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

RESIDENTS SOUGHT FOR NEW AD HOC VILLAGE RECOGNITION COMMITTEE

At its September meeting, the Village Board authorized the creation of an ad hoc Village Recognition Committee.

The Committee's mission will be two-fold: (1) to solicit nominations for and then to select Village residents and businesses that deserve recognition for past efforts to make the Shorewood Hills a better place, the recipients being recognized at the Annual Village Recognition Dinner; and (2) to maintain a Village Staff Recognition Program that recognizes Village staff for their years of service and also recognizes staff who provide exceptional service.

The Board directed that this new ad hoc Committee be authorized for a two-year trial period, after which the Board will decide whether to extend the term of the Committee or make it a regular standing Committee. The Committee will consist of the Village President who will serve as Chair, the Chair of the Village Personnel Committee, and five appointed members. The

OCTOBER - NOVEMBER 2019

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE SEPTEMBER 16, 2019 MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

(Complete detailed minutes will be available on our website or at the Village Hall)

Attendance – Mr. Friedman was excused.

Appearances and Communications – Eric Hjellen of Madison Metropolitan Sewerage District (MMSD) presented a plan to install a relief sanitary sewer interceptor pipe between Spring Harbor Park and Walnut Street. The existing pipes through this corridor are at capacity. The new interceptor pipe would relieve capacity constraints. Matt Flesch, Lead Designer with Strand Associates, is doing an alternatives analysis for MMSD to determine the best possible location to build the proposed 36” pipe. Construction will require 10-20’ deep trenches. They will be looking at the impact on people, businesses, streets, trees, etc. A Public Involvement Meeting is scheduled for Monday, October 21. Construction will possibly begin in 2021. MMSD is trying to coordinate their work with the University Avenue reconstruction project.

Consent Agenda – In an effort to expedite meetings, items on the consent agenda are considered as a group and are adopted with one motion. Any Board member may unilaterally remove an item from the consent agenda if he or she believes the item needs discussion. The consent agenda included approval of regular minutes for the [August 19, 2019](#) Board meeting; street use permit on October 6 for the Red Tutu Trot; and a Class B Beer/Class C Wine liquor license renewal for the First Unitarian Society.

Ordinance L-2019-2 – The Board took no action on [ordinance L-2019-2](#) related to parking and towing vehicles.

Ordinance L-2019-4 – The Board unanimously approved the third and final readings of [Ordinance L-2019-4](#) amending sections 15.01, 15.03, 15.04, 15.05 of the Village Code regarding adoption of the various Wisconsin building codes by reference.

Ordinance L-2019-5 – When the Zoning Code was revised several years ago, a section related to supplementary regulations (set backs) for accessory uses was inadvertently deleted. The Plan Commission reviewed what lead up to the mistake and recommended approval of the proposed ordinance to resolve it. The Commission further suggested the Board suspend its normal procedure and conduct three readings to approve the ordinance immediately to restore the Code as intended. Ms. Lotfi was concerned that the ordinance would be limiting the effective size of a property owner’s lot. The Board approved [ordinance L-2019-5](#) amending section 10-1-100 of the Zoning Code concerning supplementary regulations for accessory uses and structures.

Consider Finance Committee recommendation of Resolution R-2019-13 – Mr. Benforado introduced the resolution that would borrow money to refund the Village’s 2010 Build America Bonds (BABs) and fold in new money to fund the Marshall Court reconstruction bids and other capital projects. John Mehan of R.W. Baird explained the advantages of this borrowing. The estimated rate for the new bond issuance is 1.74% which would result in a present value savings of ~\$117K. The savings as a percentage of the debt being refunded is ~6.4% (the benchmark for this type of refunding is 2%). Resolution R-2019-13 would set parameters for an acceptable rate and savings amount. To expedite the issuance of the bonds, the resolution would give Baird the authority to execute the bond sale, with the approval of Village officials, if the parameters are met and rates don’t increase over the next few weeks. The parameters resolution is a similar process used to refund higher priced 2009 debt and new money in 2017. The Board unanimously approved [Resolution R-2019-13](#) Authorizing the issuance and establishing parameters for the sale of not to exceed \$2,625,000 General Obligation Promissory Notes.

ADOPT AN ASH PROGRAM

The Village is working hard to protect our public ash trees and we need your help! This summer we treated 70 public ash trees to prevent emerald ash borer (EAB) damage. This effort would not be possible without generous donations from residents and businesses who have “Adopted an Ash” in the community.

There are still many ash trees that have not been “Adopted”. Please contact the Village Forester (cgeorge@shorewood-hills.org | 608-267-2680) if you would like to help save a tree by contributing toward the treatments that will keep them alive!



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Consider Plan Commission recommendation and findings on conditional use permit for landscaping, retaining wall improvements on property located at 3444 Lake Mendota Drive – Mr. Benforado reviewed the conditional use permit and findings that would level the yard to make it more useable and move retaining walls to make the front yard parking area such that cars can fully pull off the road to park. The Board unanimously approved the conditional use permit for landscaping, retaining wall improvement on property at 3444 Lake Mendota Drive.

Consider Plan Commission recommendation and findings on conditional use permit for landscaping, retaining wall improvements on property located at 3650 Lake Mendota Drive – Mr. Benforado explained that a portion of the yard slid off the cliff due to the August 2018 storm and the proposed landscaping and retaining walls would stabilize the property. The Plan Commission recommended approval and no one spoke against the project. Natalie Doty from Edge Construction Engineers and John Gishnock from Formecology, LLC provided an overview of the project and a green retaining wall system that uses interlocked soil bags and soil nails. When completed, the retaining walls will look natural with no hardscape visible. The Board unanimously approved the conditional use permit for landscaping, retaining wall improvement on property located at 3650 Lake Mendota Drive.

Consider Public Works Committee recommendation to install speed humps on Edgehill Drive – Ms. Bailey introduced the Committee's concerns about traffic safety on Edgehill Drive. Many residents of Edgehill don't feel safe walking on the street. Public Works member Cara Coburn Faris provided additional information on the history and some recent incidents on Edgehill. A petition signed by numerous residents for the installation of speed humps was provided to the Board. The Public Works Committee asked the Village Engineer to develop a preliminary design for speed humps on Edgehill and he identified three spots for potential installation. Some Board members indicated support of the speed hump proposal. Others were reluctant to support speed humps because it could push traffic to other streets (i.e. Shorewood Boulevard) and a concern that there will be a desire to install speed humps on other streets in the Village. Some felt sidewalks on Edgehill Drive would be the solution but supported the Committee's holistic approach to traffic calming. Action on the matter was deferred until a future meeting to allow for further input.

Consider Services Committee recommendation to bid Four Corners restroom and pavilion construction project – The Services Committee recommended bidding the Four Corners restroom and pavilion construction in July. Four Corners Park neighbors were invited to a Services Committee meeting in August and all in attendance were supportive of the renovations and the Village paying for the construction costs only. Residents suggested fundraising for any non-construction costs (i.e. refrigerator for the Four Corners Program). Tracy Koziol, who has been leading the effort to renovate the Heiden Haus, said she supports any initiative to improve Village facilities. However, she asked the Board to consider the Heiden Haus when making this decision. She would not want to see two projects going head-to-head for fundraising dollars. The Board unanimously approved a motion to authorize the Village Engineer to create bid documents for the Four Corners restroom and pavilion project at an estimated cost of \$150,000 and take the project to bid for construction completion by June of 2020 with an alternate option to wait until after next summer's programming.

Appointments – Mr. Benforado made the following appoints that were unanimously approved by the Board: Colleen Albrecht to the Pool Committee and Greg Lampe to the Personnel Committee.

Village President's Report – Village Recognition Committee – The Board unanimously approved a motion to create an ad hoc committee to recognize residents/business for efforts to make the Village a better place and recognize staff for years of service/exceptional service. Mr. Benforado also reported on a meeting with Dane County Executive Joe Parisi regarding the effects of the August 2018 floods, communication to State Rep. Sheila Stubbs office regarding the Dark Store/Walgreen's property tax loophole, and an upcoming meeting with Madison Mayor Satya Rhodes-Conway.

Village Administrator's Report – Status of University Avenue reconstruction project – Mr. Frantz reported that the status is unknown until more can be determined about the stormwater tunnel project and available funding (*see ad hoc Stormwater Committee report below*).

Personnel Committee – Ms. Albrecht reported the Committee discussed staffing with the Police Chief and

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will have its annual meeting with staff soon.

Finance Committee – Mr. Lederer reported the refunding of the BABs and new debt was the main topic of its last meeting. The Committee also began work on the 2020 budget. The State’s levy limit constraints allow only a small increase in the tax levy. Initial projections show a small surplus in 2019. There is a projected deficit in 2020 but there are some possibilities to increase revenues outside the levy limits to balance the budget without using too much of the unassigned fund balance.

Ad hoc Stormwater Committee – Mr. Benforado reported that AE2S and Black & Veech will be presenting their stormwater tunnel feasibility study at its next meeting on September 17.

Ad hoc Heiden Haus Committee – Ms. Bailey reported the Committee hired Destree Architecture & Design to create design plan options for renovations to the Heiden Haus. Those options will be considered by the Committee at a public meeting on September 26.

Pool Committee – Mr. Lederer reported the Committee is beginning the process of hiring a new Pool Manager. They are developing a draft job description. He also mentioned that Shorewood Hills is due to host the All-City Swim Meet some time in the next few years. All-City is a large endeavor that will take a lot of volunteer and staff time.

Adjourn – The meeting adjourned at 10:43 pm.

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Committee will meet one or twice each Fall to review nominations and make selections. The following Awards may be considered by the Committee each year: Distinguished Service Award, Good Samaritan Award, Community Builder Award, Leading Light Award, Heavy Lifter Award, Teamwork Award, and other such awards on a case by case basis.

Village residents interested in being considered for appointment to this new Committee are encouraged to submit an expression of interest to Village Administrator Karl Frantz (kfrantz@shorewood-hills.org) by no later than Wednesday, October 16. It is expected that the Board will appoint the full Committee at its October 21 meeting.

TAX BILL ADDRESS UPDATES

The Village has started collecting information in order to mail property tax bills in December. Now is the time to make sure your mailing address is accurate. The best way to do this is by looking at last year’s tax bill. If the address is incorrect or you are not sure what mailing address is being used, contact the Village Hall at 267-2680 or by e-mail at info@shorewood-hills.org. Any address changes must be received by **November 15** before the tax bills are printed by Dane County.

Village policy is to send the tax bill to the property owner. Tax bills will not be sent to your financial institution.

FALL VOLLEYBALL IN SHOREWOOD HILLS

For the past 18 years, a group of law enforcement agencies have collaborated on an event called “Shop With a Cop”. In 2014, we joined together to form an incorporated, 501c3 non-profit organization, called “Shop With A Cop – Dane County, Inc.” Participating Police departments include; City of Madison, Dane County Sheriff’s Office, Village of Shorewood Hills, City of Middleton, University of Wisconsin, Town of Madison, Village of Oregon, City of Monona, Village of Waunakee, Village of Maple Bluff, City of Fitchburg, Village of DeForest, Village of Blue Mounds, Village of Cross Plains and Wisconsin State Capitol Police. This charitable event assists economically disadvantaged families within Dane County during the Holiday Season.

We work with school districts and other local human service agencies to identify children of families in need. We look for children that are working to full capacity in school and have no discipline issues. This event gives the children the opportunity to interact with law enforcement in a positive environment. It also allows law enforcement to give back to their communities, and it gives the children a sense of satisfaction to be able to provide gifts for their families.

On Sunday, December 8, 2019, approximately 90 children will be brought to Target in Madison, where they will be paired with a law enforcement officer. They will shop together for gifts for the child’s family. Each child will be provided with \$175 to spend. After shopping, the children are treated to a Little Caesars Pizza party at the VFW, and they will also spend time with their officer wrapping gifts.

In order to continue the success of this program, we need the ongoing support and monetary contributions from area businesses, along with personal donations. Our goal is to increase the number of families we can help, however we can only do so through generous public donations. LEAF-FREE STREETS BEFORE THE STORM CAN LEAD TO CLEANER WATERS

The green leaves that provide us much needed shade in the summer can contribute to the “greening” of our lakes and rivers as they collect in the streets each fall. Decaying leaves are a great natural fertilizer for gardens and lawns, but they also release unwanted nutrients into our local waters. When it rains, stormwater flows through leaf piles in streets creating a “leaf tea” that is rich in dissolved phosphorus. The phosphorus present in this “leaf tea” is not removed through traditional stormwater treatment practices and is carried through our storm sewers to Lake Mendota, as well as other lakes and rivers. Too much phosphorus can lead to toxic algae blooms, low oxygen levels and murky waters, none of which are good for animals living in the water or those of us who use it for recreation.

Shorewood Hills is actively involved in many efforts to improve the quality of stormwater runoff including weekly leaf collection. However, we don’t have the staff or equipment to remove leaves from streets prior to every rain event. We need your help. You can take these simple steps before the storms this fall to help keep Lake Mendota clean:

- Remove leaves from street within 5 feet of the curb and any storm drains in front of your property before it rains, then:
- Pile collected leaves neatly onto the terrace to keep them from falling back into the street.
- Covering the piles with a tarp is a good idea to prevent them from blowing around. The Village Crew can usually pick up leaves in the entire Village each week

OR

- Mulch leaves directly on the lawn. If your lawn mower has a bagger, empty the chopped up leaves on gardens, flowerbeds or around trees and shrubs

OR

- Compost the mix of leaves with other compostable items and spread it on gardens next spring. It saves money and water, helps your gardens, and benefits the environment. If you don’t have the room in your yard, take your leaves to the [Dane County Compost Site](#).

FALL LEAF PICKUP

The Village Crew has started seasonal leaf collection. Because of the large number of trees in Shorewood Hills, leaf collection is a monumental task. The Crew uses a leaf picking machine to suck up leaves into a box truck for disposal. To assist them in their task:

- Please **DO NOT** bag leaves. Rake them to the edge of the curb (not into the street).
- Leaf piles should be three feet from trees, poles, signs and mailboxes so that the vacuuming arm is not obstructed.
- Please make sure that you keep all rocks, construction debris, soil and branches out of your leaf piles. Rocks, nails, dirt, etc. wreak havoc on the leaf picker causing expensive repairs and endanger the operators.
- When picking up leaves, the Crew makes an entire circuit around the Village, from one end to the other, usually once a week. Special pickups are not possible.
- If the Crew picks up your neighbors’ leaves but not yours, the reason may be as simple as...the box truck was full, a car was blocking the leaf pile, or time ran out in the day. They will get back to your leaf pile as soon as possible.
- The Crew will pick up leaves until they are covered with snow or frozen to the ground.

BRUSH COLLECTION

The Village Crew will chip branches and brush throughout the fall, summer and spring if residents haul the material to the curbside. The Village's "Chipper" can take branches up to 12 inches in diameter. For ease of pickup, residents should arrange the brush at the curb such that the ends of the branches are all oriented in the same direction. Longer branches are easier for the Crew to feed into the chipper, so there is no need to cut branches down to any specific length.

Brush piles should be three feet from obstructions like trees, poles, signs and mailboxes. Village residents doing their own work are allowed to pile brush (and trimmed greens) at the curb. If you hire a contractor, like Green Acres, Madison Tree Service, etc., to do your yard work, the contractor is responsible for hauling away the material.

LEAF RAKING, DOG WALKING, SNOW PLOWING ENTREPRENEURS

Fall has arrived and winter won't be far behind. Do you need help with leaf raking, snow shoveling or other tasks? The Village Hall keeps a list of Shorewood Hills kids interested in being hired to do odd jobs. Residents looking for help may contact the Village Hall to get a list of these young community entrepreneurs.

Kids, Karla will need your full name; phone number; if you are interested in shoveling snow, raking leaves, yard work in general, pet sitting, dog walking, etc. Please indicate if you will work anywhere in the Village or just in your own neighborhood (include your address if only working in your neighborhood).

RECYCLING TIPS – WINE BOTTLE PREPARATION

Recyclers like Pellitteri are finding that the aluminum sleeve around the neck of a wine bottle is trapping good recyclable glass in side of them as they go through the recycling process. WATER UTILITY INFORMATION

Are you tired of writing a check each month for your utility bill? If so, you should consider ACH or "AUTO PAY" through the Village. It is a FREE service where the monthly bill is directly debited from your checking account on the 20th of each month. Late fees will be a thing of the past if you sign up for the Village's ACH system. Go to: www.shorewood-hills.org/water to download the ACH form.



You will still receive a bill in the mail but it will be marked "AUTO PAY – DO NOT PAY". If you are environmentally conscious, paperless billing (eBills) is also an option. 1) Go to the website of our third-party payment processor's (PSN): <https://www.paymentservicenetwork.com/>. 2) Register your account (you will need you utility account number from your bill to register). 3) Sign up for paperless bills. Note: Don't sign up for automatic payments with PSN, your will be charged \$1 per month, the Village's Auto Pay is FREE.
