BUS RAPID TRANSIT UPDATE

(From a City of Madison Transportation Division press release)

As the community prepares for the Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) system to launch on September 22, the Madison Department of Transportation wants to make sure drivers understand how to navigate new dedicated bus lanes. Indicated by segments of red pavement, “BUS ONLY” lane markings, lane striping, and signage these dedicated lanes will not only improve reliability for buses but

SEPTEMBER 2024

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE AUGUST 20, 2024 BOARD MEETING

The highlights of the Board meeting are in no way comprehensive. The intent is to give residents and interested parties a sense of the actions taken by the Board at its last meeting. The official meeting minutes will be available on the Village's website once they have been approved by the Board.

The hybrid in-person/virtual meeting was **Called to Order** at 7:03 pm.

Board members present at the meeting were President John Imes, Shabnam Lotfi, Mark Lederer, Dietmar Bassuner, Carol Barford, Bob Falk, and Robb Stankey. Also in attendance was Village Administrator Brian Mooney, Clerk-Treasurer Julie Fitzgerald, and a couple of Village residents.

During the **public comment** period, resident John Voegeli spoke about the Funkhouser governance proposal. He felt the top-down government design may not be a good fit for a smaller community like Shorewood Hills.

In an effort to expedite meetings, items on the **consent agenda** are considered as a group and are adopted with one motion. Any Trustee may unilaterally remove an item from the consent agenda if he or she believes it needs discussion. Items on the consent agenda included approval of the Board meeting minutes from July 16, 2024 (regular & special), July 17 (special), August 1 (special). Also approved was the hiring of a part-time Community Service Officer, a Crossing Guard pay adjustment, a block party permit for Edgehill Drive (September 7), [Resolution R-2024-02](#) Write-off of Uncollectible Personal Property Taxes, and [Resolution R-2024-07](#) Designating Public Depositories and Authorizing Signers on Accounts.

The police department capital equipment purchase item was removed from the consent agenda. Police Chief Pharo asked for funding to upfit the new squad car with radios and equipment. The Board discussed the matter and approved the expenditure of \$15,576.96 from the Capital Fund which was available from another project coming in under budget.

The Board waived the third reading and approved [Ordinance L-2024-03](#) Amending Chapter 15 of the Village Code related to residential and commercial building codes. This ordinance change will allow the delegation of GEC to operate on behalf of the Village with respect to inspections, plan review and submitting reports to the State of Wisconsin.

The Board discussed the Strategic Plan process timeline. Mr. Mooney met with the consultant (CP2) and the project could be started in September and concluded by the end of November. The consultant would meet with the Board and conduct some townhall meetings. They will draft a Strategic Plan and the Board will recommend the final edit. By consensus, the Board agreed to move forward with the project in September.

The Board discussed the Village Caucus process and the possibility of changing to a Primary Election on a more permanent basis. Mr. Imes explained the history of the Caucus in the Village and the petition to have a primary election at the beginning of 2024. After a discussion that included the possibility of creating a Charter Ordinance requiring a primary, a motion was made and approved to direct staff to prepare an ordinance amending Section 1.05(2) to require that candidates for elective village office be nominated by nomination papers.

The Board discussed Village communications including the possibility of quarterly townhall meetings, postcards, updating the Village's website, and ListServes to improve the ability for residents to understand and provide input on various topics. The Board discussed some of the most pressing topics and possible logistics of townhall meetings. A motion was made and approved to direct the Administrator to schedule a fall townhall meeting with the assistance of President Imes and Trustee Lotfi in determining a date and topic.

The Board discussed the Governance Project including which recommendations the Village may want to implement and how that might be done. Of concern was the role of existing committees, how possible advisory committees would be structured, and the specific role of the Personnel Committee in hiring decisions. Mr. Mooney will consult the Village's labor attorney regarding usual hiring practices and Ms. Barford, who chairs the Personnel Committee, will consult with that committee about a solution to retain the benefits of the membership's expertise if the current hiring process is altered.

Mr. Mooney reported that he has been working with staff on the 2025 Budget. He has also had discussions with Personnel Chair Barford regarding possible wage adjustments and Finance Chair Lederer regarding

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possible CIP adjustments. Any other committees or residents that have recommendations on the items that should be included in the operating or capital budget, should forward them to Mr. Mooney as soon as possible.

Police Chief Pharo submitted a resignation letter informing the Board that he intends to retire on December 10, 2024. The Board discussed the process for hiring a new police chief. After a discussion, by consensus, the Board agreed that Mr. Mooney would manage the new police chief hiring process and present candidate recommendations to the Board.

Mr. Imes reported on the successful All-City Swim Meet. Ms. Barford indicated the Parks Committee has information about ensuing tree removals and where people can go with questions. Mr. Bassuner & Ms. Barford reported the McKenna Park Master Plan survey was open now and encouraged everyone to complete the survey before it closes on September 5. There will be a townhall meeting about the Master Plan on October 8 with another townhall meeting planned for early December. The Master Plan is expected to be delivered to the Board in January or February 2025.

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will contribute to smoother traffic flow and improve safety for all users of our streets.

To help residents and drivers understand how to navigate these new lanes, we've released a short, informational video ([How Metro Bus Lanes Work](#)) that provides clear and concise instructions on how to safely interact with the bus-only lanes.



“Bus-only lanes separate buses from other vehicles in traffic,” said Yang Tao, Director of Traffic Engineering. “By dedicating separate spaces for buses and for general traffic, we’re not only improving travel times for the transit system, but we’re improving safety by reducing conflicts between buses and other vehicles—largely eliminating the need for drivers to navigate around buses as they slow down, stop, and accelerate to drop off and pick up passengers along transit routes.”

As the video highlights, only buses, emergency vehicles, and—in some locations—bicycles should continuously use bus lanes. Where there are white dashed lines on the pavement, drivers can cross into or through a bus lane to make a turn. As construction of the BRT system is completed and service launches on September 22, drivers should follow lane markings and signage along the BRT route.

Enforcement of bus-only lanes will focus on education and safety as we all learn how to adapt to these changes.

“One of our mottos for Vision Zero is: ‘safety starts with all of us’ and that couldn’t be truer as we embark on the transformative launch of BRT,” said Renee Callaway, Assistant Director of Traffic Engineering and a lead on Madison’s Vision Zero effort. “This fall, we are reminding drivers to be alert for pedestrians near transit stations, remove distractions, and slow down.”

Vision Zero is a nation-wide movement to eliminate traffic deaths and severe injuries on all roadways. [Learn more about Madison’s Vision Zero strategy.](#)

“This BRT system will accommodate projected increases in travel demand and population growth, while alleviating congestion through the isthmus, improving transportation equity, and reducing emissions to improve public health,” stated Justin Stuehrenberg, General Manager of Metro Transit. “Dedicated bus lanes are a critical element in realizing these benefits. We are excited to partner with departments and organizations throughout the city to ensure the safe rollout of the new service.”

TREE REPLANTING PLAN

The Madison Metropolitan Sewer District (MMSD) is conducting a multi-year project to increase sanitary sewer capacity across several municipalities. As part of the project, many trees have already been removed along the southern edge of the Village west of Shorewood Boulevard. In September 2024, removals will continue to the east of Shorewood Boulevard. Tree removals will be quite noticeable along the bike path and University Avenue.

The good news is that re-planting will commence in April 2025, including many native species of trees, shrubs, grasses and perennial flowers. See the landscaping plan [HERE](#). The tree stock to be planted is currently 5-10 years old, about 10 feet tall and 2 inches in diameter. This vegetation will take several years to mature, but it will be low-maintenance, climate-resilient and pollinator-friendly: a win-win-win! The general plan also includes protective measures for the beloved large oak tree just south of the Shorewood Hills Pool.

This replanting plan is a joint effort between MMSD, the Village and Vandewalle & Associates. **If you have questions, please contact Village Administrator Brian Mooney (bmooney@shorewood-hills.org).** Keep in mind that Village Forestry and Public Works Departments are not responsible for the tree removals or for the construction activity that will follow. Village personnel cannot make on-the-fly changes to the plan.

Watch for future volunteer opportunities in Spring/Summer 2025 to water and care for the new plantings! Thank you for your interest in this project.

SHOREWOOD HILLS YOUTH BASKETBALL PROGRAM - FALL 2024

The fall session of the Shorewood Hills Youth Basketball Program is open to Shorewood Hills Elementary School students and elementary-aged Village residents who will be entering 1st-5th grade in Fall 2024. The program will teach the fundamental rules and skills of basketball in a safe, fun, encouraging, and inclusive learning environment. COACHING POSITION FOR SHOREWOOD HILLS YOUTH BASKETBALL PROGRAM

The Village of Shorewood Hills seeks energetic and enthusiastic basketball coaches to teach the Fall 2024 sessions of its youth basketball program. Program participants include Shorewood Hills Elementary School students and elementary-aged Village residents who will be enrolled in 1st-5th grade in 2024.

Coaches are expected to know the fundamental rules and skills of basketball, and to teach those basic rules/skills to groups of elementary-aged children while promoting a safe, fun, encouraging, and inclusive learning environment. Coaches will help participants build skills, strength, and confidence while promoting good sportsmanship, physical fitness, and teamwork. ENERGY EFFICIENCY WORKSHOP

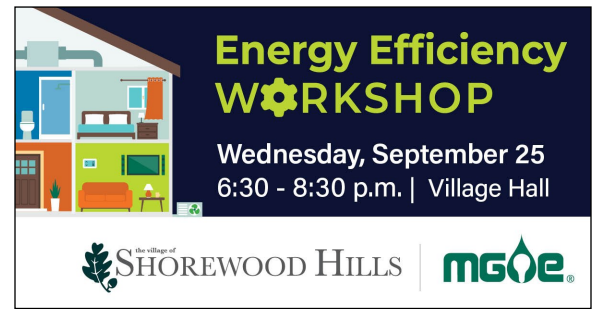
SEPTEMBER 25 (6:30-8:30 PM)

A Public Safety Notice from the Shorewood Hills Public Health & Safety Committee

SAFETY TIPS FOR DRIVING NEAR THE SCHOOL

With the kids going back to school, the safety of every child traveling to and from Shorewood Hills Elementary School is everyone’s primary concern. Students are encouraged to walk or bike to school. If parents feel they need to accompany their children, the Police Department suggests doing so on foot or by bicycle. Fewer people driving will reduce traffic congestion and will help keep our children safe.

- **Speed Limits** – The speed limit on all residential streets in the Village is 20 mph with the exceptions of the school zone when children are present where it is **15 mph**. The Shorewood Hills Police Dept. strongly enforces all traffic laws and drivers should pay attention to all signs and obey all the rules of the road.
- **Crosswalks** – During the school year, the Village provides adult crossing guards at key intersections for students’ walking and biking safety. Crossing guards are located at the Shorewood-Topping-Harvard intersection and the Oxford-Bowdoin intersection. Drivers, please remember pedestrians in any crosswalk have the right of way. Drivers must come to a complete stop prior to the crosswalk and remain stopped until everyone in the crosswalk has cleared the roadway (including the crossing guard). At intersections staffed with a crossing guard, all traffic is required to stop from the time the crossing guard walks into the street until the crossing guard returns to the side of the road. Crossing guards often use STOP signs and wear traffic safety vests to increase their visibility.
- **Drop-Off and Pick-Up Areas** – The Village and School made some adjustments recently to Shorewood Boulevard ‘Drop-Off’ and ‘Pick-Up’ location to eliminate the need for kids to cross the street. The designated spot for ‘Drop-Off’ and ‘Pick-Up’ is now on the EAST SIDE (school side) of Shorewood Boulevard, near the soccer field (in the 1100 block of the street). The old ‘Drop-Off’ and ‘Pick-Up’ area on the west side of Shorewood Boulevard is now just a 2-hour parking area. Columbia Road has a ‘Drop-Off-Only’ lane, off of the street, just south of the Amherst Drive intersection. On Columbia Road, drivers may stop briefly to drop off students but since it is a single lane, drivers are not allowed to exit their vehicles, which would hold up the traffic flow.

If you choose to walk your child into the school and leave your vehicle unattended, you must be parked in a legal spot (not in the ‘Drop- Off’ and ‘Pick-Up’ areas or an area posted ‘No Stopping, Standing or Parking from 7:30 am to 4:30 pm on school days’). No Parking, Stopping or Standing areas will be enforced. Vehicles must be attended at all times. Space is limited and vehicles parked illegally will be ticketed.

Thank you and please help, so that our children have a safe year.

FALL RESIDENTIAL COMPUTER & ELECTRONICS RECYCLING ROUNDUP

The Shorewood Hills EMS & Fire Association, in conjunction with the Village's Services Committee, is pleased to be sponsoring an e-cycle event again this Fall on **Saturday, September 28, 2024 from 10:00 am to 1:00 pm**. Wisconsin's electronics recycling law bans most electronics from landfills and incinerators because of chemicals and heavy elements used in manufacturing these products.

Shorewood Hills residents may dispose of their old computers, monitors, TVs, radios and other home electronics by bringing them to the Public Works building parking lot (1008 Shorewood Blvd.). Computers and most home electronics can be recycled for free. Our recycling partner charges a modest fee to recycle old monitors, TVs, copier/fax machines, window AC units and some other items because of the materials being recycled. We pass that fee along to you (ranging from \$5-\$60 per item based on size/weight).

Help keep potentially damaging materials out of our landfills by disposing of your old computer, TVs and other electronics on September 28.



EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY: VILLAGE FORESTER

We are seeking applicants for the position of Forester. Shorewood Hills is a welcoming and inclusive full-service community that prides itself on being a wonderful place to live, work, play, learn, and visit. The Village places a very high value on its mature urban forest, conservation ecology and environmental sustainability. The Forester is responsible for managing the community forests, parks, public gardens, bio-retention areas and other green spaces. Duties include: tree planting, pruning, and removals; supervising and assisting 1-4 full-time/part-time staff in daily activities; maintaining an accurate public tree inventory; developing and implementing a community forestry management plan; enforcing local tree and weed ordinances; coordinating and implementing a regular 5-year rotational street tree pruning program; maintaining the Village's annual membership in the Arbor Day Foundation's Tree City USA program; coordinating the Village's annual Arbor Day celebration; monitoring for pests and pathogens in the Village tree canopy; monitoring and removal of noxious weeds and woody invasive species; consulting with utilities, contractors, volunteer organizations, and municipal staff on projects that impact public trees; preparing regular forestry reports for the Village Parks Committee; providing private tree consultations and informational materials for Village residents. Ecological restoration, tree and plant identification and integrated pest management skills are important to the position.

Requirements include a bachelor's degree in urban forestry or related field from an accredited college and three years of technical work experience directly related to urban forestry and horticulture/landscaping. Supervisory experience is preferred but not required. Arborist certification by the International Society of Arboriculture is strongly preferred and will be considered favorably during the hiring process. This position requires the ability to work independently and the skills to work well with residents and other community partners. Some evening and weekend work is required. This is an exempt salaried position, and the starting salary will be \$53,040-\$60,528 DOQ. The application process for this position will remain open until filled.
