JUNE - JULY 2018

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE MAY 21, 2018 MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

(Complete detailed minutes will be available on our website or at the Village Hall)

Attendance – Ms. Readel was excused.

Procedure Orientation – Mr. Benforado discussed the importance of Committee meeting minutes.

Consent Agenda – In an effort to expedite meetings, items on the consent agenda are considered as a group and are adopted with one motion. Any Board member may unilaterally remove an item from the consent agenda if he or she believes the item needs discussion. Consent agenda items included approval of closed session minutes from the May 3 Board meeting; street use permits for Ronald McDonald House Groundbreaking (June 2), Wisconsin Track Club's Moovin' 5K (June 2), Tri-It Triathlon (July 4), and Make Music Madison (June 21); step increase for police officer John Pierce to Grade 14 Step 6 (\$27.77/hour); and extend employee benefits to Officer Dodsworth while filling patrol vacancy created by pending alternate duty status of Officer Dostalek.

Board Minutes – Mr. Wade requested the April 17, 2018 Board meeting minutes be removed from the Consent Agenda and proposed three amendments. The Board unanimously agreed to the amendments and approved the minutes.

Approve hire and wage rates of seasonal staff – Mr. Lederer asked that this item be removed from the Consent Agenda so that he could recuse himself from the discussion because his daughter is a candidate for seasonal employment. The Personnel Committee has recommended hiring of seasonal staff selected by Recreation Program parent coordinators, Pool Committee, DPW Chief and Forester. The Board approved the hiring and wage rates on a vote of 5-0-1 (Mr. Lederer abstaining).

Ordinance L-2018-1 – State Statute requires the Village to have an ordinance in order for the Police Department to dispose of abandoned or unclaimed property. The Public Health & Safety Committee proposed Ordinance L-2018-1 creating section 5.07(1) relating to abandoned or unclaimed property. Mr. Wade suggested a change to the language specifying how donations of property could be handled by the Police Chief. The Board unanimously approved the first and second reading of [Ordinance L-2018-1](#) with the language suggested by Mr. Wade.

Resolution R-2018-6 – Police Chief Chapin proposed eliminating the fee and expiration date for bicycle licenses to encourage more people to license their bikes. Staff identified additional items on the fee schedule that need attention. The Board unanimously approved removing the fee and expiration date for bicycle licenses and referred the proposed changes to the fee schedule to the Services Committee.

Consider policy related to use of the Board Room – The Board referred the matter to the Services Committee and suggested they craft a policy that would consolidate the quasi-Government groups, like the Shorewood Hills League, Shorewood Hills Foundation and Garden Club, into one category. Also, consider the idea of making Village buildings more accessible for use by residents.

Authorize correspondence with the City of Madison requesting transfer of a "Class B" liquor license – Mr. Frantz has been in discussion with Mayor Soglin's staff and members of the Common Council to obtain a liquor license from Madison for a proposed development project on Marshall Court. State statute allows adjacent municipalities to transfer unused liquor license between them. The Board unanimously authorized Mr. Frantz to send the prepared correspondence to Mayor Soglin and the Common Council.

Consider authorization to purchase Mitel 250 phone system from ESG – Village staff has met with two vendors regarding replacement of the Village's 13+ year old phone system that has become more and more problematic. The staff team evaluated the systems and recommends the Mitel 250 phone system from Enterprise Systems Group (ESG) for a quoted amount of \$19,544.50. There will be some internal wiring and computer work needed for the new system. The Board unanimously approved an amount not to exceed \$23,000 for the system and improvements to be paid out of the Capital Fund.

Authorize demolition of the Scout Shack at Post Farm Park – The Services and Parks Committees are recommending the demolition of the dilapidated and unused Scout Shack. Asbestos testing of the roof shingles came back negative. The Public Works Crew could do the work. The Board unanimously

approved the demolition of the Scout Shack at a time determined by the Public Works Chief after July 15.

Consider underground electrical service easement to MG&E – Mr. Benforado recused himself from the discussion. Mr. Frantz stated he worked with an attorney at Boardman Clark that deals with these types of easements. He found out that 95% of municipalities simply approve these utility easements as proposed. But, the utilities will accept some changes to the language, and he revised the easement to include the changes drafted by the attorney. Mr. Wade thought the term ‘perpetual’ was too broad and that there should be a process for termination of the easement, initiated by MG&E, when it is no longer needed. Mr. Frantz would discuss the additional changes with MG&E. No action taken at this time.

Appointments – Mr. Lederer proposed reappointments to the Public Works Committee including Chris Petykowski, Yang Tao, Rick Chappell, Cara Coburn-Faris and Tu Le (Tracy Bailey has been reassigned as a trustee member of the Committee). The Trustees unanimously approved these reappointments. Mr. Benforado appointed and the Trustees approve Michael Stineman as Golf Committee Coordinator. Mr. Benforado appointed and the Trustees approved Tracy Bailey as Chair of the Recreation Committee.

Village President’s Report – Mr. Benforado reviewed the schedule for the Board’s Family Picnic on July Fourth.

Village Administrator’s Report – Mr. Frantz on the efforts of Linda Bochert to have music and food carts at Blackhawk Country Club before the fireworks show on July Fourth. He also updated the Board on the status of the insurance claim related to the computer crash in 2017.

Plan Commission – Mr. Benforado reported the Commission recommended approval of a Lake Mendota resident’s proposal to install a tram to replace existing stairs going down to the lake. The Commission approved changes to the signs around the UW Children’s Hospital and Emergency Room. The Commission expect to consider General and Specific Development Plans for the Lodgic project at 2801 Marshall Court at its June meeting.

Public Works Committee – Mr. Lederer reported Dane County is collecting traffic data around the Village and that the Committee has talked about resurfacing a couple of streets, including Lake Mendota Drive.

Services Committee – Mr. Wade reported that Pellitteri Waste Systems discussed its recycling program with the Committee. Small items like bread ties, bottle caps, etc. are contaminating the recycling product. There is a good [video on the website](#) about the recycling process.

Ad hoc Heiden Haus Committee – The Committee met and is continuing to discuss the direction of the improvement projects.

Blackhawk Liaison Committee – The fundraising golf outing to support the July Fourth Fireworks has been postponed until Monday, September 10.

Adjourn – The meeting adjourned at 9:30 pm.

DUMPSTERS/RECYCLING ROUNDUP/LARGE ITEM PICKUP REVIEW

On the weekend of May 4-6, the Village held its annual Spring Cleaning Dumpster event. On Saturday, May 5, the EMS & Fire Association conducted a Computer & Home Electronics Recycling Roundup and zipped around the Village picking up large items for the dumpster. Both events were a great success.

The Village crew packed two 30-yard dumpsters to the brim (and above) and filled a couple of dump trucks with scrap metal. The EMS & Fire Association visited a dozen houses hauling a sectional couch/hide-a-bed, a treadmill, furniture and all sorts of debris. Residents dropped off three trucks worth of computers and electronics that will be recycled.

The Dumpsters are a once a year event in the spring, but the Computer & Home Electronics Recycling Roundup will return in the fall on Sunday, September 9.

There are a few jobs that are more involved, but most that we have identified are simple tasks that just need a few able bodies to complete. We call these '30 minute jobs'. If you would like to help with the Fourth of July celebration, no special skills required, take a look at the list below to see if anything sparks your interest:

- Help haul tables and chairs from the Community Center for the Independence Day Dance (Thursday, June 28 evening)
- Help serve beverages ("bartend") at the Dance (Tuesday, July 3 evening)
- Help serve beverages ("bartend") during the July Fourth activities (Wednesday, July 4 afternoon)
- Help set up the Art Fair (Wednesday, July 4 morning)
- Help blow up helium balloons (Wednesday, July 4 morning)
- Help with the stage games (Wednesday, July 4 afternoon)
- Help pick up equipment and supplies after activities are done (Wednesday, July 4 late afternoon)
- Help clean up the golf course the morning after the fireworks (Thursday, July 5 early morning)
- Help haul tables and chairs back to the Community Center (Thursday, July 5 morning)

The more involved jobs that would require a longer commitment and some extra, simple training are:

- Provide crowd control at the fireworks before and during the show by monitoring the crowd control line from a golf cart (get a close up view of the fireworks).
- Assist with the set up of the day's activities during the morning of July 4.
- Assist with general clean up of the celebration at the Fire Station during the morning of July 5.

There is something for all ages, including the popular egg toss and fire truck rides (all adults on fire truck rides must be accompanied by a child ☺). Waterfights – The Adult Waterfight Tournament has become quite the spectator sport. Veterans and newbies will battle for the title and Village bragging rights. Who will capture the trophy this year? Gather your friends

Wisconsin has made considerable progress when it comes to encouraging motorists to wear their safety belt every time they travel. Over the last decade, Wisconsin's safety belt use rate has increased from about 74 percent (in 2009) to nearly 90 percent today.

While that is encouraging, we still see far too many people who make the dangerous - and frankly - irresponsible decision to not wear a safety belt. As part of national efforts to encourage all motorists to buckle up, Shorewood Hills Police Department is joining law enforcement agencies across Wisconsin as part of the annual Click It or Ticket mobilization May 21 to June 3.

The reason we enforce Wisconsin's mandatory safety belt law is not to write citations - but to save lives and prevent needless injuries. Consider for a moment that the 10 percent of Wisconsin motorists who fail to buckle up account for nearly half of the drivers and passengers killed in traffic crashes each year.

In Wisconsin, motorists can be stopped and cited for failing to wear a safety belt. In addition, drivers can also be cited for every unbuckled passenger in their vehicle. During Click It or Ticket - and throughout the year - we want all motorists to be safe, abide by all traffic laws, and always remember to buckle up - every seat, every trip.

ADULT GOLF PROGRAM

The Shorewood Hills Adult Golf Program for 2018 will be conducted at Blackhawk Country Club. The program format has changed a bit this year but still takes place on selected Monday mornings in May, June, July and August. Classes include 45 minutes of instruction with PGA Head Professional Matt Hartmann and participants have the opportunity to practice what they learned by playing the course for the balance of the morning hours. Beginners are welcome. Students may pick the dates they can attend.

The original registration deadline has pass but you may register for any or all of the remaining session, any time throughout the summer.

Class options: 8:00 am-9:00 am or 9:30 am-10:30 am.


Cost to participate:

- 8 weeks - \$330.00
- 6 weeks - \$247.50
- 4 weeks - \$165.00
- 2 weeks - \$110.00
- 1 week - \$55.00

If students choose less than 8 weeks and would like to add an additional date after the program starts, they may do so for an additional \$55 per class. Contact the Village Hall for details.

The program fee includes instruction from a PGA Pro, range balls, range ball clean up and the cost of golf after instruction (motorized cart extra). The program provides a wonderful opportunity for Village residents to learn and enjoy the game of golf in a beautiful setting.
