**HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE MAY 20, 2019 MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES**

*(Complete detailed minutes will be available on our website or at the Village Hall)*

**Attendance** – Mr. Imes was excused. Mr. Friedman and Ms. Bailey were excused from the meeting at 7:56 pm and 8:34 pm, respectively.

**Procedures Orientation** – Mr. Benforado explained the process and requirements for a closed session.

**Consider interim ad hoc Stormwater Committee report and update**

**on status of University Avenue corridor stormwater work underway by the Village and City** – Eric Reidner of the Stormwater Committee (and stormwater civil engineer) provided an overview of the Committee’s interim report. The Committee’s mission was to learn about the August 20 flooding event and recommend actionable steps to prevent future flooding. The report focuses on educating the Board and public on the flooding issues along the University Avenue corridor. The interim report includes recommendations on education, constraints, objectives (what level of storm should be addressed), threshold questions (i.e. what is the Village willing to give to resolve the flooding problem) and technical recommendations (with the assistance of engineering consultants). The report strives to understand the recent flood events of June 16, 2018 and August 20, 2018. The report examines the Willow Creek watershed and the area stormwater system. It reviews two previous studies done 20 years ago and examines the alternatives proposed. These alternatives will be studied by the Village’s stormwater engineering consultant (AE2S). The report identifies some short-term solutions (low cost, easy things that can be done) and long-term solutions, which are a work in progress with Village staff and AE2S. Mr. Frantz reported on the status of stormwater modeling work done by AE2S on the University Avenue corridor ([see article on page 5](#)). A number of fast moving recommendations and potentialities need to be considered soon. The Board scheduled a special meeting on Wednesday, June 12 at 7:00 pm to consider these matter in more detail.

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**Consent Agenda** – In an effort to expedite meetings, items on the consent agenda are considered as a group and are adopted with one motion. Any Board member may unilaterally remove an item from the consent agenda if he or she believes the item needs discussion. The consent agenda included approval of a transient merchant permit for the Let’s Eat Out! food carts; street use permits for the food carts (Thursdays, June 13-August 1), Her Madison Half Marathon (July 21), and the July 4th parade/celebration (July 4); block party permits for Cornell Court (June 1) and the Independence Day Dance (July 3); and the hire of part-time officer John Maginot to also perform seasonal CSO duties.

**Board Meeting Minutes** – Mr. Benforado asked that the Board minutes of April 16, 2019 be removed from the consent agenda to makes some clarifications in the discussion of the Dark Store resolution. The Board unanimously approved the April 16 minutes with the changes.

**Ordinance L-2019-2** – Chief Chapin informed the Board there are new options available to immobilize vehicles without towing expenses. The Public Health & Safety Committee has not yet met to discuss a possible change to [Ordinance L-2019-2](#). The Board deferred action on this item until its June meeting.

**Ordinance L-2019-3** – Mr. Frantz explained the makeup of the Waterfront Committee and history of non-resident participation. In recent years, there have been more resident users than in the past. The Waterfront Committee would like to reduce the number of non-resident members of the Committee from two to one and increase the number of resident members from five to six. The Board unanimously approved the first reading of [Ordinance L-2019-3](#) amending section 2.02(10)(c)3. regarding the non-resident composition of the Waterfront Committee.

**Village President’s Report** – Mr. Benforado reported on the May 10 Spokes to School event. Cara Coburn Faris did a great job organizing the bike or walk to school event ([see article on page 8](#)). He discussed

preparations for the Board of Trustees' Picnic on July Fourth. Mr. Benforado also reviewed the Arbor Day celebration which was held on May 3. He joined other volunteers in planting six trees around the school grounds.

**Village Administrator's Report** – Mr. Frantz reported that the Department of Transportation has approved the Village's selection of KL Engineering and its scope of services being provided for the Rustic Bridge replacement in a few years. He mentioned that the Village should consider improvements to the access road and spillway to go along with the bridge project. Public input and cost considerations are the next topics to consider. Mr. Frantz indicated that the Public Input Meeting concerning reconstruction of University Avenue has been rescheduled to Thursday, June 13 (*see article on page 5*). He also provided the Board with an update on Marshall Court reconstruction. The project is behind schedule waiting for the Lodgic project to vacate some land that will be used for the road and bike path. The Village Engineer expects a late June start but the bike path still being completed by the end of August.

**Plan Commission** – Mr. Benforado informed the Board of his intention to recuse himself on any matters related to Garden Homes redevelopment at both Plan Commission and Board meetings. The Plan Commission dedicated its May 14 meeting to Garden Homes but the Board did not discuss it due to a lack of a quorum if Mr. Benforado recused himself.

**Ad hoc Heiden Haus Committee** – The Board had previously delegated the authority to Mr. Frantz to select an architect to move the project forward. Mr. Frantz engaged Tracy Koziol and Nancy Holyoke of the Heiden Haus Committee to interview potential architects. They are considering which candidate to hire to develop preliminary plans that can be shared with the public.

**Parks Committee** – Mr. Lederer reported the Committee discussed establishing goals of the Committee and for the Parks. They also talked about the restoration projects throughout the Village Parks.

**Blackhawk Liaison Committee** – Mr. Lederer mentioned the Shorewood Scramble golf fundraiser for the fireworks show on Monday, September 9.

**Pool Committee** – Mr. Lederer reported the Committee received a state of the Pool report. UW and Badger Aquatic Club have rented the Pool for pre-season use and the new boilers appear to be working well. The roof repairs are not quite complete yet. The Committee considered and awarded grants to prospective members in need. Mr. Lederer mentioned that Shorewood Hills Pool is due to host the All-City Swim meet in a few years. The Swim and Dive Team Parents Committee has begun discussing all that is involved.

**Waterfront Committee** – Mr. Frantz reported that the marina facilities are opening late due to the August 20, 2018 flooding event. A majority of the pier boards floated away and the new boards are backordered.

**Closed Session** – The Board went into closed session at 9:00 pm to discuss a Police personnel issue.

**Adjourn** – The Board ended the closed session and adjourned the meeting at 9:45 pm.

## PUBLIC INVOLVEMENT MEETING – UNIVERSITY AVENUE RECONSTRUCTION

This Public Involvement Meeting (PIM) has been rescheduled to Thursday, June 13 from 6:00-8:00 pm. It will be held at the UW Credit Union Corporate Office (3500 University Avenue). The meeting will be an open house format with exhibits available for review. A formal presentation will take place at 6:30 pm. Village and City of Madison officials along with the design consultant, KL Engineering, will be available to answer questions.

The Village of Shorewood Hills and City of Madison, in conjunction with the WisDOT and the Federal Highways Administration are proposing a project to reconstruct University Avenue between Shorewood Blvd and University Bay Drive. The proposed undertaking will consist of reconstructing University Avenue to a similar urban boulevard arterial with six (6) vehicle travel lanes, curb and gutter, sidewalk and a raised median. Additional project work includes intersection improvements, traffic signals and street lighting, storm sewer, sanitary sewer and water main\*. A multiuse path bridge or underpass crossing of University Bay Drive north of University Avenue will also be evaluated for possible inclusion in the project. Construction is currently scheduled for 2021.

\* Some aspects of the reconstruction plan may change due to stormwater considerations being considered concurrently (*see article below*).

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## STATUS OF UNIVERSITY AVENUE STORMWATER MODELING

Amber Leffers, Stormwater Engineer for AE2S, presented a number of stormwater model runs to the Stormwater Committee on May 6. Data indicates that simply extending the 96" stormwater pipe from Shorewood Boulevard to Grand Avenue to complete the storm sewer may not have that great of an effect on flooding along University Avenue. The estimated \$13M may be better used elsewhere.

Creating upstream raingardens or detention areas in the watershed may provide incremental improvements for smaller storms, but the area needed to significantly mitigate a 25- or 100-year flood is not feasible. Nevertheless, the City of Madison is fully committed to increasing/improving raingardens and detention areas in the watershed.

The vast majority of water is coming down Midvale Boulevard. At this time, it appears the only practical option to deal with a large rainfall event would be a large pipe from the Midvale/University area to Lake Mendota. The pipe would require a large inlet or inlets covering about one acre of land to get the water into the pipe quickly. A pipe up to 146" could be bored under Blackhawk Golf Course to an outfall near the Marina.

Federal assistance would be necessary. To that end, the City of Madison is seeking to amend the University Avenue reconstruction project and divert the \$13M allocated for the Shorewood Blvd/Grand Ave connection to the large pipe project. The cost of the large pipe under Blackhawk could potentially be \$30-40M. If it qualifies for federal assistance, the local share would be \$4.5M split between the City and Village on an equitable basis of impervious/pervious acres in the watershed.

The next steps the Village will take with the City are to continue to determine the project scope and feasibility, including better cost estimates. Soil borings to determine the composition of the ground under Blackhawk will also need to be done. We will need to work with the Madison-area Planning Organization (MPO) to revise the University Avenue project to include these costs (and possibly others) in the federal share of the project. MPO controls these funds for major projects and there is no guarantee they will consider a change.

The situation is very fluid, changing rapidly. The Board may have more information available to consider at its special meeting on **Wednesday, June 12 (7:00 pm)**.

## SPOKES TO SCHOOL A WIN FOR VILLAGE-WIDE SHARED STREETS!

Congratulations to all who joined us the morning of Friday, May 10 to participate in Spokes to School. With the National Bike to School Day theme being safety, the Spokes to School team promoted safe helmet wearing and the rules of the road with handouts, announcements in Village and SHES publications, and a school assembly leading up to the event.

Highlights of the day, which featured sunshine and good cheer, included:

- at least 120 kids and roughly 40 adults practicing safe biking to school along nine scheduled routes;
- additional kids, families, Village and SHEs staff, and community members biking, scooting, and walking to school;
- bikers and scooters wearing helmets that were adjusted to fit properly;
- about 20 free bike tune-ups on-site thanks to Neff Cycle Service;
- almost 100 surveys completed by kids before the school day began;
- 5 prizes awarded to drawing winners; and
- hundreds of donut holes, bagels, pieces of fruit, and cups of juice and coffee consumed, all before the morning bell!



Reports from the neighborhood were that the event:

- motivated the youngest bikers to ditch training wheels and learn to ride;
- jump-started seasonal efforts to dust off bikes and helmets and get riding again;
- increased riders' confidence in their abilities to independently bike to school; and
- decreased the incidence of no-helmet riding (our goal is zero).

## COMMUNITY RESTORATIVE COURT PEACEMAKERS NEEDED

Community Restorative Court is a pre-charge diversion program working hard to provide an alternative, restorative-based approach to expedite certain municipal and misdemeanor cases in Dane County. This approach holds respondents (offenders) responsible by meeting with their victim in a “circle.” Victims are given an opportunity to be involved with the restorative justice process and voice their emotions, requests and concerns. Voluntary citizens, Peacemakers, also participate in the restorative justice circle process. Peacemakers represent our community and are a critical part of repairing the harm. The circle supports respondents and victims and creates a Repair Harm Agreement with the respondent which may include community service, restitution, counseling and a variety of services to assist the needs of respondents and victims. Respondents are not formally charged and do not receive a CCAP entry if they successfully complete the agreement. Studies have shown that a restorative justice approach can resolve cases more quickly, reduce recidivism and generate more satisfaction and feelings of fairness on the part of victims, respondents and, most importantly, the community at large.

Community involvement is essential. Peacemakers participate in 4 trainings over a 2 week span. Peacemakers learn about the Restorative Justice process and how they can contribute to their community and the young people we serve. This is also an opportunity to support the victims of crime to help repair harm. Once trained, Peacemakers participate in Circles that last 60-90 minutes. The Circle schedule is flexible and depends on your availability.

### CLICK IT OR TICKET

This year marks the 10-year anniversary of Wisconsin’s primary enforcement seat belt law. Since the law took effect in June of 2009, Wisconsin’s seat belt use rate has climbed from 74 percent in 2009, to just over 89 percent today. Over the last decade alone, numerous motorists in Wisconsin have avoided serious injury or death thanks to the simple click of a seat belt.

The Shorewood Hills Police Department will join law enforcement agencies across Wisconsin as part of the national [Click It or Ticket](#) mobilization May 20 to June 2.



## PREVENTING BICYCLE THEFT



With warmer weather right around the corner, more bikes will be in use in our community. We hope to provide information to assist in reducing bike theft, which is already on the rise. Having your bike stolen is unpleasant. While you can't make your bike completely safe, there are some steps you can take to minimize the risk.

**Step 1: Register your bicycle** with the Village of Shorewood Hills Police Department. Without a paper trail, the Police Department can't do much to help you recover your bicycle in the event of theft. SHPD provides FREE bike licenses. Stop in during normal business hours to obtain a free license. We will need your bicycle's serial number, which is usually engraved on the bottom of the bicycle. Sometimes the serial number can be found on other parts of the bicycle as well. If you are having trouble locating the serial number, stop by the Police Department and we will help you find it.

**Step 2: Take a few pictures** of your bike and keep them in a safe place in case you ever need to use them down the road. It is also a good idea to check your homeowners' or renters' insurance coverage to see if your bicycle is included. If so, make sure your insurer has the documentation they need to replace it in the event of theft.



**Step 3: Purchase a U-Lock** or heavy-duty chain lock. Cable locks are easily cut. A determined thief with the right set of tools and plenty of time can defeat any lock, but a good U-lock presents a substantial challenge.



**Step 4: Lock your bicycle properly.** Use your U-Lock to lock your frame and rear wheel (home to expensive parts like your gears and derailleur) to something secure like a bicycle rack, a parking meter, or a signpost. Avoid locking to:

- Fire hydrants – The Fire Department needs to access hydrants in a hurry!
- Trees – It can damage the tree and thieves can easily cut down a small tree to snag your bike. Bad for you, bad for our tree canopy.
- Bus stop signs – Your bike might get in the way of people trying to board the bus or read bus schedule.

For extra protection, you can use two U-Locks. One for your front wheel, and another for your rear wheel. But, don't forget to lock that frame as well! If you have quick release skewers, it may be worth considering putting locking skewers on your bicycle instead; especially if you regularly leave your bicycle outside for extended periods of time.

**Step 5: (Here's hoping you never have to deal with step 5)**

**If your bicycle still gets stolen,**

- **Immediately file a police report.** Call the Shorewood Hills Police Department and provide the date, location, and approximate time of the theft. Give the police officer a detailed description of the bike including serial number, make and model, general description of its aesthetic, and any small and noteworthy details that might distinguish your bike from someone else's (ex: parts, add-ons, flare, stickers).
- **Register it as stolen.** Having the serial number written down will enable the police officer to enter the bike as stolen within law enforcement databases.
- **Notify your network.** Send a picture and a description of your bike to your friends who can help be on the lookout. Send out an email, post an update on Facebook, and tweet it to @S\_H\_P\_D.

**If you or someone you know sees your bike on the street,** notify the police immediately. If the bike is locked up outside, lock it up with your own lock until the police arrive. For your safety, we do not recommend confronting the person riding your bike. Anecdotal evidence indicates it is entirely possible that the person riding your bike has purchased it from the person who stole your bike.



## “HOW TO” LANDSCAPE TO PREVENT WATER IN YOUR BASEMENT

Consider a summer landscaping project to improve the flow of rainwater away from your home. Increase the flow of rainwater away from your home will reduce the amount of water that leaks you’re your basement. 



Let us explain why this is so important to the Village of Shorewood Hills, its residents and small businesses. Walgreens has sued the Village repeatedly to successfully lower the assessed value of its store at University Avenue and Midvale Boulevard. Its argument is based on a questionable 2008 Wisconsin Supreme Court decision. While the Village vigorously defended its assessments as being fair and equitable, we settled each year for a lesser assessed value for that store because of that questionable court case. This has resulted in Walgreens paying much less in property taxes each year to the Village, Madison Public Schools, Dane County and Madison College. In turn, that meant all of us homeowners and small business owners pay more. Walgreens stores across Dane County and Wisconsin have followed this strategy. The same legal gymnastics are used by big box stores across the state to lower their property tax bill. It is all about fairness.


