HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE MARCH 18, 2019 MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

(Complete detailed minutes will be available on our website or at the Village Hall)

Attendance – Mr. Friedman was excused. Mr. Imes arrived at 7:33 pm.

Consent Agenda – In an effort to expedite meetings, items on the consent agenda are considered as a group and are adopted with one motion. Any Board member may unilaterally remove an item from the consent agenda if he or she believes the item needs discussion. The consent agenda included approval of Caucus, regular Board meeting and closed session minutes from January 22, 2019; a street use permit for UW Kinesiology Club's Tri 4 Schools 5K on April 16, 2019; a block party permit for the Shorewood Hills League's Bocce Bash on June 15, 2019; a temporary Class B Beer/Wine license for the League's Bocce Bash; and the Good Neighbor Residential Building policy being a standing Village policy.

Regular Board meeting minutes of February 18, 2019 – These minutes were taken off the consent agenda. The Board unanimously approved the minutes after making some changes.

Special Board meeting minutes of February 21, 2019 – These minutes were taken off the consent agenda. The Board unanimously approved the minutes after making some changes.

Special Events Street Use Permit – Javi's Turtle Day 5K on May 25 – This item was taken off the consent agenda with concerns about traffic control, safety of runners and possible inconvenience to Village residents. The Board deferred action and directed staff to discuss these concerns with the event organizer.

Approve floor area special exception and findings for 3407 Circle Close – Mr. Benforado reviewed the Plan Commission's deliberations and recommendation for approval. The homeowner was in attendance to answer any questions. The Board unanimously approved the floor area special exception and findings.

Approve purchase of VieVu LE5 police body cameras – The Board had previously approved the purchase of three body worn cameras. There has been an unacceptable delay in delivery and Chief Chapin would like to change vendors. The Board asked about usage of body cameras by other Departments. Lt. Martens commented that many Departments in Dane County are using the cameras and he feels they are an important protection for police officers and the public if an incident occurs. The Board unanimously approved the purchase of the VieVu LE5 cameras for the quoted amount of \$2,424.

Consider MS4 stormwater permit submittal through Madison Area Stormwater Partnership – The Village is required to submit an annual report as part of its stormwater discharge permit. Village Engineer Brian Berquist reviewed the draft report submittals for 2017 and 2018. Since the Village last submitted a report, the requirements have changed from every two-years to annual submittals. The Board noted that some items are missing from the report. Mr. Berquist stated he has been working with Village staff to obtain the necessary information. The Board unanimously authorized Mr. Frantz to submit the completed report upon review by Village staff.

Ordinance L-2019-1 – The Services Committee is recommending repeal of the garbage grinder ordinance put in place in the 1950s. The ordinance is no longer relevant and using garbage disposals is no longer the preferred method of disposing food waste. The Board unanimously approved the first and second reading of [Ordinance L-2019-1](#) repealing section 9.01 of the Village Code relating to disposal of garbage.

Ordinance L-2019-2 – Lt. Martens reviewed the new provisions in the State Code to allow for a classification of HPV (Habitual Parking Violator), five or more unpaid citation for more than 60 days. He explained the proposed process to be used by police: If an HPV does not attempt to make a good faith effort to contact the municipal court to resolve the matter, the Police Department may impound the vehicle until such a time as the tickets are paid. The Board unanimously approved the first reading of [Ordinance L-2019-2](#) creating section 7.08(10) related to parking and towing of vehicles.

Consider awarding base and supplemental bids for Marshall Court, Catafalque Drive and Bike Path construction to Parisi Construction – Mr. Berquist reviewed the bids for the project. 29 contractors inquired about the project and three bids were received. The bids were a bit higher than expected, mainly due to the increased cost of asphalt and storm sewer pipe. The project is difficult to manage with a tight time frame and traffic management during construction. Mr. Berquist explained the contract includes unit

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pricing for the project rather than a lump sum upon completion. Town & Country Engineering staff will be on-site monitoring the project. Mr. Frantz indicated TID 3 has the capacity to pay the extra cost of the project but the Board needs to be cognizant spending money now may limit the availability of cash later for the University Avenue project. Mr. Berquist said the project is scheduled for 80 calendar days, being done by September 15. However, the Lodgic project is currently behind schedule and could affect when this project can begin. They are hoping for a June 1 start. The bike path portion of the project could be completed by about July 1.

Consider awarding alternate bid to Parisi Construction for asphalt path reconstruction adjacent to Shorewood Hills School – Mr. Berquist reviewed the project to repair base and replace asphalt on the walking path along Harvard, Columbia and Amherst near Shorewood Hills School. Construction of the path cannot begin until after school gets out for the summer and must be completed a week before school begins in September.

» The Board considered the previous two items together. The Board unanimously approved awarding the base (\$1,133,312.50), supplemental (\$24,650.00), alternate contracts (\$52,126.50) and 10% contingency expense to Parisi Construction who was the low bidder.

Approve quote from Brown Roofing to replace the Community Center roof – The Services Committee recommended approval of the low quote to replace the leaking roof at the Community Center. This expense would be split 50/50 with the Pool. The quote was for \$30K and may increase by \$6-10K depending on how much damaged insulation is found under the existing roof. The Board unanimously approved an amount not to exceed \$44K for Brown Roofing to replace the roof at the Community Center.

Consider authorization to retain architect to assist with Heiden Haus renovations – The ad hoc Heiden Haus Committee has established 13 features of substantial agreement for the renovation of the existing structure. The Board unanimously authorized Mr. Frantz to identify an architectural firm that can produce plans based on the renovation list identified by the Committee and bring the project to bid. There is money available from previous donations to cover the cost of an architect.

Consider exempting golf programs from administrative surcharges – Mr. Wade reviewed the history of relations with Blackhawk Country Club and feels the Village should continue to be involved in the registration and administration of the golf programs. He feels the addition of the 10% administrative surcharge to the registration makes the adult golf program less competitive with other area lesson programs. He recommends waiving the fee because the program is small and it is not a lot of money. Also, that the administrative workload for the program is less than some others that include payroll. Mr. Benforado said he feels all recreation programs should pay something for the administrative support they receive. Ms. Readel and Ms. Bailey suggested reducing the surcharge to 5% this year and refer the matter to the Recreation Committee for a more global evaluation. The Board unanimously approved reducing the administrative surcharges for the golf programs to 5% for 2019.



« *The Board of Trustees took a short break to thank Trustees Readel and Wade who were participating in their final Board meeting. The Board also acknowledged Mr. Frantz' 15th anniversary working for the Village.*

Appointments – Mr. Benforado made the following appointments that were unanimously approved by the Board: Eileen Sutula as Election Official/Poll Workers; Mike Stineman as Chair of the Golf Committee; and reappointing Fred Wade to the Golf Committee.

Village President's Report – Mr. Benforado highlighted an article in the Wisconsin State Journal that selected UW Credit Union as the #1 best workplace in the Madison area

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(Dane, Sauk and Columbia Counties). He felt this was a significant accomplishment for a Village business that has been a great neighbor in our community (*see article on page 12*).

Village Administrator's Report – Mr. Frantz reported on a 400-600 car parking ramp possibly being built at the V.A. Hospital in 2021. The ramp would exit onto University Bay Drive and a traffic signal at the UBD/Marshall Court/Overlook Terrace intersection is being proposed. Mr. Frantz also reported on the City of Madison considering a resolution to oppose Dane County's policy requiring jurisdictional transfer of county highways. The Village may want to consider a similar resolution.

Plan Commission – Mr. Benforado reported the Commission held a public hearing on a height special exception permit for a property near Harvard Drive and Beloit Court but did not take any action. Some members of the commission were concerned about approving the special exception permit without knowledge of erosion control and stormwater plan. Consideration of the permit was postponed until the homeowner can provide the additional information.

Public Works Committee – Mr. Lederer reported the Committee reviewed the Stormwater Utility with the intention of providing the Finance Committee with guidance on some aspects of the Utility. The Committee also discussed traffic control guidelines.

Ad hoc Sustainability Committee – Ms. Readel reported she intends to continue on the Committee when she is no longer a trustee. She is developing a draft Sustainability Plan with staff that will be shared with Village committees and the public for additional input.

Ad hoc Stormwater Committee – Mr. Benforado reported the Committee intends to provide an interim report to the Board around May 1. The Committee is comfortable hiring AE2S to provide storm-modeling services to the Village, in addition to their work with the City of Madison. Mr. Frantz and Mr. Berquist are talking to AE2S about a contract.

Parks Committee – Ms. Readel reported that the Committee needs to replace one member.

Adjourn – The meeting was adjourned at 10:22 pm.

2019 MUNICIPAL JUDGE SEMINAR COURT ADMINISTRATION

March 7 & 8, 2019

Elkhart Lake, Wisconsin

[FOR IMMEDIATE RELEASE] The Honorable Felice Borisy-Rudin, Municipal Judge of the Village of Shorewood Hills attended the Municipal Judge Court Administration Seminar conducted by the Wisconsin Supreme Court, Office of Judicial Education on March 7 & 8, 2019 at the Osthoff Resort in Elkhart Lake, Wisconsin.

A municipal court is an independent branch of municipal government. Municipal courts have jurisdiction over actions involving violations of municipal ordinances. Generally, this includes traffic citations and other offenses such as disorderly conduct and retail theft, but could include citations for violations of zoning ordinances. There are 232 municipal courts in Wisconsin. The Village of Shorewood Hills municipal court has been in existence since 1961. The court handles approximately 600 cases each year. Judge Felice Borisy-Rudin has served on the court since May, 2018.

This Court Administration Seminar is one of several seminars put on each year by the Director of State Courts, Office of Judicial Education. Attendance at one of these seminars satisfies the Wisconsin Supreme Court requirement that all municipal judges earn four credits of continuing judicial education each year.

The seminar included many topics of importance to municipal judges. This included sessions on:

- **IMPLEMENTING PROCEDURAL JUSTICE;**
- **THE USE OF INTERPRETERS IN MUNICIPAL COURTS;**
- **DESIGNING A SAFE COURTROOM;**
- **ADVANTAGES AND DISADVANTAGES OF DIFFERENT METHODS TO ENFORCE JUDGMENTS;**
- **THE RIGHT TO A HARASSMENT FREE WORKPLACE;**
- **JUDICIAL ETHICS CONCERNING EX PARTE COMMUNICATION;**
- **UPDATE ON NEW LAWS AND APPELLATE CASES**

VOTER INFORMATION

The Village's goal is for all eligible Shorewood Hills voters to be able to cast a ballot and have that ballot counted. Please contact the Village Hall (267-2680) if you have any questions after reading the info below.

Voter Registration – To be eligible to register here, you must have resided at your Shorewood Hills address for at least 10 consecutive days prior to the next election. If you have moved to a different home in the Village or changed your name, you must reregister. Within 20 days of an election, you can only register in person. Stop by the Village Hall (Monday through Friday, from 8:00 am to 5:00 pm). You will need proof of your residency in the Village when registering. Common proofs of residency, among others, include a WI driver's license, a utility bill, bank statement, paycheck, government document, or signed lease. The document must include your name at your Village address. It is possible to register at the polls on Election Day but plan on spending extra time. State law does not allow registration on the Monday before an election.

Photo Identification – A Photo ID is required to vote. The most common types of acceptable photo ID include: a WI DOT-issued drivers license, a WI DOT-issued identification card, a Military ID card issued by the U.S. Uniformed Services, or a U.S. passport book or card. **The photo ID is proof of your identity only, it does not require your Village address.** IMPORTANT TO NOTE: An out of state driver's license IS NOT an acceptable ID in Wisconsin; a Wisconsin driver's license or passport may be expired if the expiration date is after November 6, 2018 (the date of the last federal election). There are other forms of acceptable ID for voting purposes (*see the [Voter ID flyer](#) on-line*).

Poll Location – Village Hall ([810 Shorewood Blvd](#)) in the basement. Polls are open from 7:00 am to 8:00 pm.

Absentee Voting – In-person absentee voting is available at the Village Hall during office hours (8:00 am to 5:00 pm, Monday-Friday) until the Friday before the election (March 29). Before receiving a ballot, you are required to show a photo ID. You must be registered in order to obtain a ballot. State law does not allow in-person absentee voting on the Monday before an election.

Absentee Ballot Requests – You must be registered to vote in order to receive a ballot. An absentee ballot can be requested on-line at [myvote.wi.gov](#). The application form is also available on the Village's website or you may stop by the Village Hall to request an absentee ballot be mailed to you. The completed form may be faxed to the Village Hall (608-266-5929); e-mailed to the Village Clerk (clerk@shorewood-hills.org); sent via U.S. mail or delivered in-person to the Village Hall. An acceptable proof of ID must accompany the absentee ballot request. The deadline to request an absentee ballot to be mailed is the Thursday before the election (March 28). All absentee ballot must be returned to the Village Hall by Election Day (not just postmarked by that date).

Signing the Poll Book – All voters must sign the poll book in order to obtain a ballot. The poll book contains a signature block for each voter. Anyone using a fictitious signature will be required to re-sign the book before he/she will be allowed to vote. Voters unable to sign the poll book because of a disability are exempt from this requirement. If this applies to you, simply tell the Election Officials that you are unable to sign because of a disability. You do not need to disclose the nature of your disability to the Election Officials or to any observers. Election Officials will write "exempt by order of inspectors" in your signature block.






JUNIOR GOLF PROGRAM

ADULT GOLF PROGRAM

The Shorewood Hills Adult Golf Program for 2019 will be conducted at Blackhawk Country Club. The program takes place on selected Monday morning in May, June, July and August. Classes start at either 8:00 am or 9:30 am and include 45 minutes of instruction with PGA Head Professional Matt Hartmann. Participants will have the opportunity to practice what they learned by playing the course for the balance of the morning hours. Beginners are welcome.

Students may pick the dates/classes they can attend. The specific dates and lesson topics will be:

- May 13 - Evaluation and Basic Fundamentals
- May 20 - Review of Fundamentals and Full Swing Irons
- June 10 - Short Game: Putting
- June 24 - Short Game: Chipping and Pitching
- July 8 - Full Swing: Irons
- July 15 - Full Swing: Woods
- August 5 - Short Game: Putting
- August 19 - Short Game: Chipping and Pitching



Cost to participate varies depending on how many classes you take: 8 weeks (\$315.00); 6 weeks (\$236.25); 4 weeks (\$157.50); 2 weeks (\$105.00); or 1 week (\$52.50). If students choose less than 8 weeks and would like to add an additional date after the program starts, they may do so for an additional \$52.50 per class. Contact the Village Hall for details.

The program fee includes instruction from a PGA Pro, range balls, range ball clean up and the cost of golf after instruction (motorized cart extra). The on-line registration form is available on the Village's website (www.shorewood-hills.org/adultgolf) or you can fill out the on-line form at the Village Hall. The deadline for registration is **Monday, May 6, 2019** (registration after the deadline is possible, contact the Village Hall).

LAND REC CAMP 2019

TIME FOR SPRING CLEANING!

The Village's spring cleanup has been a great success over the past few years. This year the event will be held on Friday, Saturday and Sunday, May 3, 4 and 5. On those days, the Village will have two 30-yard dumpsters available outside the Public Works garage (1008 Shorewood Blvd.).

From 8:00 am to 5:00 pm, bring items (not fit for donation or garage sales) that have been collecting over the winter or over the years and discard them once and for all. A Public Works truck will be available for recyclable metal items.

But, we CAN'T take everything. Certain materials are banned from landfills because of their toxicity. They require special disposal methods to prevent environmental damage. Some materials may not be toxic but are prohibited for other reasons (for example: to encourage recycling). The [Dane County Clean Sweep Program](#) may take some prohibited material or the Village's waste hauler, Pellitteri Waste Systems, would be happy to discuss alternate methods of disposal of any of the items listed below. RESIDENTIAL COMPUTER & ELECTRONICS RECYCLING ROUNDUP

The Shorewood Hills EMS & Fire Association, in conjunction with the Village's Services Committee, will be sponsoring an e-cycle event on **Saturday, May 4, 2019** from 10:00 am to 2:00 pm (which is during the Village's Spring Cleaning Weekend).



Residents of the Village may dispose of their old computers, monitors, TVs, radios and other small home electronics by bringing them to the Public Works Garage (1008 Shorewood Blvd.). The collection point for computers and electronics will be the south end of the parking lot (the trash dumpsters will be towards the north end of the parking lot). Computers and most home electronics can be dropped off for free. Our recycling partner charges a modest fee to recycle old computer monitors, TVs, copier/fax machines and window AC units because of the materials involved. We pass that fee along to you (ranging from \$5-\$60 per item based on size/weight). We can take dehumidifiers, small dorm room style refrigerators, etc. but there may be small pass-through fees for these items as well.


Help keep potentially damaging materials out of our landfills by disposing of your old computer, TVs and other electronics on May 4.

NATIONAL PRESCRIPTION DRUG TAKE BACK DAY 2019



The Village of Shorewood Hills Police Department, in conjunction with the Department of Justice (DOJ), is participating in the “National Prescription Drug Take Back Day!” This event will be held at the Village of Shorewood Hills Police Dept., 810 Shorewood Boulevard on April 27 from 10:00 am until 2:00 pm.

What can I bring to National Prescription Drug Take Back Day?

Prescription (controlled and non-controlled) and over-the-counter medications, ointments, inhalers, patches, creams, non-aerosol sprays, vials and pet medications.

What should I leave at home?

Do Not Bring: Illegal drugs, needles/sharps, mercury thermometers, aerosol cans, biohazardous materials (anything containing a bodily fluid or blood), flares, personal care products (shampoo, soaps, lotions, sunscreens, etc.), household hazardous waste (paint, pesticides, chemicals, oil, or gas) or acids.

Do I need to worry about what I’m dropping off?

This program is anonymous, and all efforts should be made to protect the anonymity of individuals disposing of medications. No questions or requests for identification, including proof of residency should be made.

How should I prep my medications?

Solids: Participants may dispose of solid, non-liquid medication(s) by removing the medication from its container and disposing of it directly into a disposal box or into a clear sealable plastic bag. Plastic pill containers should not be put in the disposal box. Recycling bins will be provided for disposal of plastic pill containers. Blister packages are acceptable without the medications being removed.

Liquids: Liquids will be accepted during this initiative. However, the liquids, creams and sprays must be in their original packaging. Liquids without the original packaging will not be accepted.
