VILLAGE DROP BOX LOCKED / ABSENTEE VOTING

The Fall Primary Election is coming up in August and absentee ballots were recently mailed to those that have already requested them. The court ruling prohibiting the use of unmonitored drop boxes is still in place for this election. So, the drop box in the Village Hall parking lot will be locked again until the Primary Election is held on August 9th. Unfortunately, this means that utility payments, permit applications, etc. cannot be put in the drop box either for the next several weeks.

The court ruling requires that absentee ballots must be returned by mailed or hand-delivered to the Village staff (by the voter, not a spouse, friend or other relative) during our regular business hours (Monday-Thursday, 8:00 am to 4:00 pm or Friday, 8:00 am to 12:00 pm).

Return Absentee Ballot Options:

- Mail your ballot in the provided certificate envelope (postage paid).
- Hand your ballot to staff at Village Hall during regular business hours (M-Th, 8-4 or F, 8-12). If you have mobility challenges you may also call Village Hall at 608-267-2680 and we will come out to your car to collect your ballot.
- In-person absentee voting is available during regular business hours the two weeks before an election starting Tuesday, July 26.

We appreciate your understanding as we work to implement this new system.

REFERENDUM

In the previous [June Bulletin](#), we shared the status of the Village Board's consideration of a potential referendum to exceed the levy limit on the November ballot. This referendum would be an on-going permanent increase to the allowable levy as determined by the State. The Village held a public information meeting (PIM) on June 16 to provide information to the public and solicit feedback/questions regarding the potential referendum.

Currently, the Village Board is considering a \$350,000 increase to the levy to cover an operating deficit the Village has had for numerous years (that it has been creatively able to cover but is no longer able to do so), needed compensation adjustments, new staffing authorized earlier this year, a possible additional police officer, and small capital improvements fund (primarily for information technology needs).

The Village has created a page on the Village website (www.shorewood-hills.org/referendum) with information to date, including the PowerPoint presentation from the June 16 meeting. Additionally, the Village will be holding a second PIM on August 11 at 6:30 pm at Village Hall to provide updated information on the potential referendum, including the results of the in-progress compensation study. We encourage anyone interested in the potential referendum to attend the meeting or watch it on the Village's Facebook page ([@VillageOfShorewoodHills](#)), as it will be broadcast live. SURVEY FOR VILLAGE HOURS OF OPERATION

The Village Administrator is soliciting feedback from the community on the Village's Hours of Operation pilot program, which the Board approved last year. As part of the discussion on determining whether to make this pilot program permanent, the Personnel Committee has asked the Administrator to conduct a survey and to present those survey results to the Committee before it considers a recommendation to the Board. ROAD CLOSURES AND PARKING RESTRICTIONS FOR THE JULY 4TH CELEBRATION

Shorewood Boulevard in front of the old Fire Station will be closed to traffic on Saturday, July 2 from ~8:00 pm until the Independence Day Dance is over at ~11:30 pm.

Shorewood Boulevard in front of the old Fire Station will be closed to traffic on Monday, July 4 for most of the afternoon for the parade, fire truck rides and to protect pedestrians crossing from the Heiden Haus field to the old Fire Station.

The Shorewood Hills Police Department will post No Parking signs for July 4 on one side of most streets in the area of Blackhawk Country Club to ease congestion on the streets as the throngs of people exit the fireworks in the dark.

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE JUNE 20, 2022 MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

(Complete detailed minutes will be available on our website or at the Village Hall)

Attendance – Trustees Dave Benforado, John Imes, Cokie Albrecht, Shabnam Lotfi, Mark Lederer, Dietmar Bassuner and Carol Barford were in attendance.

Appearances and Communications – Village Green Team Update – New Chair Nate Miller introduced himself and thanked the previous Green Team chair Anne Readel for all of her work with the Sustainability Committee. Mr. Miller reviewed the various Earth Day activities including the swap event, tour of the Dane County landfill and renewable gas facility, the ice cream social which included demonstration of a curbside composter and No Mow May information. He hopes to expand the activities in the future.

Consent Agenda – In an effort to expedite meetings, items on the consent agenda are considered as a group and are adopted with one motion. Any Board member may unilaterally remove an item from the consent agenda if he or she believes the item needs discussion. Item on the consent agenda included the approval of Board minutes from the May 16, 2022 meeting; Madison Bus Rapid Transit Agreement Amendment; Deputy Clerk-Treasurer position description; designation of temporary parking on Marshall Court for Psych Services; waiving the first, second, and third readings of an approving Ordinance L-2022-5 related to mobile food vendors permits; waiving the first, second, and third readings of an approving Ordinance L-2022-6 for Karl Frantz Park and Sam Roth Park; annual Class A & B Beer & Liquor, Class C Wine, and Tobacco Licenses; temporary Class B Beer & Wine (Shorewood Hills EMS & Fire Association); Block Party permits; Special Event Street Use permits; and Resolution R-2022-6 updating the Village fee schedule.

Authorization of the 2022 Note Refund wire transfer for \$6,265,781.25 – Mr. Lederer asked that this item be removed from the Consent Agenda and asked staff to review the details related to this large wire transfer. Ms. Eveland explained the Village has received proper documentation from our bond counsel confirming the amount to be refunded and the wire transfer instructions. The Board unanimously authorized the wire transfer of \$6,265,781.25 to refund the 2022 Note Anticipation Notes.

Approval of Easement on 1008 Shorewood Blvd and lands located on Edgehill Dr to AT&T – Ms. Albrecht asked that this item be removed from the Consent Agenda to ask if agreement will restrict the Village's ability to remodel the Public Works building in the future. Ms. Eveland indicated it will likely not be an issue in the future and that given the potential problems with the alternative proposal; this agreement is in the best interest of the Village and AT&T. The Board unanimously approved the easement to AT&T on 1008 Shorewood Blvd and lands located on Edgehill Drive.

Authorization to expend funds for the tennis court crack filling in an amount not to exceed \$2,500 – The Board unanimously authorized the expenditure of up to \$2,500 for crack filling to come from the Tennis program's assigned fund balance in the General Fund.

Authorization to expend funds for stormwater and rain garden repairs at 800 University Bay Dr – The Board unanimously authorized the expenditure of up to \$25,000 for stormwater and rain garden repairs at 800 UBD with half of the funds to come from TID 3 and the remaining half to come from a donation from the property owner Paul Lenhart.

2021 Audit Report Presentation by Leah Wipperfurth from Baker Tilly – Ms. Wipperfurth reviewed the financial statement and Baker Tilly is able to provide an unammodified or clean opinion again this year. Internal control deficiencies tended to be the same as previous years and due to the Village's small staff. A new deficiency was related to the monthly utility billing reconciliation that was due to the staff transitions. There will be new accounting standards the Village will need to address in the future. The 2021 income statement resulted in ~\$31K surplus. Expenses and revenues were both about \$100K less than budgeted. The unassigned fund balance in relation to this year's budget is within the Village's self-imposed limit of 15-25%. The Village's debt is at just 37% of the statutory debt limit. Much of that debt is related to the TIF districts. The Water Utility had a better rate of return than last year and it is in the range of the prescribed rate of return authorized in the last water rate case with the Public Service Commission. The Sewer and

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Stormwater utilities revenues are stable. Expenses continue to increase year over year but both utilities have a positive return. The Board unanimously voted to accept the 2021 audit report and management letter from Baker Tilly.

Resolution R-2022-5 Acknowledging Scott Friedman's service as Village Trustee – The Board unanimously approved resolution R-2022-5 acknowledging Scott Friedman's service as Village Trustee.

Authorization of funds for camera system for the Boathouse at McKenna Park – Ms. Barford reported on the Public Health & Safety Committee (PHS) deliberations on the cameras and a recommendation to the Board to install the cameras on a 5-1 vote. There was concern about surveillance and an overall camera use policy but the safety/liability issues trumped the concerns. Lt. Jaime Weitzel provided the Board a report on recent activity at McKenna Park which is indicative of the ongoing problems. The revised quote that includes video storage is ~\$13K (a \$7K grant is available to reduce the cost). Trustees wanted more information on how the cameras will work and the policy regarding their use. They questioned the effectiveness of cameras deterring dangerous behavior but were reminded the intent of the cameras is that they area another tool for the police department to use when responding to McKenna Park for the officer's safety, in addition to potentially impacting behavior. All of our neighboring communities have cameras in their municipal parks. The Board decided to table the motion to buy cameras until a use policy was reviewed and recommended by PHS on a vote of 5-2 (Ms. Barford and Mr. Bassuner voting no).

Possible action regarding McKenna Boathouse repairs – Additional Funding – Staff have received estimates for the critical repairs needed at the Boathouse, including the roof, columns supporting the roof, the railing on the deck, interior painting and improved lighting. The estimates are significantly more than talked about last month. Trustees were concerned about the cost and availability of funds in relation to other future capital projects. The Board unanimously authorize up to \$180K for repairs at the McKenna Boathouse.

Appointments – Mr. Benforado appointed Mary Janet Wellensiek as the Garden Club Liaison to the Parks Committee (an Ex Officio/non-voting member) formalizing the role she has served for several years. He also appointed Karen Rebholz to fill a vacant resident member position on the Pool Committee and Gloria Beach to fill the position on the Finance Committee formerly held by Carl Gulbrandsen. The Board unanimously approved these appointments.

Village President's Report – Mr. Benforado reminded the Trustees that they are welcome ride in the 1929 Mack Fire Truck during the July 4th Parade (promptly at 12:30 pm). The Trustee Cookout is on and he will communicate details to Trustees before the event.

Village Administrator's Report – Heiden Haus Update – Construction is almost complete and we are trying to schedule a Grand Opening / Donor Recognition event. **Potential Referendum PIM Follow-up** – Ms. Eveland summarized the first public information meeting related to the potential referendum to exceed the State's levy limit. Questions from residents were related to how the tax levy works in relation to property taxes and the need for an additional police officer which is proposed in the levy increase. Resident Marilyn Townsend asked to speak as she is concerned about the proposal to increase the number of full-time police officers. The Board discussed the date of the next public information meeting and decided to tentatively schedule it for Thursday, August 11 after the Village compensation study is presented to the Board in July and preliminary assessed values are available from the Department of Revenue. **MMSD Update** – The bike path will be paved soon and reopened. Other restoration will be done over the next several weeks.

Parks Committee – Ms. Barford reported the Committee meet with residents regarding the right-of-way area near the Viburnum/Sunset intersection. The major result was that residents wanted to keep it wooded and maintained by the Village without adding any hardscapes or other features.

Blackhawk Liaison Committee – Ms. Lotfi reported the Committee talked about the July 4th Fireworks. They authorized funds from the Shorewood Scramble for the UW Band's Echoes of Camp Randall to play at Blackhawk before the fireworks again at about 8:30 pm.

Closed Session – The Board went into closed session to discuss the Administrative Assistant Hiring and Village Administrator six-month evaluation.

Open Session – The Board came back into open session and unanimously approved the hire of Teresa Brommer as Administrative Assistant. The Board also approved a motion to provide a positive evaluation after conducting a 180-day review of Village Administrator Sharon Eveland.

Adjourn – The Board adjourned the meeting at 11:55 pm.

- Help serve beverages (“bartend”) at the Dance (Saturday, July 2 evening)
- Help serve beverages (“bartend”) during the July Fourth activities (Monday, July 4 afternoon)
- Help set up the Art Fair (Sunday, July 3 morning)
- Help blow up helium balloons (Monday, July 4 morning)

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AVOID “WISH-CYCLING” – BACK TO THE BASICS

The recycling industry has been grappling with a dual threat over the past few years. The value of recovered recyclable products has plummeted and the amount of contamination in the recycling has risen. Too much garbage is present in the recycling stream, clogging sorting facilities and contaminating good recyclables.

Village residents have typically done a very good job with recycling. But, contamination rates at the recycling material recovery facility are increasing. Pellitteri is finding that well-intentioned residents are putting things that they *think should or could* be recycled in the bins (also known as wish-cycling).

Under the Village’s new contract with Pellitteri that brought residents every-week recycling, the Village’s service fee could be increased if the recycling stream continues to be contaminated. Below are some tips for residents to get back to the basics:

- **Plastics:** All plastic bottles can be recycled. Plastic containers/cups with #1-7 can be recycled. Plastics with no recycling symbol with number cannot be recycled and should go in your trash cart.
- **Non-recyclable items:** Deli containers (except #1), frozen food or microwave dinner plates, Styrofoam, and more. For a complete list go to <https://www.pellitteri.com/pages/recycling-info-for-residential>
- Recycling carts with any visible trash or non-recyclables in them may be tagged with a notice of non-pickup due to contamination and not serviced.

Please support this initiative to clean up the recycling stream and follow the basic recycling standards.

REVALUATION, OPEN BOOK AND BOARD OF REVIEW

The Village contracts with [Associated Appraisal Consultants, Inc.](#) for assessment services. Earlier this year the Village hired them to conduct a market revaluation of properties in Shorewood Hills for the 2022 assessment year. Revaluation notices will be sent to property owners soon.

Village properties were far below the fair market value in 2021, so it is likely that most (if not all) property values will increase for 2022. An increased property value does not mean your property taxes will go up by that same increase. The Village’s mill rate (the tax rate per \$1,000 of property value) will be adjusted down accordingly. The revaluation is designed to raise property values back to the fair market value and redistribute the tax burden more equitably throughout the Village. For example, if your property value went up in comparison to your neighbor, you will pay a little more of the overall property taxes than your neighbor. Similarly, if your valuation didn’t go up as much as your neighbor’s, then you will pay a little less of the overall taxes.

If you have any questions concerning your property’s revaluation, you can contact the assessor now (920-749-1995 / info.apraz@gmail.com) or visit with an assessor at the **Open Book** session. Representatives from Associated Appraisal will be available virtually or by phone on Thursday, July 28 from 10:00 am to 6:00 pm to discuss Shorewood Hills’ 2022 assessments. Scheduling an appointment for **Open Book** is best but they

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will also take calls on July 28 as time permits.

If after talking with the assessor before or during the Open Book session, you wish to contest the assessed value of your property, you can do so at the **Board of Review** meeting scheduled for August 18, 2022 from 10:00 am to 12:00 pm. You will need to contact Village Clerk Sam Liebert at 608-267-2680 / sliebert@shorewood-hills.org to obtain an Objection Form and to schedule an appointment before the **Board of Review** (by appointment only).

The Village's Board of Review, which consists of residents appointed by the Village Board, is charged with determining if a contested assessment is accurate. The Board functions like a court in that it is required to evaluate evidence based on fact. A property owner appealing before the BOR must provide factual information showing a property is incorrectly assessed. The Objection Form must be filled out in its entirety. Failure to provide 48 hours advanced notice to the Clerk may result in denial of a hearing at the Board of Review.

YARD WORK TIPS

Spring and Summer are great times to get your yard in shape. The Public Works Crew has some reminders on how to make the collection of weeds and brush easier on them.

GRASS CLIPPINGS

The Village Crew does NOT collect grass clippings. Residents are encouraged to compost grass clippings at home or leave them on your lawn as green fertilizer. Alternatively, residents may transport the clippings themselves to the grass clippings pile in Dudley Davis Park (more commonly known as the "rock quarry"). There are designated spots in the quarry for grass clippings, green vegetation and wood chips. If you transport material in a bag, you should empty the bag on the appropriate pile and reuse or dispose of the bag at home. The dumping of anything else in the quarry is PROHIBITED. Brush from tree trimming or removed invasive species like buckthorn should not be dumped in the quarry.

Village residents doing their own work are allowed to pile grass clippings / greens in the quarry and leave brush on the curbside for chipping. If you hire a contractor to do your yard work, then the contractor is responsible for hauling the material out of the Village.

WEEDS / GREEN VEGETATION COLLECTION

The Village Crew will collect pulled weeds and green vegetation put at the curb by residents. The Crew usually makes a pass through the Village once a week. Dirt and root balls must be removed from all pulled weeds and green vegetation or it will not be collected by the Crew.

Alternatively, residents may transport the weeds and green vegetation themselves to the grass clippings pile in Dudley Davis Park (more commonly known as the "rock quarry"). There are designated spots in the quarry for grass clippings, green vegetation and wood chips. If you transport material to the Quarry using a bag, the bag should be emptied onto the grass clippings pile. The empty bag should be taken home for reuse or disposal in your trash cart. The dumping of anything else in the quarry is PROHIBITED.

BRUSH COLLECTION

The Village Crew will chip branches and brush throughout the spring, summer and fall if residents haul the material to the curbside. The Village's "Chipper" can take branches up to 12 inches in diameter. For ease of pickup, residents should arrange the brush at the curb such that the ends of the branches are all oriented in the same direction. Longer branches are easier for the Crew to feed into the chipper, so there is no need to cut branches down to any specific length.

Brush piles should not be mixed with any other materials (i.e. leaves or greens) and should be three feet from obstructions like trees, poles, signs and mailboxes. Village residents doing their own work are allowed to pile brush at the curb. If you hire a contractor to do your yard work, the contractor is responsible for hauling away the material.

EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY: PUBLIC WORKS CREWMEMBER

The Village is seeking applicants for the position of Public Works Crewmember. The position is multi-faceted with tasks involving street, water, wastewater, and stormwater maintenance and repairs, snow plowing, tree-cutting, brush/leaf pick up, janitorial work, and involves the operation of small and large equipment.

Requirements include a high school diploma or equivalent. Previous experience is preferred but is not required. Experience with tool/machine maintenance and/or a mechanical background is strongly preferred. Applicants must have a valid Wisconsin CDL or have the ability to obtain one within six months of hire. This position requires the ability to maneuver in various strenuous environments and to operate in extreme weather conditions as well as the ability to lift heavy objects repetitively over an extended period of time. Evening, weekend, and holiday work is required during emergencies. The Public Works Crew is considered emergency response personnel and, as such, the employee is required to live within a 30-minute response time.

This is a full-time, hourly, non-exempt position. The hourly rate will be \$20.40-\$28.08 DOQ. **To apply, submit a cover letter, resume, and five professional references to seveland@shorewood-hills.org.** The position is considered open until filled but submission materials must be received by 4:30pm, Thursday, July 21, 2022 for first consideration.
