**HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE JUNE 18, 2018 MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES**

*(Complete detailed minutes will be available on our website or at the Village Hall)*

**Attendance** – Trustee Tracy Bailey and Administrator Karl Frantz were excused.

**Appearances and Communications** – Ron Johnson, Coordinator of the Dane County Restorative Court (CRC) Program, introduced the program to the Trustees. Mr. Johnson said his goal is to have all municipalities in Dane County participating in the CRC program. He described it as an old/new way to settle disputes. It is intended for 17-25 year old offenders. Referrals for CRC are made by the Police Department or the District Attorney's office. Victims of the offender are involved in the process with the goal of finding an alternative solution to incarceration. If the offender completes the CRC agreement, all charges are dropped. In the four years of the program, they have a 94% success rate. Mr. Johnson is also looking for "peacemakers" from the community to be involved with CRC. The Board referred the matter to the Public Health & Safety Committee for further review and a recommendation to the Board.

**Consent Agenda** – In an effort to expedite meetings, items on the consent agenda are considered as a group and are adopted with one motion. Any Board member may unilaterally remove an item from the consent agenda if he or she believes the item needs discussion. Consent agenda items included approval of minutes from the Board's May 21 closed session and May 31 special meeting; street use permits for Ronald McDonald House Construction and the July 4 Parade/Celebration/Fireworks; block party permits for Wellesley Road (September 3) and the Independence Day Dance (July 3); hires and set wages for seasonal Tennis employees; hire and set wage for Community Service Officer; standard charge rate of \$60.00 per hour for police officers performing special events reimbursable work; promotion/hire of Officer Nicholas Dodsworth to fulltime patrol officer at Grade 14 step 2 (\$24.45 per hour); promotion of patrol officer Jaime Weitzel to Sergeant upon retirement of Detective-Sergeant Denzer (December 30); tobacco licenses for Pick N Save, Blackhawk Country Club, Steve's Wine Market, Walgreens; and, liquor licenses for Sa Bai Thong, Blackhawk Country Club, Steve's Wine Market, La Brioche, Ancora Coffee, Vom Fass, First Unitarian Society, Chipotle and the Shorewood Hills EMS & Fire Association. The consent agenda, less the items that were removed, was unanimously approved by the Board.

**Board Minutes** – Mr. Wade asked that the May 21 regular meeting minute be removed from the consent agenda to correct the spelling of Michael Stineman's name and some other minor clarifications. The Board approved the minutes with these changes on a vote of 5-0-1 (Ms. Readel abstaining).

**Street Use Permit** – Mr. Benforado asked that the street use permit for Her Madison Half Marathon be removed from the consent agenda. He indicated that the course map and the request for road closures in the permit submittal was not consistent, and he was concerned that they were requesting a lot of roads be posted no parking. Chief Chapin took some time to confirm the information on the permit submittal. He determined the map was correct. Some of the streets requested to be posted as no parking are already permanently posted as no parking by the Village. Ms. Readel felt that it is a worthwhile event and donating proceeds to a charitable group for young girls. It is a small inconvenience to residents and the Village should be encouraging these types of events. Mr. Benforado indicated there had been complaints in previous years about parking tickets issued to residents for these types of events with inadequate notice, and encouraged the Police Department to use discretion. Mr. Chapin indicated they could post the Sunday morning no parking signs early for residents to see, post items on social media and include something in a Village e-mail blast. The Board unanimously approved the street use permit for Her Madison Half Marathon (June 24).

**Seasonal Basketball hires** – Mr. Benforado asked that this item be removed from the consent agenda because his son is running the program. President Pro Tem Imes took over the meeting. The Board on a vote of 5-0-1 approved hires and set wages for season Basketball employees (Mr. Benforado recused himself).

**Change to Personnel Policy Manual** – Mr. Lederer asked that this item be removed from the consent agenda. The Personnel Committee reviewed and recommended a change to compensate part-time police officers at a rate of 1½ times their wage when working special events reimbursable work. Chief Chapin said it is a

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small incentive to broaden the pool of officers willing to work these types of events. The Board unanimously approved the change to the Personnel Policy Manual.

**Liquor License** – Mr. Lederer asked that the liquor license for Pick N Save be removed from the consent agenda. Mr. Benforado asked staff if there have been any problems or concerns with respect to the ClickList grocery pickup service. Chief Chapin and Mr. Sykes indicated there have been no problems to date. The Board unanimously approved the liquor license for Pick N Save.

**Ordinance L-2018-1** – The Board unanimously approved the third and final reading of [Ordinance L-2018-1](#) creating section 5.07(1) of the Village code of ordinances relating to abandoned or unclaimed property in the possession of the Police Department.

**Ordinance L-2018-2** – The Plan Commission held the required public hearing and is recommending approval of this amendment to the text of the zoning code. The reason for this ordinance change is to clarify and make sections of the code related to definition of decks, structures, uses and lot coverage consistent and unambiguous. It does not change the way the Village staff is administering the zoning code as it relates to these items. The Board unanimously approved the first reading of [Ordinance L-2018-2](#) amending sections 10-1-100 and 10-1-140 of the Village Code relating to lot coverage, and asked that it be scheduled for a second and third reading at the July Board meeting.

**Resolution R-2018-6** – The Board unanimously approved [Resolution R-2018-6](#) approving the 2017 Compliance Maintenance Annual Report.

**Resolution R-2018-7** – Mr. Benforado read the resolution aloud for the many guests that were in the audience. The Board unanimously approve [Resolution R-2018-7](#) honoring the 100th birthday of Dr. Fannie Ella Frazier Hicklin, and then the entire room sang “Happy Birthday” to her.

**Authorize Crew Chief to proceed with boiler slag treatment road maintenance project** – Mr. Lederer indicated that the Public Works Committee reviewed and recommended this treatment. Mr. Mitmoen said that boiler slag is more popular and resilient than chip seal treatments. It will patch potholes and seal the top of the road extending its life 5-7 years. The cost of boiler slag treatment is ~\$25K (mill and overlay would cost ~\$100K). The Board unanimously authorized Mr. Mitmoen to proceed with the boiler slag treatment project on Lake Mendota Drive, Bowdoin Road, Shorewood Boulevard and Edgehill Drive (along with striping projects) for an amount not to exceed \$38,500 (split about 50/50 between the capital fund and DPW general fund budget after about \$5,800 is paid from TIF 4).

**Appointments** – Mr. Imes recommended appointments of Amy Neeno-Eckwall and Alan Goldenberg to the Personnel Committee. Mr. Benforado relayed Ms. Bailey’s recommendation to reappoint Lucy Richards and Gloria Beach to the Recreation Committee. The Board unanimously approved Mr. Benforado’s appointments.

**Village President’s Report** – Mr. Benforado highlighted the League of Wisconsin Municipalities Mutual Insurance Trust Dividend payment to the Village in the amount of \$14,098 which is ~33% of the Village’s Worker’s Comp Premium.

The Board took a moment to discuss the recent heavy rain event on June 15-16. Mr. Mitmoen and Chief Chapin reviewed the actions of their staff. The Board commended all for their response during the storm and cleanup afterwards.

**Finance Committee** – Mr. Wade reported the Committee received a presentation on the draft 2017 Financial Statements from the Village’s auditor. The final version of the Financial Statements may be presented to the Board at its July meeting.

**Plan Commission** – Mr. Benforado reported the Commission received formal presentation on the Lodgic co-working/bistro/daycare project proposed at 2801 Marshall Court. The Commission held the required public hearing on the developer’s submittal of the GDP and SDP. There were a number of outstanding questions from the Commission and Village consultants, so no action was taken at the June meeting. The GDP, SDP and Certified Survey Map for the Lodgic project may come to the Board at its July meeting.

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**Ad hoc Sustainability Committee** – Ms. Readel reported the Committee put out a survey and received 188 responses. 75% of respondents were interested in sustainability measures. Two main priorities were phosphorus and urban canopy. The survey results will guide the Committee to identify areas of interest and subsequently areas of growth in sustainability efforts. The Committee plans to come up with a list of top 5 recommendation for what residents/business can do to be more sustainable.

**Ad hoc Heiden Haus Committee** – Ms. Readel reported the Committee's focus is now building renovations. They are considering the best course for fundraising and use of the funds to update the Heiden Haus.

**Golf Committee** – Mr. Wade reported on the status of the Adult and Junior Golf programs.

**Next Meeting** – By consensus, the Board decided to start its July 16 meeting at 6:30 pm due to the expectation of a long meeting.

**Adjourn** – The meeting adjourned at 9:09 pm.

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## FOURTH OF JULY VOLUNTEER HELP IS NEEDED

The Fourth of July celebration in Shorewood Hills is a tradition almost as old as the Village itself. The members of the Shorewood Hills EMS & Fire Association have been hard at work preparing for the day's activities, but they will need some additional help to make everything run smoothly.

Since the disbanding of the Fire Department and EMS in 2013, the Fourth of July celebration has become a more community wide effort. Village residents and friends have really stepped up to help these past years and volunteered to help with a myriad of activities including, serving beer at the Dance, hauling around tables and chairs, providing crowd control at the fireworks show, cleaning up afterwards and much more. People's lives change and so does their availability to volunteer. We are always in need of new volunteers to get involved and keep this Village tradition going in 2018 and in the future.

There are a few jobs that are more involved, but most that we have identified are simple tasks that just need a few able bodies to complete. We call these '30 minute jobs'. If you would like to help with the Fourth of July celebration, no special skills required, take a look at the list below to see if anything sparks your interest:

- Help haul tables and chairs from the Community Center for the Dance (Thursday, June 28 evening)
- Help serve beverages ("bartend") at the Dance (Tuesday, July 3 evening)
- Help serve beverages ("bartend") during the July Fourth activities (Wednesday, July 4 afternoon)
- Help set up the Art Fair (Wednesday, July 4 morning)
- Help blow up helium balloons (Wednesday, July 4 morning)
- Help pick up equipment and supplies after activities are done (Wednesday, July 4 late afternoon)
- Help clean up the golf course the morning after the fireworks (Thursday, July 5 early morning)
- Help haul tables and chairs back to the Community Center (Thursday, July 5 morning)

The more involved jobs that would require a longer commitment and some extra, simple training are:

- Assist with the little kids games (Wednesday, July 4 afternoon)
- Assist with the stage games (Wednesday, July 4 afternoon)
- Assist with the set up of the day's activities during the morning of July 4.
- Assist with general clean up of the celebration at the Fire Station during the morning of July 5.
- Provide crowd control at the fireworks before and during the show by monitoring the crowd control line from a golf cart (get a close up view of the fireworks).

### **LEAVE THE FIREWORKS TO THE PROFESSIONALS**

The sale of fireworks typically increases this time of year, but many of the fireworks sold in Wisconsin cannot be legally used by individuals. Sparklers (shorter than 36"), stationary cones and fountains, toy snakes, smoke bombs, caps, noisemakers and confetti poppers with less than ¼ grain of explosive mixture are the only legal fireworks allowed in the Village of Shorewood Hills (and neighboring communities). Even these legal fireworks can be dangerous!

Amateur fireworks endanger not only the users, but also bystanders and surrounding buildings. Simple fireworks can cause serious injuries to the eyes, head and hands. The Shorewood Hills EMS & Fire Association urges you to avoid using all fireworks and leave the fireworks show to the professionals! Visit the Blackhawk Country Club on Wednesday night, July 4 to see an outstanding fireworks display. Our personnel have completed extensive safety training and work under established guidelines in a controlled setting. Safety is our number one goal.

After this type of large fireworks display, you should never pick up fireworks or casings that may have fallen to the ground. Fireworks that have been ignited and fail to immediately explode or discharge may still be active. Children (and adults) should stay away from smoking or charred remnants and notify the Fire Department immediately for proper disposal.

If you must use fireworks, please:

- Read and follow the directions.
- Use fireworks outdoors.
- Always have water on hand (a garden hose and a bucket).
- Ignite fireworks on a flat surface away from any combustible or flammable materials.
- Keep fireworks away from the house, dry leaves, decks, woodchips, etc.
- Never give fireworks to small children.
- Never point fireworks at other people.
- Never re-light a "dud" firework (wait 15-20 minutes and place the "dud" in a bucket of water to soak).
- Never put any part of the body over the fireworks.

## ADULT GOLF PROGRAM

The 2018 Shorewood Hills Adult Golf Program at Blackhawk Country Club is two months in, with two to go. The program takes place on selected Monday mornings in May, June, July and August. ## FIRE CHIEF PAUL PARKS

Paul Parks, age 89, passed away on Friday, June 15, 2018. Paul became the Village's fourth Fire Chief in 1970. Paul had begun work for the Village as a maintenance crew member in 1964 and joined the fire department soon after. Paul attended numerous fire schools and training programs in the period from 1964 until 1970. Subsequently, Paul became a State-certified fire instructor and traveled all over the state teaching fire service classes. Paul retired as Fire Chief in 1983 but stayed on the department as a volunteer and head of the public works crew. He again became Fire Chief on an interim basis for a few months in early 1987 when the Village was temporarily without a fire chief. Paul finally retired from all his Village jobs in 1990 after 26 years of service.

Prior to coming to work for the Village, Paul was a mechanic in the 42nd Cavalry Division of the US Army during the post-WWII reconstruction efforts in Germany. He married his wife of 50 years, Lucille, in 1950. Paul also worked for 13 years as an over-the-road truck driver.

The Village staff have fond memories of the old Fire Chief's visits to the Village Hall.
