POSSIBLE REFERENDUM TO EXCEED THE LEVY LIMIT

The Board of Trustees is currently considering a possible referendum for the November ballot to allow the Village to exceed the state-imposed levy limit. The referendum process is complicated, lengthy, and tedious but, at its core, it is a truly democratic process in that it allows the voters to decide what services they deem important and how much they are willing and able to pay for those services.

The Village has operated for many years with a deficit in the operating budget that it has creatively covered, often with short-term borrowing, but a permanent solution is necessary. Additionally, rising costs and other factors are affecting the financial needs of the Village, generating the need for additional funding and necessitating a referendum.

Village Administrator Sharon Eveland will be holding a public information meeting on June 16th at 6:30 pm at Village Hall to provide information to the public on the potential referendum and to answer questions and solicit feedback from the community.

While this meeting will be in-person, the Village will also be broadcasting the meeting on Facebook Live as well. Please join us to learn more about the potential referendum.

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE MAY 19, 2022 MEETING OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

(Complete detailed minutes will be available on our website or at the Village Hall)

Attendance – Trustees Dave Benforado, John Imes, Cokie Albrecht, Shabnam Lotfi, Mark Lederer, Dietmar Bassuner and Carol Barford were in attendance.

Appearances and Communications – **County Supervisor Richelle Andrae** represents the Village now that Shorewood Hills has been moved to District 11 on the new redistricting maps. Ms. Andrae joined the Board meeting to introduce herself and review the County Board's activities, initiatives and policies. Hot topics on the County Board are expansion of the County's landfill, the County jail and staffing at the Zoo. **Gary Johnson** reported on the preliminary plans for the Village's July 4th celebration. Most activities will be held on July 4. The schedule of events will be back to normal, including the Independence Day Dance on July 2 from 8:00-11:00 pm. Fundraising letters and requests for volunteers will be going out soon.

Consent Agenda – In an effort to expedite meetings, items on the consent agenda are considered as a group and are adopted with one motion. Any Board member may unilaterally remove an item from the consent agenda if he or she believes the item needs discussion. Item on the consent agenda included the approval of minutes from the April 19, 2022 Board meeting and a block party for Wellesley Road on May 30, 2022.

Decision regarding possible return to in-person meetings – After a discussion, the Board decided to continue virtual meetings except in specific circumstances and when meetings can be held outdoors.

Decision regarding potential referendum – Ms. Eveland reviewed the financial analysis done by Brad Viegut at Baird. Mr. Viegut modeled an increase of \$191-394 to the property tax bill of a median home in the Village valued at \$590,500. Two public information meetings are scheduled in June and July to present the case for the referendum and receive community input. The Board discussed potential items to include in the funding, the Trustees feelings on the size of the levy increase, and the effect of the TID closures projected in 2032. The referendum increase to the tax levy should allow the Village to maintain its budget until the TIDs close.

Approval of Administrative Assistant Job Description – The Board reviewed the job description last month but did not officially approve it. The Board unanimously approved the Administrative Assistant job description with a correction of the work hours to be 8:00 am-4:30 pm.

Authorization of funds for a new server and replacement routers – The equipment is well beyond its recommended replacement schedule. The Board unanimously authorized the funds to replace the Village's file server and routers at the Village Hall and DPW Building.

Resolution R-2022-4 Amending Fee Schedule for daily food cart fee – A change to the fee schedule has been recommended to facilitate bringing back food carts to the Village. A modest daily fee per cart will allow for a variety of carts to visit this summer and fall. The Board unanimously approved [Resolution R-2022-4](#) amending the Fee Schedule to include a daily foot cart fee.

Authorization of funds for camera system for the Boathouse at McKenna Park – John Voegeli, chair of the Waterfront Committee, asked to speak about this topic. He has a number of concerns including what is says about the Village when we install cameras. He feels it is an intrusion of privacy and surveillance of young people at a beach makes him uncomfortable. Police Lieutenant Jaime Weitzel explained the history of activities at McKenna Park which brought about the Police Department's recommendation to install cameras. There is an extensive list of calls in recent years including noise complaints, drinking, drug use and large parties. Lt. Weitzel considers it to be a life-safety issue and something needs to be done to deter the partying and large gatherings. The Board discussed the surveillance issue, cost, the number of calls for service by the Police, if cameras will be a deterrent, a camera use policy, the safety of officers responding to the area, and the Village's liability if someone were injured. The Board unanimously decided to refer the matter to the Public Health & Safety Committee for review and a possible recommendation.

Possible approval of easement on 1008 Shorewood Blvd and lands located on Edgehill Dr to AT&T – Staff have been working with AT&T regarding a major upgrade to internet infrastructure in the Village. Originally the plan was to bore underground which would require numerous new hand-holes in the right-of-way (ROW) and would have a major impact on staff to locate underground utilities. The revised plan will be more efficient and cost-effective for AT&T and the Village but require easements in the ROW and on Village land. The Board took no action on this item because it is waiting for a legal review from the Village attorney.

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Appointments – Mr. Benforado proposed new Trustee appointments to Village Committees that were unanimously approved by the Board (*see list at bottom of page*).

Village President’s Report – Mr. Benforado discussed the logistics of the Trustee’s cookout on July 4th.

Village Administrator’s Report – University Ave Reconstruction Update – Ms. Eveland reported the MPO did allocate additional money to the project which will save the Village ~\$500K. Construction starts May 26 and [City of Madison Engineering](#) will provide weekly updates on their website.

Plan Commission – Mr. Benforado reported the Commission discussed an EV Charging ordinance, potential Short-Term Rental ordinance, and developing an RFP for a proposed University Avenue Corridor Plan.

Public Works Committee – Mr. Imes reported the Committee worked on speed hump goals and objectives. They will have a public input session in July and report to the Board in August.

Parks Committee – Mr. Benforado reported the Committee met the new Forester Adam Lohrmann. They discussed the large open space (right-of-way) at the intersection of Sunset and Viburnum Drives. They are considering a grant to revise the Forestry Management Plan, discussed tree loss due to the Madison Sewer project and plan to have its next meeting in-person at 4 Corners Park.

Closed Session – The Board went into closed session to discuss a Public Works vacancy, the Police Department hire, and an Employee Bonus.

Open Session – The Board came back into open session and unanimously approved a \$3,000 bonus to David Sykes for his service to the Village during the staff shortages over the past several months.

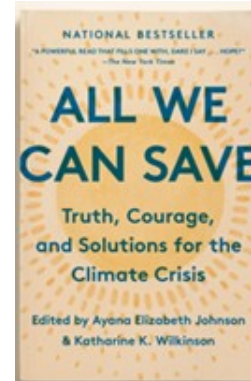
Adjourn – The Board adjourned the meeting at 11:07 pm.

FOURTH OF JULY VOLUNTEER HELP IS NEEDED

The 4th of July celebration in Shorewood Hills is a tradition almost as old as the Village itself. We are happy to announce that this year's Fourth of July celebration will be similar to those before the pandemic (*see the Schedule of Events on Pages 5-6*).

In recent years, the Fourth of July celebration has become a more community-wide effort with Village residents and friends stepping up to help with a number of the regular activities. The members of the Shorewood Hills EMS & Fire Association are the backbone of the celebration but the Association's numbers are shrinking due to age and members moving out of the area. Help from the community will be needed to keep all the activities this year and in the future.



30 Minute Jobs

There are a few activities that are more involved, but most that we have identified are simple tasks that just need a few able bodies to complete. We call these '**30 minute jobs**'. If you would like to help with the July 4th celebration, no special skills required, take a look at the list below to see if anything sparks your interest:

- Help haul tables and chairs from the Community Center to the old Fire Station for the Independence Day Dance (Thursday, June 30 evening)
- Help serve beverages ("bartend") at the Dance (Saturday, July 2 evening)
- Help serve beverages ("bartend") during the July Fourth activities (Monday, July 4 afternoon)
- Help set up the Art Fair (Sunday, July 3 morning)
- Help blow up helium balloons (Monday, July 4 morning)
- Help with the little kids' games (6 y/o and under) (Monday, July 4 afternoon)
- Help with the stage games (7-14 y/o) (Monday, July 4 afternoon)
- Help clean up equipment and supplies after activities are done (Monday, July 4 late afternoon)
- Help clean up the golf course the morning after the fireworks (Tuesday, July 5 early morning)
- Help haul tables and chairs back to the Community Center (Tuesday, July 5 morning)

The more involved jobs that would require a longer commitment and some extra, simple training are:

- Provide crowd control at the fireworks before and during the show by monitoring the crowd control line from a golf cart (get a close up view of the fireworks) (Monday, July 4 evening).
- Assist with the setup of the July 4 games & activities (Monday, July 4 morning).
- Assist with general cleanup of the celebration at the old Fire Station (Tuesday, July 5 morning).

CONSIDER JOINING OUR ASSOCIATION

The former Shorewood Hills Fire Department and Emergency Medical Service (EMS) no longer provides emergency services to the Village. But, the remaining members of those organizations formed a community service group (the Shorewood Hills EMS & Fire Association) that remains active in the community.

The Association has nothing to do with fighting fires or treating patients anymore. It does promote and participate in community events like the Computer & Home Electronics Recycling Roundup (May/September), community projects like the replacement of the bus shelters on Shorewood Blvd. and Edgehill Drive, and in particular the Fourth of July celebration.

The Association is also an opportunity for friends, both old and new, to get together and socialize every couple of months. We are hoping to bring in some new members that can participate as much (or as little) as they want in the group's activities.

FOURTH OF JULY SCHEDULE OF EVENTS

(The tradition continues but please read carefully, as some activities have changed)

Independence Day Dance – We kick off the Celebration with the traditional Independence Day Dance. Join us at the old Fire Station (1008 Shorewood Blvd) on **Saturday, July 2nd** from 8:00 pm until 11:00 pm for an evening of music and fun. Shorewood Blvd. outside the old Fire Station will be blocked off for safety. The Village's own 'DJ EJ' and 'Big Jake' will be playing your favorites. Grab your friends and neighbors socialize or dance the night away. As always, admission is free to all. Refreshments will be available at nominal cost. Children are welcome!

Monday, July 4th . . .

"Tri-It" Triathlon – The Village Recreation Committee, together with Shorewood Elementary School PTO, will host the 13th Annual Tri-It on July 4th. This mini-triathlon is for ALL ages. The event will have an Adult Heat (250 m swim / 7 km bike / 3 km run), and a Kids Heat (12-and-under, 150 m swim / 3.2 km bike / 1.6 km run). On-site registration begins at 8:30 am at Shorewood Hills Pool. The adult heat will begin at 9:00 am (kids heat to follow). The triathlon is free, but donations for the SHES PTO will be accepted at registration. Start your 4th of July celebration on a healthy note and join the fun while supporting our local school!

Softball Game – The traditional 4th of July Softball Game begins at 9:00 am on the ball diamond north of the School. The game has evolved from the "Married vs. Singles" game of the past, to an East vs. West battle for Village supremacy. Bring your bats, balls and gloves and join in the fun.



League Bake Sale – After a two year break due to the pandemic, the Shorewood Hills Community League's Bake Sale is back this year. Join your neighbors and friends at the old Fire Station for coffee and baked goods between 9:00 am and 12:00 pm. The Bake Sale will have numerous tasty treats prepared and donated by Village residents. You might just find that perfect dessert for your holiday dinner. Set-up begins at 8:00 am. Please drop off your donated confection between 8:00-9:00 am at the old Fire Station for pricing.

Village Art Fair – The Village is full of talented artists working in a number of different media. Stop by the Fire Station from 10:00 am to 2:00 pm to view (and possibly purchase) art work created by your friends and neighbors. There may be fewer artists than in the past and they will be spread out a bit more so that people can remain socially distant from each other. Parade – The children's parade will begin **promptly at 12:30 pm**. Decorate your bike, trike or stroller or design a patriotic float. Everyone who would like to join the trek around the school should line-up in front of the old Fire Station by 12:15 pm. Sorry, no automobiles allowed without special permission (**well in advance**).

No Candy Please – We ask that both participants and spectators refrain from tossing candy during the parade. Handing out candy during the parade may be common place at other parades but it has never been a part of our July Fourth Parade. That may be because there are usually more people IN the parade than watching it. For everyone's safety, no candy please.



Games – There is something for all ages. A variety of stage games, field events and booth games follow the Parade, including the popular egg toss. Fire Truck rides are back this year too (all adults must be accompanied by a child ;-p). These events are free, but don't forget to bring some cash for baked goods and beverages.

Waterfights – This is the 27th year for the Adult Waterfight Tournament. It has become quite the spectator sport. Veterans and newbies will battle for the title and Village bragging rights. Who will capture the trophy this year? Can anyone break Coops Troups winning streak? Gather your friends and family, practice in your backyard with a garden hose and prepare for the Annual Adult Waterfight Tournament. [Registration forms](#) are available on the Village's website or at the beverage sales area during the Dance or morning of July 4th (please sign up early, space is limited). We will have waterfights for kids before the Adult Waterfight Tournament.

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Family Picnic – Do you want to see your Village Board and other officials really work hard for you? Come to the Family Picnic on the school grounds across from the old Fire Station. From 5:30 pm to 6:30 pm, traditional favorites like burgers, brats, hot dogs, chicken and other tasty treats will be available for a small fee. Soft drinks and other refreshments will be available at the old Fire Station. Get together with family and friends, bring dishes to pass within your group and you’ve got a first rate picnic dinner with a minimum of fuss. Don’t forget to bring along your own napkins, plates, eating utensils and a trash bag. Trash and recycling carts will be available on the grounds for your convenience.

Fireworks – Put a finishing touch on a great day by joining us at the Blackhawk Country Club for the Annual Fireworks Display. The fireworks show begins at dusk (~9:30 pm) but you may want to find a spot earlier in the evening. The volunteers of the EMS & Fire Association began setting up and shooting the fireworks show at Blackhawk in 1948. Over the last 70+ years the show has evolved to be bigger, better and safer. This year’s show should be excellent. There is always a surprise (or two). While there is no charge for the show, donations are heartily encouraged and will be solicited at the Country Club. CANOE / KAYAK SHARE PROGRAM 2022

The popular Canoe/Kayak Share Program kicks off its season now that the marina facilities have been installed. The \$35 seasonal membership fee per household includes unlimited use (as available) of the Village's canoes and kayaks for the boating season (now to October 15). The 2022 membership form is available on the Village website at www.shorewood-hills.org/canoekayak.

Adult Village residents are eligible for membership. That includes residents of the apartments in the Village, as is the case with all Village recreation programs. Guests may use the boats when accompanied by a Share Program member. Parents are fully responsible for children, and children under 18 years old cannot take out boats alone.

- Reservations to use boats must be made by visiting or calling the Village Hall.
- Keys to access the boats must be obtained from the Village Hall during regular office hours (Monday-Thursday from 8:00 am-4:00 pm, Friday from 8:00 am-12:00 pm).
- Keys should be returned to the Village Hall immediately after use or put in the Official Drop Box in the Village Hall parking lot.
