsible for hauling away the material.

WORD OF THE WOODS

OAK PRUNING SEASON OPENS OCTOBER 1

To prevent the possible spread of Oak Wilt, pruning or removing Oak trees is **prohibited between April 1 and October 1**. Now is the time to schedule maintenance on you oak trees (if needed).

WATER YOUR TREES

The recent dry spell has been stressful on Village trees. We recommend giving your trees a long good drink of water. See watering guidelines on the next page.



BASIC TREE WATERING INSTRUCTIONS:

How often do I water?

- New trees (planted within the last 2 years) – 2 times/week
- Young established trees (< 7” diameter trunk) – 3 times/month
- Older trees (larger than 7” diameter trunk) – 2 times/month

How much water is needed?

- A general rule of thumb is 10 gallons of water/inch of trunk diameter for each watering.
- At a medium pressure, it takes about 5 minutes to produce 10 gallons of water.

Where do I water?

- Avoid over-watering around the base of the trunk as this can result in trunk or structural root decay.
- Water to the edge of the tree’s canopy (aka the “dripline”). Saturate the entire area from the base of the tree to the dripline.
- Water deeply! Deep watering to a depth of 12” inches below the soil surface is recommended. Watering for short periods of time only encourages shallow rooting which can lead to more drought damage.
- Soil needles (deep root feeders) can be attached to your hose and are effective at watering deeply if the soil is not too hard or compacted.
- Soaker hoses can be coiled around the tree below the dripline.
- For evergreens, water 3’-5’ beyond the dripline on all sides of the tree.
- Water slowly, dispersing the flow of water to get the water deep down to the trees roots.
- Overhead spraying of tree leaves is inefficient and should be avoided during drought conditions. Watering at ground level to avoid throwing water in the air is more efficient.

RELIEF CROSSING GUARDS NEEDED

The Shorewood Hills Police Department is seeking a dedicated people to serve as on-call relief crossing guards when the regular staff is unavailable. When needed they will serve as morning and afternoon crossing guards at the intersections of Shorewood Blvd/Topping Rd/Harvard Dr; and Oxford and Bowdoin Roads for Shorewood Hills Elementary School. The position averages 2 hours per day. The pay rate for crossing guards is \$12.05 per hour.



The school kids make it a very rewarding position, perfect for a retiree, stay-at-home parent or student with a flexible schedule. Please contact the Police Dept. at 267-1110 if you are interested.

TAX BILL ADDRESS UPDATES

The Village has started collecting information in order to print property tax bills. Now is the time to make sure your mailing address is accurate. The best way to do this is by looking at last year’s tax bill. If the address is incorrect or you are not sure what mailing address is being used, contact the Village Hall at 267-2680 or by e-mail at info@shorewood-hills.org. Any address changes must be received by **November 15** before the tax bills are printed by Dane County.

Village policy is to send the tax bill to the property owner. Tax bills will not be sent to your financial institution. Village staff expects to send out tax bills to property owners in mid-December.
