## COVID-19 UPDATE

The Village continues to be cautious with respect to a complete reopening of the Village Hall. We have found business can be successfully transacted remotely by phone, email, drop box and Zoom sessions. If it is essential to meet face to face (i.e. fingerprinting, notarizing services, voting, etc.), an appointment can be made where things can be prepared and everyone observes the proper physical distancing and face covering guidelines.

Dane County has moved to Phase 2 of the [Forward Dane](#) plan, but the COVID-19 virus has not changed, or magically gone away. It's just as dangerous as it was all along. People should continue to stay physically distant from others, wear face coverings in public, continue everyday preventative measures like washing hands often, and stay home and get tested if feeling sick.

Public Health Madison & Dane County recently reported a steep increase in COVID-19 cases over past few days. They urge County residents and businesses to take precautions to prevent the spread of the virus. In the past five days, 279 people in Dane County have tested positive for COVID-19, which brings our 7-day case average to 47 cases per day. The 7-day average in mid-June was just 17 cases per day. Increased testing does not fully account for this upward trend in cases. Janel Heinrich, Director of Public Health Madison & Dane County said "We can't speculate about the increase in cases, and it's probably not due to just one thing, but in our contact tracing interviews it is evident that people are socializing more ... The orders put in place are one part of a strategy, and we also need everyone to do their part to help prevent the spread of disease ... Given this steep upward trend in cases from the past several days, it is very unlikely we will meet the criteria outlined in the Forward Dane plan for moving to Phase 3 anytime soon." The median age of people who test positive for COVID-19 in Dane County has gone down every week since mid-May. 60% of the positive tests are in the 10-39 age group. COVID-19 can affect everyone and be severe, even in young people (the young can also spread the virus to vulnerable populations). Regardless of age, we all need to take steps to prevent the spread.

**HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE JUNE 15, 2020 MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES**

*(Complete detailed minutes will be available on our website or at the Village Hall)*

**Attendance** – All trustees were in attendance for the virtual meeting. Ms. Lotfi was excused from the meeting at 7:39 pm.

**Response of the Village of Shorewood Hills to the murder of George Floyd and the inherent problem of systemic racism** – Mr. Benforado read a statement into the record and requested that the Public Health & Safety (PHS) Committee undertake a review of the Police Department policies. Mr. Friedman, chair of PHS, indicated he is fully supportive of the review and public input into the process. The Board unanimously approved the referral to PHS.

**Consider recommendation to form a new ad hoc committee on Social Justice** – Ms. Valderrama proposed creation of an ad hoc Social Justice Committee to promote diversity, inclusion, equity and justice for all members of our community (*see flyer on page 5*).

**Consent Agenda** – In an effort to expedite meetings, items on the consent agenda are considered as a group and are adopted with one motion. Any Board member may unilaterally remove an item from the consent agenda if he or she believes the item needs discussion. Consent agenda items approved unanimously included:

- Approval of hire of Police Lieutenant at Grade 16 step 6.
- Approve liquor license renewals for the 2020-2021 licensing period: Pick N Save, Steve's Wine Beer Spirits, LaBrioche True Food, Blackhawk Country Club, Ancora Coffee, Sa Bai Thong Restaurant, and Lodgic Everyday Community.
- Approve tobacco license renewals for the 2020-2021 licensing period: Pick N Save, Walgreens, Steve's Wine Beer Spirits, Blackhawk Country Club.
- Approve seasonal Tennis program hires.

**Board meeting minutes of May 18** – Mr. Benforado asked for the minutes to be removed from the consent agenda. He suggested a few minor corrections including the spelling of the name of one of the guest speakers. The Board unanimously approved the May 18 meeting minutes with these corrections.

**Liquor License Renewal for vom Fass delecTable** – Mr. Benforado asked that the liquor license for vom Fass-delecTable be removed from the consent agenda. He wanted to highlight the business owner's request for temporary expansion of the premise description to include an outdoor seating area in front of 3254 University Avenue (the former Pancharo's occupancy) to allow for more outdoor seating capacity during the COVID-19 pandemic. The property management is in support of this use on a temporary basis. The Board discussed the flexibility the Village has under the Emergency Order to assist Village businesses in this way and unanimously approved the liquor license for vom Fass-delecTable.

**Ordinance L-2020-4** – The Board unanimously approved the first reading of [Ordinance L-2020-4](#) amending Article J Supplemental Regulations – Accessory Uses and Structures (*see article on page 5*).

**Consider recommendation of Public Works Committee for temporary closure of portions of streets to local and emergency vehicular traffic only to provide pedestrian, biking enhancements** – Ms. Bailey reported on the Public Works Committee's idea to close some Village streets or make them one-way to provide additional access for pedestrians and bikes during the COVID-19 pandemic. The Committee worked with the Village Engineer to identify possible streets that could be used for this purpose. Her subsequent meeting with Village staff identified some issues, such as a need to purchase additional signage; maintenance of the closures could be onerous on the Public Works Crew, and a concern about unsafe ped/bike vs. vehicle interactions resulting from new closures. The Board discussed some options related to cones, signage, road paint, Sunday-only closures, and a test case on one street then expanding. In the end, the Board directed the Public Works Committee to pursue the idea further and work with staff on logistical issues.

**Consider recommendation by the Services Committee to renovate the bus shelters** – Ms. Lotfi reported on the Services Committee's recommendation to replace the aging bus shelters. The Committee, over a couple of meetings, reviewed a design plan created by a Village resident. The EMS & Fire Association will assist in the construction as a community project. The Board unanimously approved replacing the bus shelters with an estimated budget of \$6,000 (plus 5% contingency) using the recommended design with benches installed upon completion.

**Village President's Report** – Mr. Benforado highlighted the fact that the Village received a \$5,218 dividend check from its property insurance carrier LWMMI (League of Wisconsin Municipalities Mutual Insurance company). He also reviewed the EMS & Fire Association's plans for a "Do-It-Yourself (DIY) 4th of July" celebration and recommended everyone support the effort and spread the word to fellow Village residents.

**Village Administrator's Report** – Mr. Frantz reviewed the plan to slowly reopen the Village Hall now that Dane County has moved to Phase 2 of the [Forward Dane](#) plan. Preparations for physical distancing and plastic barriers are ongoing. Staff have learned a lot about alternative ways of doing business and do not see an urgent need to reopen fully right away. The Board also discussed concerns about large groups of young people congregating at the McKenna Park beach and the marina without observing adequate physical distancing. These parks are open to the public. More signage will be installed to discourage this type of behavior. Mr. Frantz mentioned that Lodgic plans to have a soft opening the week of June 22. The pandemic has required them to modify their operational plan. The daycare will be open weekdays from 9-5 without the drop-in feature. The restaurant will open and abide by the [Forward Dane](#) rules for seating and take out. They are encouraging patrons to reserve blocks of time in the co-working space so that they can plan their staffing needs. Village Clerk Endres explained the preparations taking place for the August and November elections. Staff are encouraging people to vote by mail, request an absentee ballot be mailed to them using the online [MyVote](#) system. The Wisconsin Elections Commission has made improvements to MyVote and the WisVote system used by Municipal Clerks to process absentee ballots. Ms. Endres plans to work with the apartment managers to notify new tenants of their voting options in Shorewood Hills.

**Police Chief's Report** – Mr. Chapin shared with the Board his response to a resident's questions about the Shorewood Hills Police Department's training and procedures.

**Plan Commission** – Mr. Benforado reported the Commission began a review of the Village Code related to beekeeping. The Commission may also reconsider the building height section of the Zoning Code as it relates to a shed roof.

**Public Works Committee** – Ms. Bailey reported the Committee asked staff to develop an RFP for a consultant to assist with the Complete Streets Plan. The Village is still working with MMSD regarding the interceptor relief sewer project (2021-2023). The rustic bridge replacement has its first public meeting planned for September/October to gauge residents' opinions on the project. Mr. Frantz added that staff are concerned about the amount of material being dumped into the Village dumpsters at the Pool and DPW Building. The problem may be exacerbated by the fact the Village did not have a Spring Cleanup event in May.

**Recreation Committee** – Ms. Bailey reported the Committee continues to evaluate possible dog park locations.

**Ad hoc Stormwater Committee** – Mr. Benforado reported the Committee is waiting for stormwater specifications related to the University Avenue Reconstruction Project.

**Parks Committee** – Ms. Valderrama reported that June 27 is the 65th anniversary of the formation of the Parks Committee and some sort of special recognition is being planned. It has been a bad year for garlic mustard spread. This is possibly attributed to new residents moving into the Village and not being aware of the problem or the ordinance requiring removal of garlic mustard and other noxious weeds.

**Pool Committee** – The Board had a discussion about the decision to not open the Pool this summer. Some residents have expressed to Trustees their disappointment because other private pools in the area are opening. The Board discussed whether to take the matter up at a subsequent meeting and discussed the procedural rules related to reconsideration of the matter (*see article on page 6*).

**Joint Campus Committee** – Mr. Imes reported the Committee recommended inclusion of a bike/pedestrian bridge over University Bay Drive be included in the University Avenue Reconstruction Project.

**Next Meeting:** The Board will meet virtually as scheduled July 20, 2020.

**Adjourn** – The meeting adjourned at 11:00 pm.

## MedFlight Temporary Helipad in UW Lot 131

UW Health's MedFlight program must make some physical improvements to its landing pad this July. We must temporarily relocate a landing space and provide patient transportation from that space to the hospital. The University of Wisconsin-Madison is allowing MedFlight to use Lot 131 for the temporary space (see attached below). Lot 131 is near where University Bay Drive, Oxford Road and Haight Road come together. Ambulances will transport patients on University Bay Drive to the hospital. They may run with lights, no siren, if they need to do so to safely make the left turn into the Emergency Department. We expect this temporary situation to begin July 6 and last two to three weeks. The timeline depends on weather affecting our ability to get the work done.


We work hard to minimize the disruption to Village residents by our medical helicopter. We appreciate that you understand its flights are saving lives and value the work we do for some of the most-injured and sick people in our region. At the same time, we recognize that it's loud, it's summer, and this temporary plan will disturb you more than our normal operations. For this, we ask your generosity and understanding. We will complete the work as quickly as possible and avoid any unnecessary noise or traffic. We estimate about five flights/day. That's an average: one day may see more flights (9-10/day), and bad weather may ground us, so no flights. Of course, the numbers are unpredictable but that is our best estimate based on current activity.

Some details about the temporary space at Lot 131:

- Temporary fence around landing site to be erected June 29
- Small white LED lights installed on fence to guide the helicopter June 30
- Large H painted on the parking lot June 30
- MedFlight test flight July 1 at about 10:00 am
- Six small red puck lights on the parking lot to guide the helicopter July 6
- Lot 131 in use July 6

Thank you again for your understanding of this temporary relocation. The flight deck has wear and tear that makes it unsafe to land and takeoff, and it must be repaired. We look forward to getting this work done as quickly as possible and returning to normal operations.

### ZONING AMENDMENT: ACCESSORY USES AND STRUCTURES

On June 15, the Village Board unanimously approved the first of three readings of [Ordinance L-2020-4](#) amending Article J of the Zoning Code related to Accessory Uses and Structures. The ordinance is available online with changes noted in red and by strikeouts. The impetus for the revisions emanates from when the Village amending the zoning code to eliminate the conditional use permit (C.U.P.) process for properties on Lake Mendota. That process and the ability to deny permits was severely diminished by the State legislature in an effort to take away local control from municipalities. It also opened up the distinct possibility of expensive litigation. When the prior zoning code change made the lake setback line a hard and fast rule. It eliminated the ability to put any kind of structure beyond the lake setback without a variance.

Obtaining a variance is a very difficult hurdle, and there are some sorts of structures and uses that should be considered acceptable beyond that line. The ordinance added additional items that were not included when the code was drafted and provides clarifications to Code interpretations that could have been questioned.

The Plan Commission held the required public hearing at which time there were no comments and has spent the last several months working on the revisions. Following the regular ordinance approval process, it will not become effective until after the Board meeting in August, providing for more opportunities for resident input.

## MORE DETAILS ON THE BOARD'S DECISION TO NOT OPEN THE POOL THIS SUMMER

On May 28, the Village Board voted to keep the Village Pool closed for the summer due to the COVID-19 pandemic. At that Board meeting, the Trustees considered a model pool opening policy that had been developed by the Pool Committee—an operating framework that the Committee had fleshed out in enough detail to allow the Board to make an informed decision about its viability. The Pool Committee asked the Board to consider the model and decide whether it should proceed with the work of refining the protocols—the Committee did not want to move any further along unless the Village was inclined to open the Pool.

While it was understood that many Pool members, and the Trustees, would have liked for the Pool to open in some fashion this summer, ultimately the safety of our community and staff led to the decision to keep the Pool closed. Among other significant concerns was the fact that, in order to properly train the lifeguards to the standards the Pool management has established, they would have to break the social distancing protocol of staying six feet apart from others and, in fact, be cheek to cheek during many training exercises. This would also be true in the event of an emergency at the Pool, which could require physical contact to perform life-saving procedures. The coronavirus continues to be a reality, and recent local and national surges do to increased community contact amplified this opinion.

At the time of writing this Bulletin article, the Wisconsin Department of Health Services recommends that all public pools, splash pads, and water parks remain closed due to the spread of COVID-19. At least 60 other Wisconsin municipalities have also decided to keep their pools closed. We understand and empathize with the frustration the Shorewood Hills Pool's closing has had on the community. It was not an easy decision, but one that was necessary in our effort to help stop the spread of this contagious and deadly virus and properly protect our staff and Pool members.

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
## CANOE / KAYAK SHARE PROGRAM

The Village is happy to announce that the Canoe/Kayak Share Program will begin operation soon in accordance with Phase 2 of Dane County's [Forward Dane](#) plan. The program allows participants to access the canoes and kayaks housed at the Village Marina and McKenna Park Boathouse for use on Lake Mendota. There are a few modifications to the usual procedures due to the COVID-19 pandemic:

- Physical distancing protocols require that the canoes and double kayak only be used by members of the same family group.
- Reservations to use boats must be made by phone (608-267-2680) or email ([office@shorewood-hills.org](mailto:office@shorewood-hills.org)).
- Users must schedule an appropriate time to obtain a key to access the boats from the Village Hall (the Village Hall is currently closed to the public except by appointment).
- When on site at the Marina or McKenna Park, participants should obey physical distancing rules and maintain 6-foot separation from people not in your family unit.
- Participants are requested to bring sanitizing liquid/wipes with them to clean touch-points on boats, paddles and life vests before and after use.
- Keys are to be returned immediately after use by stuffing them in the secure Green Drop Box in the Village Hall parking lot.

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## YARD WORK TIPS

During the COVID-19 pandemic, many residents have had time to focus on their yard. The Public Works Crew has been busy delivering wood chips and picking up leaves, brush and greens. Below are some reminders on how to make the collection process easier on our Public Works Crew.

**Grass Clippings:** The Village Crew does NOT collect grass clippings. Residents are encouraged to compost grass clippings at home or leave them on your lawn as green fertilizer. Alternatively, residents may transport the clippings themselves to the grass clippings pile in Dudley Davis Park (more commonly known as the “rock quarry”). There are designated spots in the quarry for grass clippings, green vegetation and wood chips. If you transport material in a bag, you should empty the bag on the appropriate pile and reuse or dispose of the bag at home. The dumping of anything else in the quarry is PROHIBITED. Brush from tree trimming or removed invasive species like buckthorn should not be dumped in the quarry. Village residents doing their own work are allowed to pile grass clippings / greens in the quarry and leave brush on the curbside for chipping. If you hire a contractor to do your yard work, then the contractor is responsible for hauling the material out of the Village.

**Weeds / Green Vegetation Collection:** The Village Crew will collect pulled weeds and green vegetation put at the curb by residents. The Crew usually makes a pass through the Village once a week. Dirt and root balls must be removed from all pulled weeds and green vegetation or it will not be collected by the Crew. Alternatively, residents may transport the clippings themselves to the grass clippings pile in Dudley Davis Park (more commonly known as the “rock quarry”). There are designated spots in the quarry for grass clippings, green vegetation and wood chips. If you transport material to the Quarry using a bag, the bag should be emptied onto the grass clippings pile. The empty bag should be taken home for reuse or disposal in your trash cart. The dumping of anything else in the quarry is PROHIBITED.

**Brush Collection:** The Village Crew will chip branches and brush throughout the spring, summer and fall if residents haul the material to the curbside. The Village’s “Chipper” can take branches up to 12 inches in diameter. For ease of pickup, residents should arrange the brush at the curb such that the ends of the branches are all oriented in the same direction. Longer branches are easier for the Crew to feed into the chipper, so there is no need to cut branches down to any specific length. Brush piles should not be mixed with any other materials (i.e. leaves or greens) and should be three feet from obstructions like trees, poles, signs and mailboxes. Village residents doing their own work are allowed to pile brush at the curb. If you hire a contractor to do your yard work, the contractor is responsible for hauling away the material.

## VILLAGE TRASH / RECYCLING TIPS FOR RESIDENTS

### Pool / DPW Dumpsters and Spring Fall Cleanup Event

Dumpsters located at the DPW building and at the Pool are not for public or resident use at any time or any under any circumstances. They are for use by the Village crew only and are now locked. If you have extra garbage, large items or recycling, you have other options (see below). If you regularly have more material than will fit in your cart(s), you can swap out smaller bins for larger ones ([use the online form](#)) or purchase an additional bin from Pellitteri (608-257-4285). You may contact Pellitteri (see below) or another hauler for large item pick up.

The Village's Spring Cleanup event was postponed due to COVID-19. We are hoping to conduct the community-wide cleanup event (30-yard dumpsters at the DPW Building open for residents to dispose of junky items) this fall. So, another option would be to hold on to some items until the dumpster event. We appreciate your cooperation.

### What to do if you have more trash and/or recycling than what fits in the cart?

**Trash:** If it is a small amount of extra trash, you may want to consider waiting until the following week to have it picked up in your cart. If you have extra bags of trash, Pellitteri will pick it up for a pre-paid nominal fee (\$4.80 per bag, 32-gallons or less and no more than 50lbs). Please contact Pellitteri (608-257-4285) to make arrangements at least one business day before your pickup day.

**Recycling:** Extra recycling will be picked up for free as long as it is placed in a clear, plastic bag (32-gallons or less and no more than 50lbs) and set next to your recycling cart on your recycling week. Extra cardboard must be flattened and placed in clear plastics bags as well. Do not tie or bundle cardboard. If you consistently have additional recycling, you could consider a larger or additional recycling cart.

By preventing crashes and injuries, you can spare family and friends tremendous grief, while also supporting our valued health care professionals and emergency responders. ## Lodgic on Marshall Court Opens

The Village of Shorewood Hills through the utilization of planned unit development zoning provided the mechanism for a new nonprofit entity to open in our Village—Lodgic Everyday Community. You may have noticed the building going up on Marshall Court across from the Ronald McDonald House. Lodgic is a blend of coworking, flexible extended-hour childcare, full beverage service restaurant including take out, a coffee bar and cafe, meeting and event experiences all under one roof.

100% of the proceeds from Lodgic Everyday Community go to support the aspirations of children, working families, small businesses, and communities. Lodgic helps kids and communities through Mooseheart Child City & School, the Tommy Moose First Responder program, Community Artists' support programs, and Lodgic Everyday Access Grants.

The project through its lease partner also provided \$5,000,000 in tax base and tax increment financing to expand and rebuild public infrastructure in that area including the completion of the last link of the heavily used commuter bike path. The project itself did not request or receive any public financing support, allowing the Village to capture all of the tax increment for public projects.

Lodgic is interested in expanding their hours to include Sunday brunch and dinner service and the Plan Commission will be considering that at its next meeting after neighborhood notification and input.

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## GALLERY 800 UBD

Located at 800 University Bay Drive, it is a cultural resource in the Village. The Gallery is open Monday-Friday, 9:00 am to 5:30 pm or by appointment. Exhibits feature local artists who work in 2-dimensional art. The location is an easy walk within the Village or parking is available on Marshall Court.

Dr. Majid Sarmadi's photography exhibit "A Scientist's Eye for Beauty in Patterns, Textures, and Colors" remains in *Gallery 800 UBD* until September 25, 2020. His photographs explore the tiny world that overlaps science and art. A directory in the Gallery lists the interpretive images, but the secret to the images are listed on the back of the directory. Visitors are brought to celebrate the beauty of these objects that you would otherwise consider undesirable. This is a suitable exhibit for parents who are looking for an enriching activity for their children or for the whole family.
